A meeting for girls interested in Scouting is set for 7:00 p.m. at Deport Elementary School cafeteria.

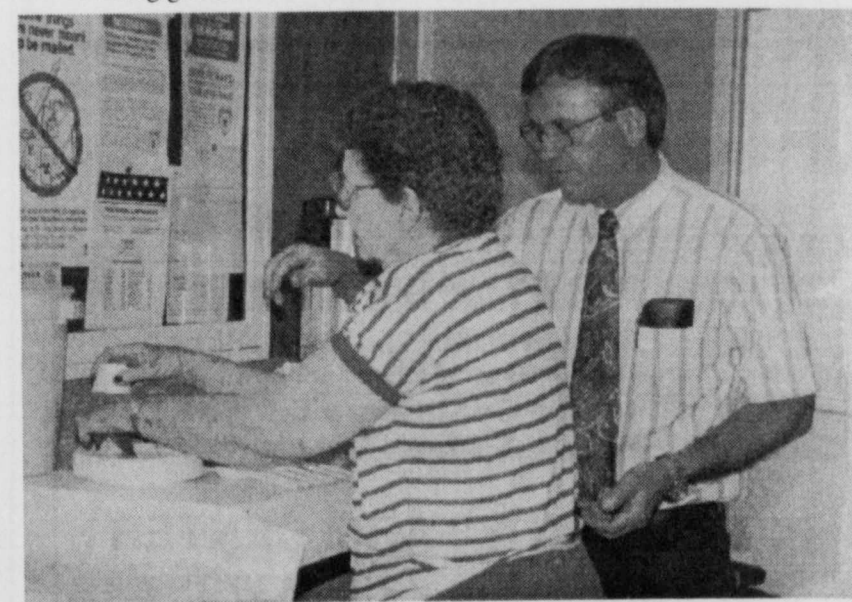

Reception To Honor Prairiland Grads At Homecoming

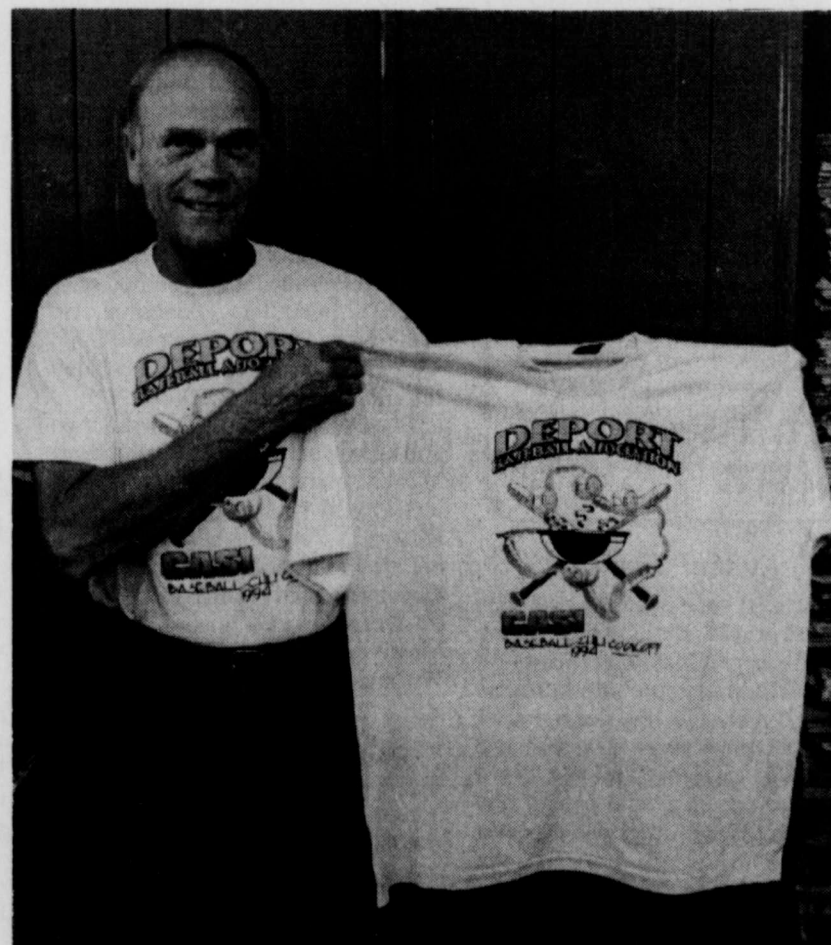

COUNTRY COOKING

We have all witnessed these people before. We have seen them on TV, passed them in the streets, in our cars and down the roads. Some of us have probably yelled at them as they crossed over or passed in front of us. They are runners. Long distance, short distance, marathon runners. They run for the sheer exhilaration of it. It is a high that can be attained for those with the stamina and courage to train and stay on a rigorous schedule of high "carbs" and no sugar. For me, this would be sheer torture. For I have a fixation for sugar.

The person or persons I am referring to is Charles and Judy Price. They both were born and raised in this area and have a beautiful home in the Clardy area and have lived there for several years. Mr. Price was employed in the Dallas school system, but opted to return home to Clardy. Charles is a Social Studies and History teacher on the Blossom campus and Judy is a secretary at the PISD school district. They both work out and train religiously (unless I bring homemade cookies or goodies to school and tempt him). Mr. Price has participated in several marathons, including Austin, Houston, Las Vegas and White Rock. Most notably was the New York Marathon last fall. There were over 27,000 runners and he came in num-

ber 9,036, which is in the top 3rd of the group. His goal is the Boston Marathon. To run in this you must have time of 3 hours and 25 minutes. His best is 3 hours and 37 minutes. So you see that he is near this. He runs from 5-6 miles a day and tallies up to 35 miles in a weeks time. Judy was there as his cheerleader and best fan. He says the best thing about running, is the stopping.

They eat a lot of pasta and noodles. Absolutely no eggs, very little red meat and a lot of chicken. A lot of cereal with skim milk and no gravies, sauces or whipped cream. Their bread is low fat-reduced and a lot of fruits. Butters of any kind is out and Charles says that any that can remain solid at room temperature is a no-no. For lunch at school, he will have "mare's" milk, (which is a high protein mixed drink) and low fat muffins that he special orders. The recipes that we are featuring are low-fat, low in calories, lots of protein and carbohydrates. Judy says that she like to use the "Pasta Accents" and adds chicken. These are found in the grocery section's frozen food.

