## Residents Complain To Council About Gravel Street

The Deport City Council had a full house Monday night as a number of residents who live on fourth street in Deport were on hand to complain and cross examine the city council about the condition of their street. The residents complained of dust and rocks in their lawns from the surface of the street. Some residents expressed concern about rocks being thrown by passing vehicles and breaking windows of their automobiles. Councilmembers discussed the issue but were unable to solve the problem since they say the city does not at present have any funds to put a hard surface on the street.

Residents were told that the only way the city could resurface the road was to have an election and pass a bond issue and/or raise taxes to pay for surfacing. The price of building new streets would be approximately \$35 per foot, according to the council, and the city needs to rebuild at least five streets at a price tag of \$440,000, the council

stated. According to the council the city's first priority is to update the city sewer and water lines and then the street issue can be addressed.

If the city repaired the streets and then had to replace a water or sewer line later, the council feels it would be counter-productive.

The process takes time, the council said. The city works toward grant money and this can take as long as three years to accomplish.

Councilman Chad Barnes told residents that the City of Deport has very good roads compared to other cities in the area, and that residents just need to be patient.

The council voted unanimously to award the administrative part of the sewer and water grant for the city to Denise McCormick.

In other business the council passed a resolution to endorse the state's proposal to make Hwy. 271 a four lane highway through the city in the

future. The council also agreed to allow the city's employees to dig a trench through the alleyway north of M.L. Slaton's residence. The purpose of this is to kill some roots of trees on city property. The roots are growing under Mr. Slaton's home, causing foundation damage.

The council agreed to help Jimmie Sparks clean up a lot next to his residence that has been a health and fire hazard for some time.

The issue of placing some of the city's accounts in an interest bearing account at Guaranty Bank, Deport was approved.

The council also agreed to accept an insurance settlement of \$3,372.50 for replacement of the sewer plant flow meter and chart.

Tabled was a proposal to build a sewer line to Kenneth Thomas' residence.

All bills were paid and the financial report was discussed.

## Prairiland Approves Extension Agents As Adjunct Staff

The Prairiland CISD Board of Trustees met in regular session Monday night with one of the major items of business being approval of recognition of county extension agents as adjunct staff members.

This recognition means that County Extension Service Agents will have adjunct staff member status and therefore students not actually on campus but in the company of an adjunct staff member while participating in off-campus activities such as 4-H/Extension educational activities can be counted as "in atten-

dance". Named as Adjunct Staff Members are Michael R. Morrow, Glenda Wise, Kathy A. Demaree and Julie Stone, all Lamar County Extension Agents.

The board approved purchase of a new 59 passenger bus. No action was taken on bills for September, on the financial statement or the tax report and no action was taken on the substitute teacher list for 1994-95.

Minutes from previous meeting were read and approved.

## Fire Prevention Week Is October 10-14

Fire Prevention Week is this week, October 10-14, and Deport School classes Kindergarten and third grade will be taking field trips as part of the week's activities.

On Thursday, October 13, the classes will visit the Deport Fire Department. The Kindergarten

classes will visit the fire station at 9:00 a.m., and the third grade classes will visit at 1:15 p.m.

The Deport Vounteer Fire Department representativs will be on hand to discuss fire prevention with the youngsters.

## Bake Sales and Suppers...In Jeopardy?

It never ceases to amaze me when I hear about what some government official has found important enough to interfere in. It seems that the Texas Department of Health has decided that the Stew cook offs and chili cook offs and pie auctions are "no nos". Some church events will also be effected. Bake sales are also supposed to be on the way out. There is a problem with cooking outside, as well as bringing pies from home to be auctioned or sold. What do you think will happen to picnics in the park? Will children be stopped from bringing their lunches to school? What about concession stands at ballgames and most public events?

I'm sure that the poor guy who has to come out and enforce these addeplated laws is not the person who makes them but he has a job to do like everyone else.

