I tend to think, as I watch some self-confident super-hero at work "right or wrong...you just lost your wife and kid, dummy".

But, even more important, I think, is that the decision as to what truly is wrong or right isn't always clear. Unfortunately, the choices we have to make in life are seldom black and white...but shades and levels of gray!

"I'm not Batman and this isn't Gotham city," I've been known to say to someone wanting me to campaign diligently for what they are convinced is the right thing. But, in my experience it is a rare instance when "right" is completely clearcut.

The song says "I wish it were that simple for me". I believe most of us feel that way.

Most of us are faced not with those life and death situations requiring fast action, but a long string of choices which we must make the best decision we can on. Perhaps we are actually the real heroes of real life...not super-heroes...but ordinary people doing the best they can...and perhaps that is what really counts!

Deport Ball Association Holds Cookoff-Fun Day

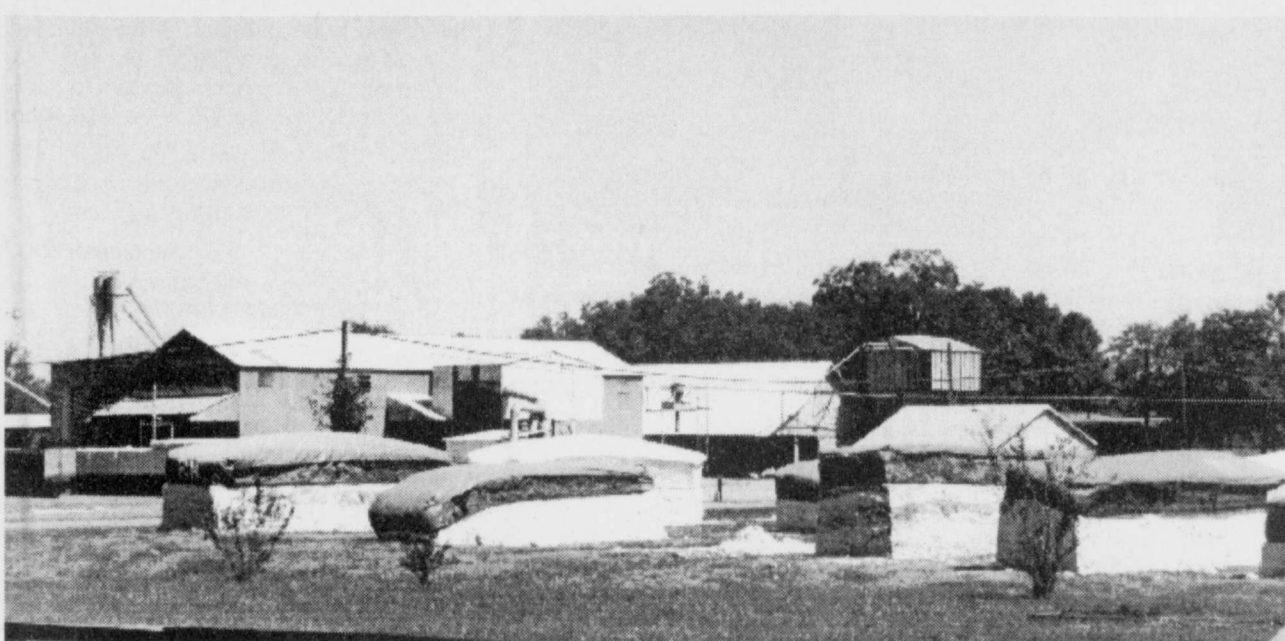
The Deport Baseball Association and the Deport PTO held their first annual Chili Cookoff Saturday, and the weather couldn't have been more perfect for the event.

Season tickets will be available at the door.

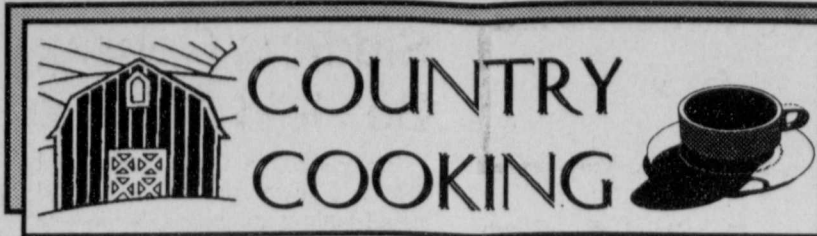
Nettle and Markham are regular participants in major international musical events, combining their separate careers in 1979. They have per-

Blend of the Bayou Casserole
1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese
1 stick of margarine
1 pound of shrimp-peeled
1 bell pepper-chopped
1 large onion-chopped
2 ribs of chopped celery
2 tablespoons margarine
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can drained mushrooms
1 tablespoon garlic salt
1/2 teaspoon tabasco sauce
1/2 teaspoon red pepper
1 pint white crabmeat
1 cup cooked rice
sharp cheese grated and cracker crumbs
Melt cream cheese and oleo. Sauté shrimp, onion, pepper and celery in 2 tablespoons oleo. Add to first mixture and add soup, mushrooms, seasonings, crabmeat and rice. Mix well. Place in 2 quart casserole. Top with cheese and cracker crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees for about 20-30 minutes or until bubbly.