The recipes that the Price's are sharing with us this week are all low-fat, reduced calorie, high in protein and carbohydrates. We hope you enjoy these and will see you next week!

Chicken Enchiladas
3 teaspoons vegetable oil (divided)
2 garlic cloves (minced)
1-16 ounce can tomatoes (no salt) chopped
3 teaspoons chili powder (divided)
1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper
1-1/2 cups chopped cooked chicken
1/4 cup plain low fat yogurt
3 tablespoons chopped green chilies
4 corn tortillas
2 ounces shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
In a medium size sauce pan over medium heat, heat 2 teaspoons oil. Add garlic and cook about 1 minute. Add tomatoes, 2 teaspoons chili powder and pepper and simmer uncovered, stirring occasionally, about 30 minutes.
Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine chicken, yogurt, green chilies, green onion and remaining chili powder and mix well.
In a large non-stick skillet, heat remaining oil and add tortillas, one at a time. Cook one minute on each side or until soft.
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spoon 1/4 cup sauce into 8 inch square baking dish and spread equal amounts of chicken mixture in center of each tortilla. Fold sides over filling and place tortilla seam-down in baking dish. Pour sauce over tortillas. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake for 30 minutes or until heated through. Makes 4 servings. Approximate calories per serving is 270 with 10 grams of fat.

Orange Chicken
1 tablespoon safflower oil
2 whole chicken breast (split, skinned and boned)
1 cup red pepper (cut into chunks)
2 tablespoons chopped green onion
1 garlic clove (minced)
1 cup orange juice
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ground black pepper
2 teaspoon cornstarch (dissolved in 2 tablespoons water)
1/2 cup fresh orange sections (cut into bite size pieces-1/2 medium)
fresh parsley to garnish
In large non-stick skillet over medium high heat, heat oil and add chicken and brown. Remove from skillet and add red pepper, green onion and garlic and cook, stirring occasionally for 5 minutes or until tender.
Return chicken to skillet and add orange juice, mustard, salt and pepper; bring to a boil and reduce heat, cover and simmer about 20 minutes. Transfer chicken to serving platter and keep warm.