According to the Texas Department of Health, Chapter 437 of the Texas Health & Safety Code as amended by the 73rd Legislature has a number of rules. For instance: Handwashing facilities must have warm running water, soap and disposable towels. Dishwashing facilities must include at least a one minute bath in warm clean water containing 1 TBL. of bleach per gallon of water. I don't have a real problem with that, nor that the public should should use single-use utensils.

But on to the REALLY great rules: To quote "no foods may be sold which were prepared in uninspected private kitchens. This includes home canned fruits and vegetables. No food may be prepared on the site which involves extensive preparation.

Also "The complete operation including storage, preparation and service must be ENCLOSED in a way that prevents the entrance of insects, vermin and filth. That puts an end to open air, or outdoor cooking. There are numerous other minimum standards for temporary food service operations, but these two are the real doozies!

When people enter chili and stew cook offs, they must do all of their cooking and serving in the kitchen where nobody can see them and serve it to customers who are unaware of the conditions under which it was cooked.

Stew and chili cook offs, pie auctions and bake sales are the best way many worthwhile organizations have of raising money. Most of these events are run by people who are trying to help the children in a community by giving them something to do with their time so they won't end up on the streets. Cook offs buy fire trucks for volunteer fire departments. PTOs buy playground equipment for the schools with this money. The underprivileged children and adults might not have Christmas gifts if it were not for pie auctions and bake sales. Admittedly these groups could probably go to well heeled citizens and ask for donations and raise money for these projects, but by having cook offs and auctions and well as other money making events, everyone in the community gets to be a part of helping their community. Some of them are only able to donate their time because that is all they have to donate, but time is a very valuable gift when you are trying to raise money..Another factor is that these suppers and auctions are a very important part of community life-a way for us to come together and celebrate being part of "our town". It is a time for laughter and a time to see people not seen every day. It is a time to "break bread together", a time honored tradition with plenty of Biblical references.

Non-profit organizations are exempt from these rules...that helps quite a few events. But how many groups like cheerleaders, booster clubs, small county fairs, etc. can deal with the paperwork to become a non-profit organization that the state recognizes? Since children grow and change, the parents involved change frequently too...making it a "whole new ballgame" pretty often.

Mr. Dan Sowards of the Texas Department of Health spoke with Nanalee Nichols, my boss, and says that if a church has a family night supper...fine, but if they advertise and put up posters inviting the community and charge for the meal, well, they should have a permit and inspection...and once again, none of those home cooked goodies! He also says that the state isn't out to "get" bake sales and small community affairs, but wants to regulate regular food sales vendors...still, he admits that these bake sales and small community meals DO come under these laws and are technically illegal.

Petitions against this ridiculous situation were suggested but the only people who can do anything about this is the State Legislature, so it has been suggested that citizens bombard their legislators with tons of mail telling them what they think.

