


We have all witnessed these people before, We have seen them on TV, passed them in the streets, in our cars and down the roads. Some of us have probably yelled at them as they crossed over or passed in front of us. They are runners. Long distance, short distance, marathon runners. They run for the sheer exhileration of it. It is a high that can be attained for those with the stamina and courage to train and stay on a rigorous schedule of high "carbs" and no sugar. For me, this would be sheer torture. For I have a fixation for sugar.

The person or persons I am referring to is Charles and Judy Price . They both were born and raised in this area and have a beautiful home in th Clardy area and have have lived there forn severl years. Mr. Price was employed in the Dallas school system, but opted to return home to Clardy. Charles is a Social Studies and History teacher on the Blossom campus and Judy is a secretary at the PISD school district. They both work out and train religiously(unless I bring homemade cookies or goodies to school and tempt him). Mr. Price has participated in several marathons, including Austin, Houston, Las Vegas and White Rock. Most notably was the New York Marathon last fall. There were over 27,000 runners and he came in number 9,036, which is in the top 3rd of the group. His goal is the Boston Marathon. To run in this you must have time of 3 hours and 25 minutes. His best is 3 hours and 37 minutes. So you see that he is near this. He runs from 5-6 miles a day and tallys up to 35 miles in a weeks time. Judy was there as his cheerleader and best fan. He says the best thing about running, is the stopping.

They eat a lot of pasta and noodles. Absolutely no eggs, very little red meat and a lot of chicken. A lot of cereal with skim milk and no gravies, sauces or whipped cream. Their bread is low fat-reduced and a lot of fruits. Butters of any kind is out and Charles says that any that can remain solid at room temperature is a no-no. For lunch at school, he will have "mare's" milk, (which is a high protein mixed drink) and low fat muffins that he special orders. The recipes that we are featuring are low-fat, low in calories, lots of protein and carbohydrates. Judy says that she like to use the "Pasta Accents" and adds chicken. These are found in the grocery section's frozen food.

The recipes that the Price's are sharing with us this week are all lowfat, reduced calorie, high in protein and carbohydrates. We hope you enjoy these and will see you next week

2 garlic cloves(minced) 1-16 ounce can tomatoes(no salt)

chopped 3 teaspoons chili powder(divided) 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper 1-1/2 cups chopped cooked chicken 1/4 cup plain low-fat yogurt 3 tablespoons chopped green chilies

4 corn tortillas 2 ounces shredded part-skim mozzerella cheese

In a medieum size sauce pan over medium heat, heat 2 teaspoons oil. Add garlic and cook about 1 minute. Add tomatoes, 2 teaspoons chili powder and pepper and simmer uncovered, stirring occasionally, about 30

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine chicken, yogurt, green chilies, green onion and remaining chili powder and mix well.

In a large non-stick skillet, heat remaining oil and add tortillas, one at a time. Cook one minute on each side or until soft.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spoon 1/4 cup sauce into 8 inch square baking dish and spread equal amounts of chicken mixture in center of each tortilla. Fold sides over filling and place tortilla seam-down in baking dish. Pour sauce over tortillas. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake for 30 minutes or until heated through. Makes 4 servings. Approximate calories per serving is 270 with 10 grams of fat

Orange Chicken 1 tablespoon safflower oil 2 whole chicken breast(split, skinned

and boned) 1 cup red pepper(cut into chunks) 2 tablespoons chopped green onion

1 garlic clove(minced) 1 cup orange juice 1 teaspoon prepared mustard

1/4 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon ground black pepper

2 teaspoon cornstarch (dissolved in 2 tablespoons water) 1/2 cup fresh orange sections (cut into bite size peices-1/2 medium)

dium high heat, heat oil and add chicken and brown. Remove from skillet and add redd pepper, green onion and garlic and cook, stirring occasionally for 5 minutes or until Return chicken to skillet and add

orange juice, mustard, salt and pepper; bring to a boil and reduce heat, cover and simmer about 20 minutes. Transfer chicken to serving platter and keep warm.