Chicken & Lima Bean Casserole
2 packages (10 ounce) frozen lima beans
1-1/2 cups cooked chickent (cubed)
1 can (16 ounce) tomatoes (no salt, drained and chopped)
1/4 cup finely chopped onion
1 garlic clove (minced)
1-1/2 teaspoon dry mustard powder
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper
1 cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese
1/4 cup fresh whole-wheat bread crumbs
Preheat oven to 375 degrees and prepare beans according to package directions, but without salt. Spray 1-1/2 quart baking dish with non-stick cooking spray. Place beans in dish.
In a large bowl, combine chicken, tomatoes, onion, garlic, mustard, worcestershire sauce and pepper; mix well. Pour mixture over beans. Sprinkle cheese and bread crumbs over bean mixture. Bake for 30 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Makes 6 servings. Approximate calories is 240 with 5 grams of fat.

Chicken & Vegetable Stir Fry
1/3 cup low-sodium chicken broth
2 tablespoon sherry
1 tablespoon low-sodium soy sauce
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper
2 whole chicken breast (split, skinned and boned-cut into 1/2 inch pieces)
1 tablespoon safflower oil
1 package (6 ounces) frozen snow peas (thawed and drained)
1/4 pound mushrooms-sliced
2 tablespoons chopped green onion
2 garlic cloves-minced
1/4 teaspoon finely chopped fresh ginger
In shallow dish, combine chicken broth, sherry, soy sauce, cornstarch and pepper. Add chicken and toss well. Cover and refrigerate, stirring occasionally for about an hour.
In a large non-stick skillet over high heat, heat oil. Add snow peas, mushrooms, green onion, garlic and ginger and cook 3-5 minutes or until tender-crisp. Remove from skillet and set aside.
Add chicken with marinade to skillet, cook, stirring occasionally for 10 minutes or until chicken is tender and sauce is thickened. If necessary, add about 1/4 cup of water to skillet.
Return vegetables to skillet, cook, stirring frequently for about a minute. Makes 4 servings with 215 calories and 7 grams of fat.

Pirates Blank Patriots, 13-0 Prairiland Junior High Defeats James Bowie

From the penalties of the previous week to seven fumbles Friday evening, the woes of the Prairiland Patriots continued, as the host James Bowie Pirates smothered the usually-reliable Patriot offense, 13-0.

Out-gaining their opponents for a third consecutive week, the Pats were unable to sustain continuity on offense, with possession after possession, six in all, ending in a turnover.

Prairiland coach Rick Connot's defense continued to be as sticky as ever, limiting the Pirates to five first downs from the scrimmage line, and to only 177 yards of total offense. But donation touchdowns could not be overcome.

Twice, the visitors had fumbled well within their own side of midfield, making the drives for touchdown more likely.

During first-quarter action, James Dudley was separated from the ball at the Patriot 32, as the Pirates had just enough push for tailback Josh Chisum to find paydirt for the 7-0 halftime lead for the hosts.

The third quarter found an almost exact reprise of the earlier score as the Pats left the ball on the ground inside their 45. Chisum again got the

honors, ending the scoring at 13-0. Stephen Swaim and Dudley, the Patriot one-two punch, had their usually reliable evening statistically. Swaim averaged better than 4.4 yards on 17 carries, while Dudley managed 55 yards on seven trips.

David Ford had yet another fine showing in brief duty offensively, averaging 8.5 on two carries.

Still, nine first downs and 218 yards of total offense could not find a way to offset the rain of fumbles--plus a sticky Pirate secondary which limited ZachAllen to only three completions in 17 attempts.

The closest thing to a breakaway play the Patriots fashioned was a 35-yard pass to Chris Bramlett, but the other two completions were for only 5 yards to Adam Walker and 4 yards to Shannon Lamb.

Bramlett continues to lead his team defensively, getting 11 unassisted tackles for a second consecutive week from his linebacking post. Fellow backer Dudley and defensive quarterback Michael Murphy each contributed seven tackles, while lineman Michael Hooge nabbed an interception.