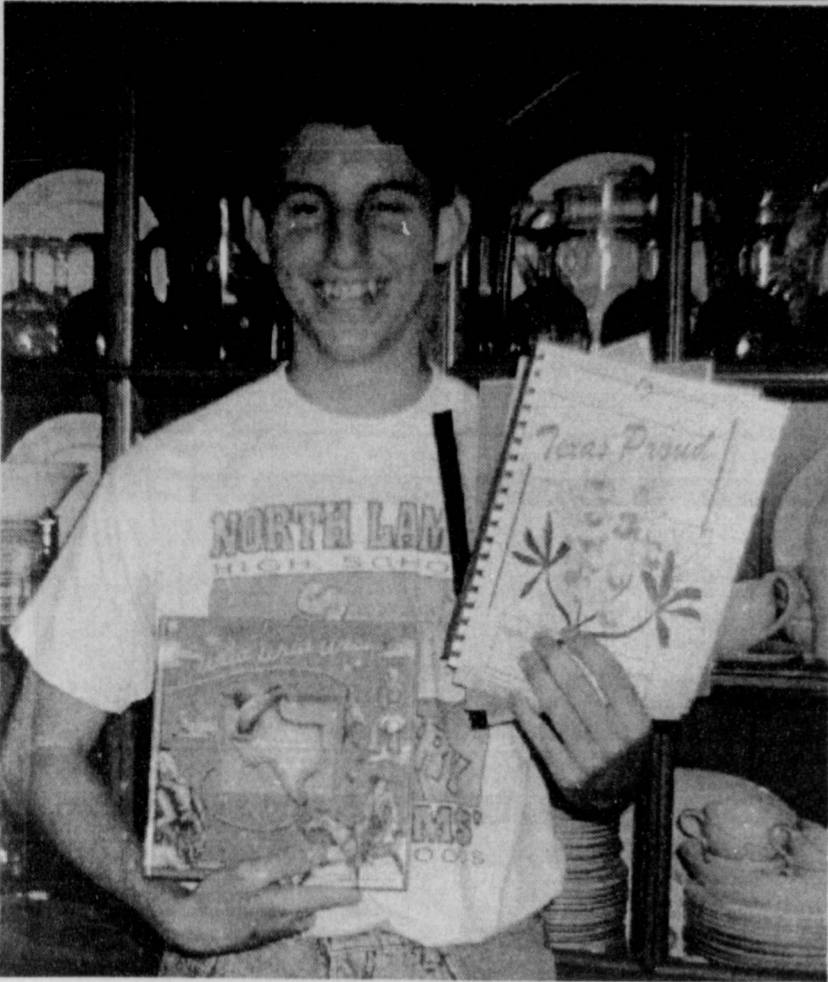
Mr. Dan Sowards suggested to Mrs. Nichols that people should write to Mr. Dennis E. Baker, Deputy Bureau Chief, Food and Drug Safety, Texas Department of Health, 1100 West 49th St. in Austin, Texas 78756 with specific reasons that it would be difficult for various organizations to be non-profit organizations, or why a group or organization should be exempt. That way, a "package" could be put together so that exemptions could be made. (The legislature would have to vote on this, remember)

Since writing this article, I was visited by Mr. H. Joel Sprould, R.S., a very nice seeming, public spirited, sympathetic man, from the Health Department. He understood the animosity we felt for this type of regulation, and, like Mr. Sowards, assured me that they weren't in a hurry to come out and close down our cook offs. He said that they are more interested in larger operations. He also said that his group would probably work with communities to show them the proper way to set up a cook off in a building, but each contestant would need to buy a \$25.00 permit, or the food which is cooked by the contestants could not be eaten by the public. There could, however, be a pot cooked in an approved place on the premises of which the public could partake. Not so with bake sales. They would still be no nos.

There is still hope, though, because there are not enough inspectors to check out the places unless they get a complaint. There will not be enough inspectors until they start getting enough money from permits to start paying additional inspectors.

We are not trying to blow something all out of proportion, but it can happen, it did happen a few weeks ago in Red River County. Before they can have another stew cook off the group holding it will have to comply or gain non-profit organization status.

If you feel that bake sales and fund raising suppers are a basic, healthy part of community life...do something...write to the above address and your elected officials and try to get some exemptions made!

Also during the month, Texas 4-Hers get the chance to visit the State Fair of Texas, some will exhibit animals, while others display their talents in other areas, such as cooking, sewing or some craft area. Lamar County also has a Pumpkin Festival in October and area 4-Hers get to show their skills in the Foods and Nutrition Project. The Lamar County 4-H Food Show is coming up on October 29 and will be held in the Chisum High School Cafeteria. For the past few years, Chisum High School has been nice enough to allow the food show to be held there and by the time some of the Chisum 4-H leaders and kids get through with the cafeteria, it is a sight to behold. tended various camps held at the county, district and state level, attended District and State Round-up for several years and has been involved in many other aspects of the 4-H program in the county.