Add cornstarch to skillet mixture and increase heat to high. Add orange sections and cook, stirring frequently for 1-2 minutes or until thickened. Makes 4 servings. Approximate calories is 220 with 7 grams of fat.

Chicken & Lima Bean Casserole 2 packages (10 ounce) frozen lima beans -1/2 cups cooked chicken(cubed) 1 can(16 ounce) tomatoes(no salt, drained and chopped) 1/4 cup finely chopped onion l garlic clove(minced)

1-1/2 teaspoon dry mustard powder 1 teaspoon Worchestershire sauce 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper cup shredded part-skim mozzerella 1/4 cup fresh whole-wheat bread crumbs

Preheat oven to 375 degrees and prepare beans according to package directions, but without salt. Spray 1-1/2 quart baking dish with non-stiock cooking spray. Place beans in dish.

In a large bowl, combine chicken, tomatoes, onion, garlic, mustard, worchestershire sauce and pepper; mix well. Pour mixture over beans. Sprinkle cheese and bread crumbs over bean mixture. Bake for 30 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Makes 6 servings. Approximate calories is 240 with 5 grams of fat.

Chicken & Vegetable Stir Fry 1/3 cup low-soium chicken broth 2 tablespoon sherry 1 tablespoon low-sodium soy sauce 1 tablespoon cornstarch 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper 2 whole chicken breast(split,skinned and boned-cut into 1/2 inch pieces)

1 tablespoon safflower oil 1 package(6 ounces)frozen snow peas(thawed and drained) 1/4 pound mushrooms-sliced 2 tablespoons chopped green onion

2 garlic cloves-minced 1/4 teaspoon finely chopped fresh gin-In shallow dish, combine chicken

broth, sherry, soy sauce, cornstarch and pepper. Add chicken and toss well. Cover and refrigerate, stirring occasionally for about an hour. In a large non-stick skillet over high

heat, heat oil. Add snow peas, mushrooms, green onion, garlic and ginger and cook 3-5 minutes or until tendercrisp. Remove from skillet and set

Add chicken with marinade to skillet, cook, stirring occasionally for 10 minutes or until chicken is tender and sauce is thickened. If necessary, add about 1/4 cup of water to skillet.

Return vegetables to skillet, cook, stirring frequently for about a minute. Makes 4 servings with 215 calories and 7 grams of fat.

these groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The

agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.



All Licensed Pesticide Applicators Must Be Recertified

By Mike Morrow **County Extension Agent Lamar County**

The U. S. Environmental Protection Agency requires that all licensed pesticide applicators be recertified through continuing education. Confusion exists across the state among applicators regarding how many continuing education units (CEU's) are required by the Texas Department of Agriculture in order to recertify.

Private applicators fall under one of two categories with the Texas Department of Agriculture: Certified Private Applicator or Licensed Private Applicator.

Certified Private Applicators, issued licenses prior to January 10, 1989, have two options to recertify: 1) obtain 15 CEU's (including 2 credits in laws and regulations and I credit in integrated pest management) by December 31, 1995, and repeat every 5 years; or 2) take the Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training course, pass the Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator test, and apply for a private applicator license along with the required fee.

Certified Private Applicators, issued licenses between January 10, 1989 and December 31, 1989, must take the private applicator training course, pass the test, and apply for a

private applicator license along with

Licensed Private Applicators were issued licenses after January 1, 1990. Licensed Private Applicators must obtain 15 CEU's (including 2 in laws and regulations and 1 in integrated pest management) every 5 years.

Licensed Commercial Applicators and Licensed Noncommercial Applicators must obtain a minimum of 5 CEU's each year for license renewal and 15 CEU's (including 2 in laws and regulations and 1 in integrated pest management) every three years.

To find out how many CEU's an applicator currently has, you may call the Texas Department of Agriculture at 1-800-835-5832 and ask for the license recertification section. Be sure to have your license number and social security number ready when you call.

If the solicitor is unwilling to do either of these things, then residents probably should not contribute any