The Junior High Prairiland Patriots came out on top Thursday night, September 15 in their first game of the 1994 season against the James Bowie Pirates.

The game remained scoreless at the end of the first quarter while both teams tried unsuccessfully to gain control of the ballgame.

In the 2nd quarter the Patriots began a drive which ended with Shane Chennault carrying the ball in for the first six of the ballgame. Aaron Williams raised the score to 8-0 with the 2 point conversion.

The Patriot lead was short-lived as

the James Bowie team answered with their own 8 points, making the score at the half 8-8.

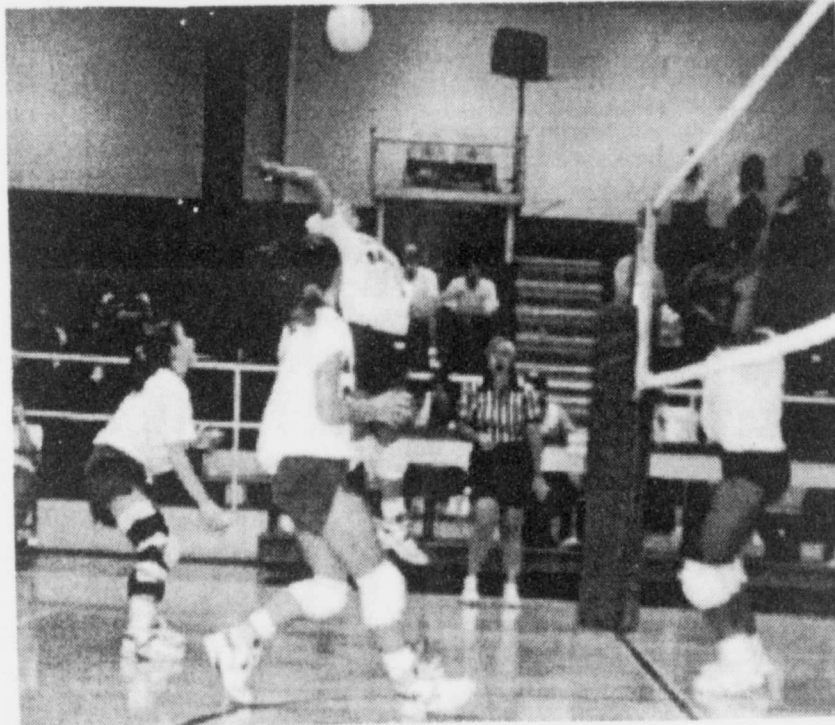
The score remained unchanged until the 4th quarter, when Williams carried the ball in for another TD.