He is a freshman at Prairieland High School and plans to attend either Texas Tech or Texas A & M when he graduates and go into some ag related field.

The Bread Pudding is delicious and the Fresh Fruit Tart is a fruit pizza dish and he used it in the 1992 4-H Food Show and went on to the District Food Show.

**Mother's Cinnamon Rolls**  
1 packages dry yeast  
1/2 cup warm water  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1 cup hot water  
1/3 cup sugar  
1/4 cup oil  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 egg- beaten  
6 cups flour

Dissolve yeast and sugar in warm water. Let rise in container. In a large pan or bowl, combine hot water, sugar, oil and salt. Cool and add yeast mixture, egg and flour. Blend well. Oil top of dough and cover until mixture doubles in size. Punch down and roll out flat. Spread butter, brown sugar and cinnamon on top of layer. Roll up and cut into rolls. Lay in baking dish and let rise again. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-30 minutes until golden brown. Drizzle with powdered sugar mixed with small amount of milk.

**Grandpa's Beans**  
2 pounds pinto beans-cooked  
1 pound hamburger meat-prepared  
1/2 cup catsup  
1 cup brown sugar  
6 tablespoons chili powder  
1/4 cup vinegar  
1 small can tomato paste  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon pepper  
1 teaspoon celery salt  
1 teaspoon onion salt  
1 teaspoon season salt  
2 teaspoons worchestershire sauce

Combine all ingredients, mix well and heat.

**Quick Fudge**  
3-2/3 cup powdered sugar  
1/2 cup cocoa  
1/4 cup milk  
1/2 cup butter-melted  
1 tablespoon vanilla  
1/2 cup pecans  
2 tablespoons peanut butter(optional)

Microwave first four ingredients on high for three minutes. Remove and stir until smooth. Add vanilla, peanut butter and nuts. Pour into greased 9 x 9 pan. Cool and this will make 20-30 squares, depending on the size of the pieces.

**Turtle's**  
1 tablespoon margarine  
2 tablespoons evaporated milk  
1-14 ounce package of caramel candies  
1-1/2 cups pecans-chopped  
1 large milk chocolate candy bar(4 oz)  
1/3 bar paraffin

In a double boiler, over a low heat melt margarine. Add the evaporated milk and continue to heat. Add the caramels and heat until melted. Stir in pecans. Drop by spoonfuls on a cookie sheet that has been greased with margarine. Allow to cool. Meanwhile, in a double boiler, melt together the candy bar and the paraffin. After the caramel mixture has cooled, dip nut clusters in the chocolate mixture until completely covered. Return to the cookie sheet and allow to cool completely. Makes 20-24 Turtle's.

**Bread Pudding**  
1 cup milk  
1 can of biscuits-cooked and broken into pieces  
2 cups sugar  
1/2 cup butter  
2 eggs  
1 tablespoon butter

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. In medium size bowl, mix biscuit pieces and milk and let set. In a large bowl, beat egg and stir in sugar. Add butter until well blended. Add vanilla and milk mixture. Blend well. Pour into a deep 9 inch pie pan. Cook about 30 minutes or until light brown. Serves 8.

**Fresh Fruit Tart**  
3/4 cup margarine-softened  
1/2 cup confectioner's sugar  
1-1/2 cups of all-purpose flour  
10 ounce vanilla milk chips  
1/4 cup whipping cream  
8 ounces softened cream cheese  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon corn starch  
1/2 cup pineapple juice  
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice  
assorted fresh fruits

Heat oven to 300 degrees. Beat margarine and confectioner's sugar until light and fluffy. Blend in flour. Press mixture into the bottom and sides of a 12 inch round pizza pan. Bake for 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool completely.

Prepare vanilla filling by combining vanilla and whipping cream in a microwave safe bowl and microwave at Hi for 1-1/2 minutes or until chips are melted and mixture is smooth. Beat cream cheese. Spread mixture on cooled crust, cover and chill.