Crabmeat AuGratin
2 stalks celery
1 cup chopped onion
1/4 pound butter
less than 1/4 cup flour
1 can evaporated milk
1 egg
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon red pepper
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
1 pound crabmeat
1/2 pound grated cheese
Sauté onion and celery in onion until melted. Blend in flour well. Pour in milk and stir constantly. Add egg, salt and pepper. Cook for 5 minutes. Put crabmeat on to boil. Pour sauce over crabmeat. Add water to desired consistency. Blend well; pour into a casserole dish or individual dishes. Top with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-15 minutes or until cheese melts.

Shrimp Cheese Spaghetti
4 ribs celery
8 pods garlic
1 white onion
1 can Ro-tel tomatoes
1 small can tomato sauce
1 stick butter
1/2 cup vegetable oil
8 ounces velveeta cheese
2 pounds shrimp
1/4 cup green onion tops
16 ounces spaghetti
Cook spaghetti and set aside. Sauté celery and onion in oil. Add butter and garlic. Cook 5 minutes and add Ro-tel and tomato sauce. Cook 30 minutes on low. Add shrimp and cook 8010 minutes longer. Turn off fire and add chopped velveeta, spaghetti and onion tops. Serves 10-12.

Beignets
1 cup water
1 cup milk
1 egg beaten
3 cups flour
2 tablespoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoon sugar
oil for frying
confectioner's sugar
Mix water, milk and eggs. Add flour, baking powder, salt and 2 teaspoons of sugar; mix until smooth. Drop by spoonfuls into 2 inches of hot oil at 375 degrees; drain on paper towels and sprinkle with confectioner's sugar. Yields about 2 dozen.

Grassroots Democrats Hold Meeting

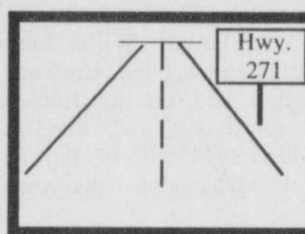

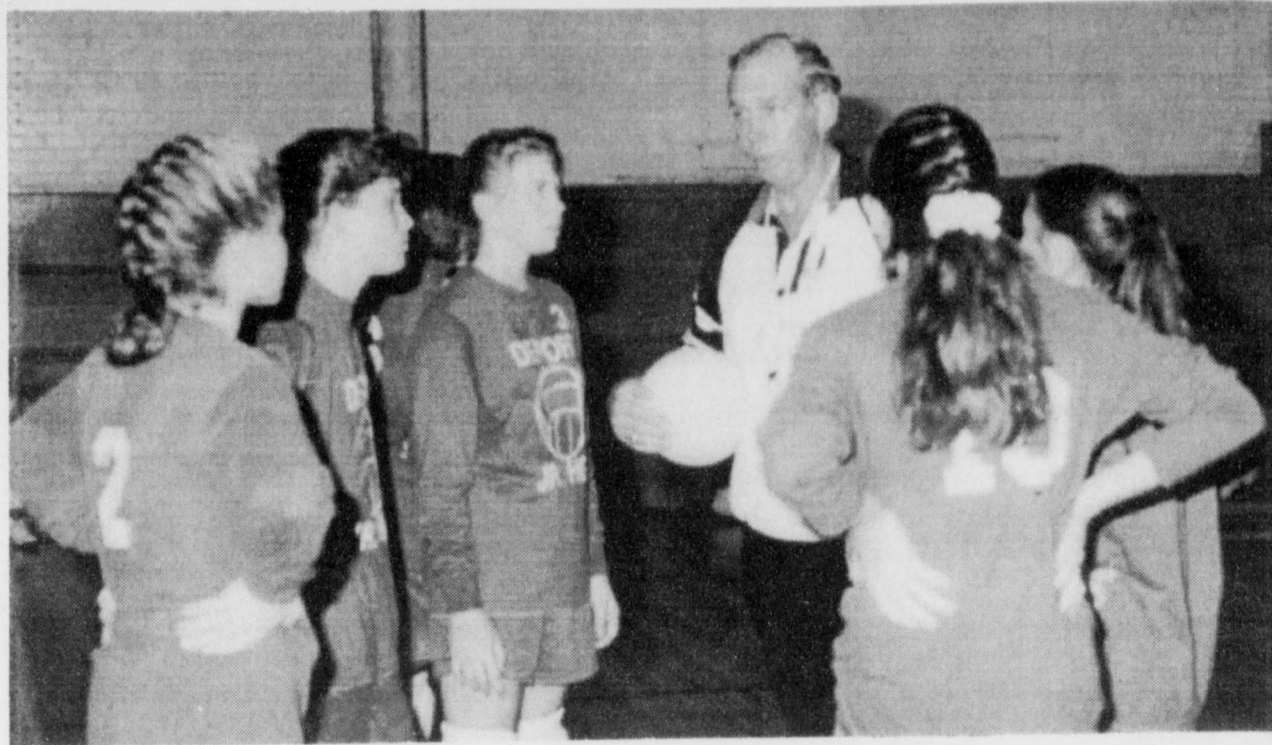