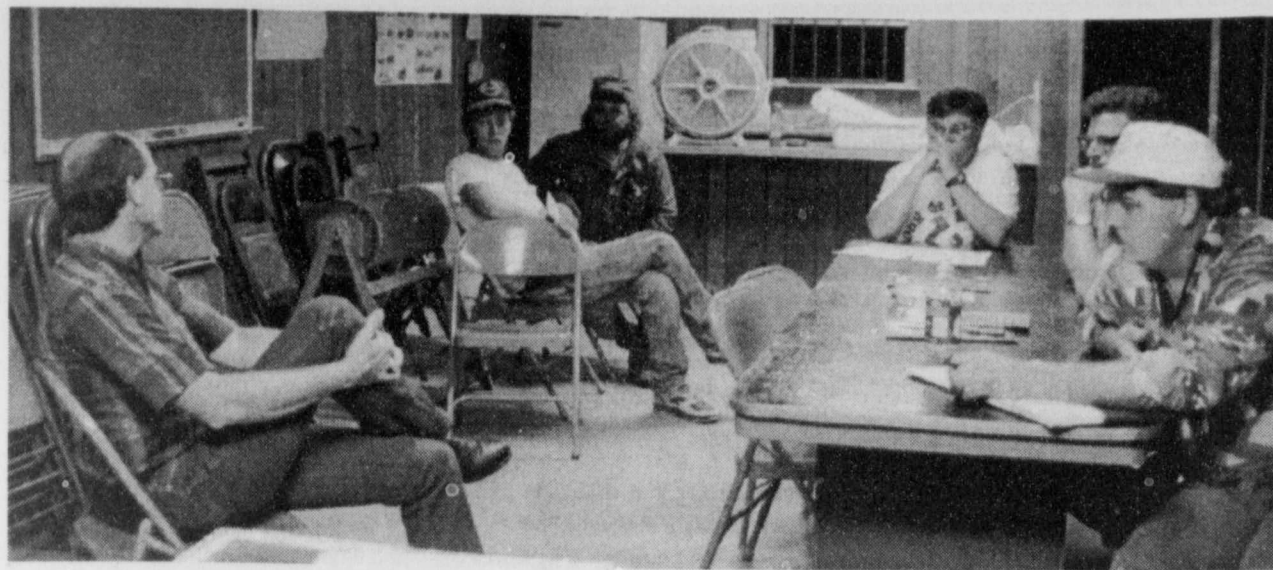



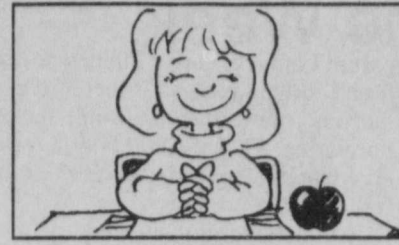

**FmHA Has Loan Funds
To Help Eligible Persons**

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Lamar County.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged population groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of these groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their area.

All Licensed Pesticide Applicators Must Be Recertified

The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency requires that all licensed pesticide applicators be recertified through continuing education. Confusion exists across the state among applicators regarding how many continuing education units (CEU's) are required by the Texas Department of Agriculture in order to recertify.

Private applicators fall under one of two categories with the Texas Department of Agriculture: Certified Private Applicator or Licensed Private Applicator.

Certified Private Applicators, issued licenses prior to January 10, 1989, have two options to recertify: 1) obtain 15 CEU's (including 2 credits in laws and regulations and 1 credit in integrated pest management) by December 31, 1995, and repeat every 5 years; or 2) take the Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training course, pass the Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator test, and apply for a private applicator license along with the required fee.

Certified Private Applicators, issued licenses between January 10, 1989 and December 31, 1989, must take the private applicator training course, pass the test, and apply for a

private applicator license along with the fee.

Licensed Private Applicators were issued licenses after January 1, 1990. Licensed Private Applicators must obtain 15 CEU's (including 2 in laws and regulations and 1 in integrated pest management) every 5 years.

Licensed Commercial Applicators and Licensed Noncommercial Applicators must obtain a minimum of 5 CEU's each year for license renewal and 15 CEU's (including 2 in laws and regulations and 1 in integrated pest management) every three years.

To find out how many CEU's an applicator currently has, you may call the Texas Department of Agriculture at 1-800-835-5832 and ask for the license recertification section. Be sure to have your license number and social security number ready when you call.

Residents Are Warned Of Telephone Soliciting

Lamar County Sheriff B.J. McCoy has issued a warning to residents to be cautious of phone soliciting.

Sheriff McCoy stated there have been reports of a male making calls in the area to solicit contributions to an organization that is supposed to help law enforcement agencies such as the Sheriff's Department, Police Department and Department of Public Safety.

Sheriff McCoy also advised anyone who may be contacted by phone to contribute to any of these law enforcement agencies to ask for information to be sent in the mail, explaining the organization's intentions in writing.

McCoy stated there are legitimate

organizations that help law enforcement agencies with education, training, research, etc, but they only solicit contributions by mail.

McCoy warned that if anyone calls and solicits a contribution over the phone, to just be cautious.

Remember to ask for all information to be sent to you in the mail or ask for a phone number so that research can be done about the organization's intentions and you will call them back. If the solicitor is unwilling to do either of these things, then residents probably should not contribute any money.

Residents are urged to report such activity to the Sheriff's Office.

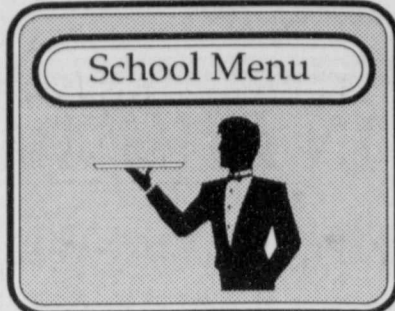