In a small saucepan, combine sugar and cornstarch; stir in juices. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Cool. Meanwhile, slice and arrange fruit on top of the filling. Pour juice mixture over fruit. Cover and chill assembled tart. Serves 10-12.

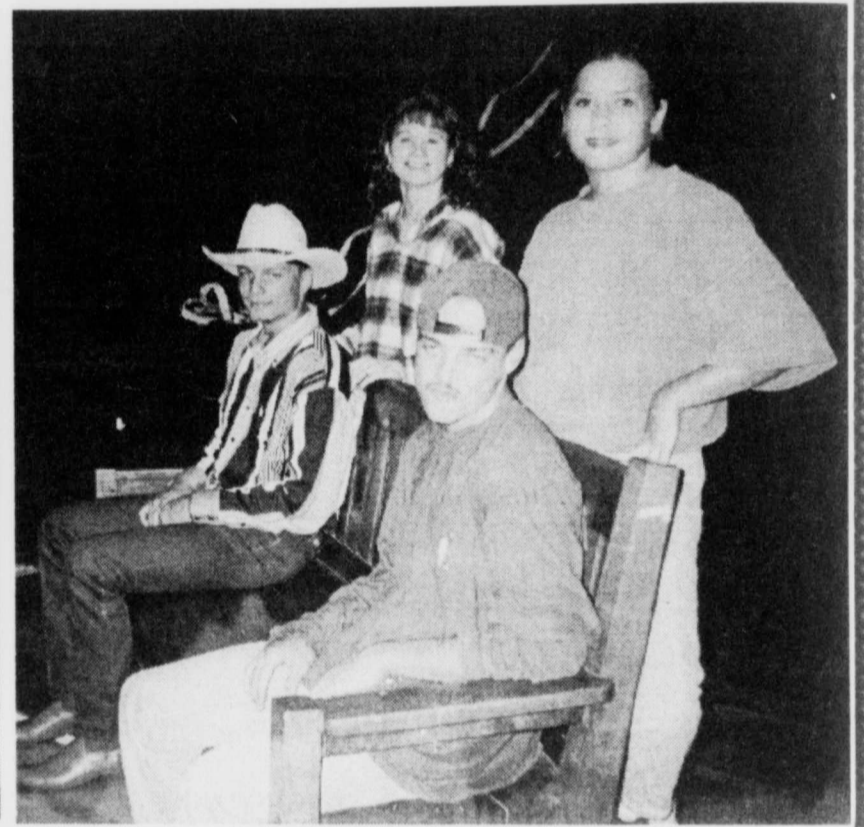
Mandy Babb had 4 kills; Trinity Bowden had 3 kills.

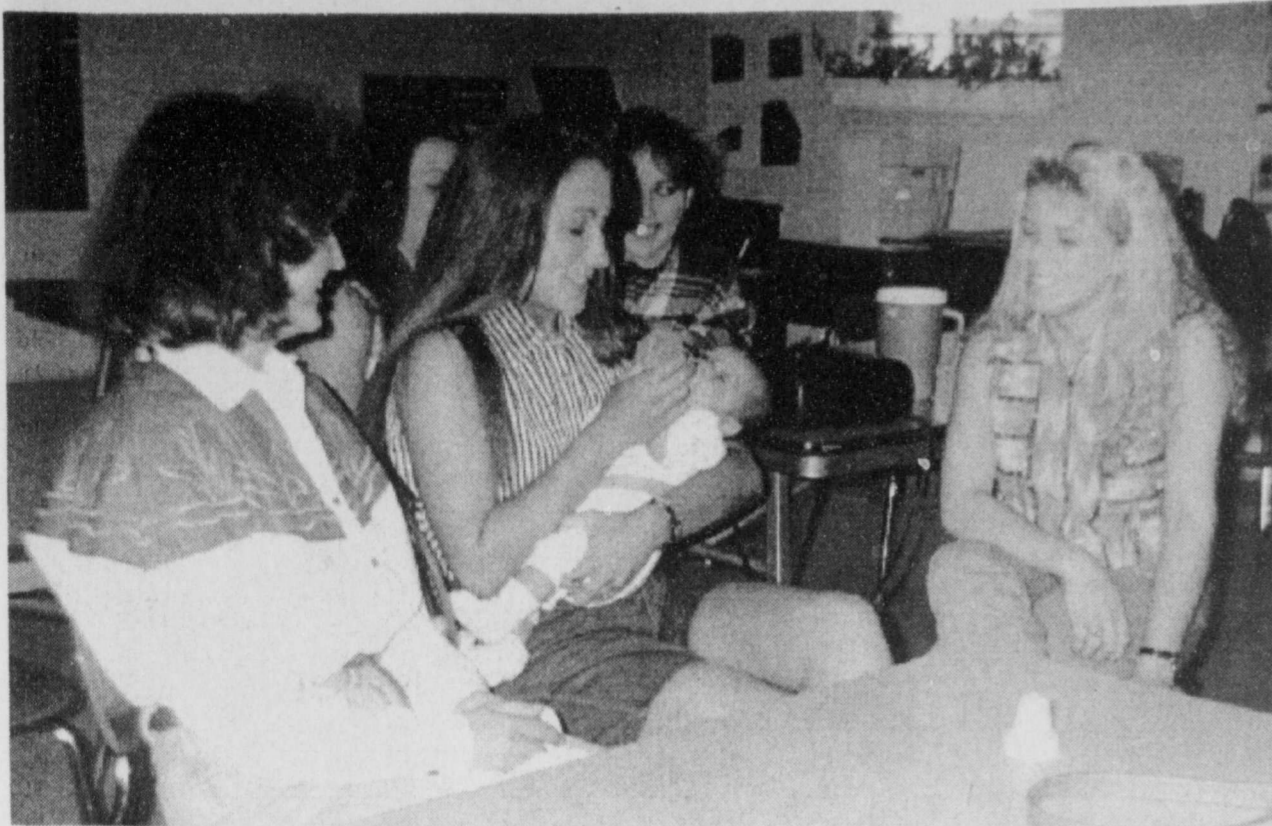

## Navy Lt. Cmdr. Daniel J. Rodgers Is In The Persian Gulf

Navy Lt. Cmdr. Daniel J. Rodgers, son of Joe N. Rodgers of Blossom, TX, is midway through a six-month deployment to the Persian Gulf with Destroyer Squadron 23, embarked aboard the destroyer USS Paul F. Foster.

Rodgers works on the staff of the officer in charge of a three-ship Middle East Force (MEF), currently operating in support of United Nations' sanctions against Iraq. Since arriving in the Persian Gulf, Rodgers has been involved in intercepting ships heading to and from Iraq.

Rodgers and fellow staff members help coordinate the operations of 850 crew members aboard the three ships, including the efforts to monitor the U.N. man dated "No Fly Zone" over Iraq. During the deployment, USS Foster crew members rescued the crew of a merchant ship that had an engine room fire burning out of con-

trol. Using USS Foster's fast inflatable boat, a rescue and assistance team went aboard the stricken vessel and battled the blaze. Within hours the fire was out and the situation under control.

It's people like Rodgers, who make up today's naval forces serving around the world. Whether helping build international coalitions or providing humanitarian assistance, the Navy-Marine Corps team can respond quickly to demonstrate U.S. power and resolve from the sea.

Commander/Destroyer Squadron 23 is home-ported in San Diego.

Rodgers, a 1972 graduate of Prairiland High School, joined the Navy in December 1972. Rodgers is a 1983 graduate of Texas A&M University with a BS degree, and a 1991 graduate of the U. S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, Calif., with a MS degree.

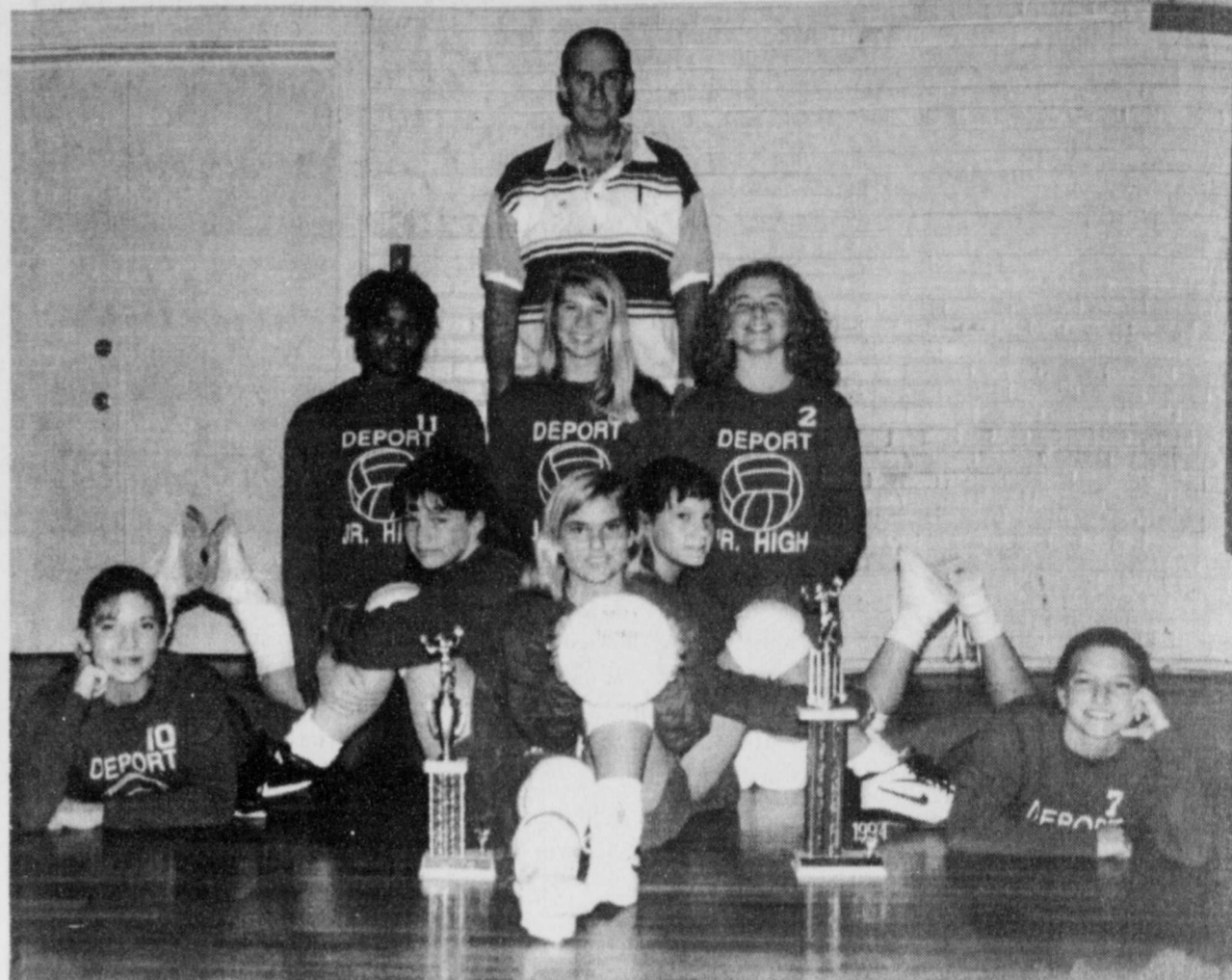
