Residents Complain To

residents who live on fourth street in Deport were on hand to complain and cross examine the city council about the condition of their street. The residents complained of dust and rocks in their lawns from the surface of the street. Some residents expressed concern about rocks being thrown by passing vechicles and breaking windows of their automobiles. Councilmembers discussed the issue but were unable to solve the problem since they say the city does not at present have any funds to put a hard surface on the street.

Residents were told that the only way the city could resurface the road was to have an election and pass a bond issue and/or raise taxes to pay for surfacing.

The price of building new streets would be approximately \$35 per foot, according to the council, and the city needs to rebuild at least five streets at a price tag of \$440,000, the council first priority is to update the city sewer and water lines and then the

street issue can be addressed. If the city repaired the streets and then had to replace a water or sewer line later, the council feels it would be counter-productive.

The process takes time, the council said. The city works toward grant money and this can take as long as three years to accomplish.

Councilman Chad Barnes told residents that the City of Deport has very good roads compared to other cities in the area, and that residents just need to be patient.

The council voted unamimously

to award the administrative part of the sewer and water grant for the city to Denise McCormick.

In other business the council passed a resolution to endorse the state's proposal to make Hwy. 271 a four lane highway through the city in the

The council also agreed to allow the city's employees to dig a trench through the alleyway north of M.L. Slaton's residence. The purpose of this is to kill some roots of trees on city property. The roots are growing under Mr. Slaton's home, causing foundation damage.

The council agreed to help Jimmie Sparks clean up a lot next to his residence that has been a health and fire hazard for some time.

The issue of placing some of the city's accounts in an interest bearing account at Guaranty Bank, Deport was approved.

The council also agreet to accept an insurance settlement of \$3,372.50 for replacement of the sewer plant flow meter and chart.

Tabled was a proposal to build a sewer line to Kenneth Thomas' resi-

All bills were paid and the financial report was discussed.

# Bake Sales and Suppers...In Jeopardy?

By Judy Screws' It never ceases to amaze me when I hear about what some government official has found important enough to interfere in. It seems that the Texas Department of Health has decided that the Stew cook offs and chili cook offs and pie auctions are "no nos". Some church events will also be effected. Bake sales are also supposed to be on the way out. There is a problem with cooking outside, as well as bringing pies from home to be auctioned or sold. What do you think will happen to picnics in the park? Will children be stopped from bringing their lunches to school? What about concession stands at ballgames and most public events?

I'm sure that the poor guy who has to come out and enforce these addlepated laws is not the person who makes them but he has a job to do like everyone else.

According to the Texas Department of Health, Chapter 437 of the Texas Health & Safety Code as amended by the 73rd Legislature has a number of rules. For instance: Handwashing facilities must have warm running water, soap and disposable towels. Dishwashing facilities must include at least a one minute bath in warm clean water containing 1 TBL. of bleach per gallon of water. I don't have a real problem with that, nor that the public should should use single-use utensils.

But on to the REALLY great rules: To quote "no foods may be sold which were prepared in uninspected private kitchens. This includes home canned fruits and vegetables. No food may be prepared on the site which involves extensive preparation.

Also "The complete operation including storage, preparation and service must be ENCLOSED in a way that prevents the entrance of insects, vermin and filth. That puts an end to open air, or outdoor cooking. There are numerous other minimum standards for temporary food service operations, but these two are the real doozies!

When people enter chili and stew cook offs, they must do all of their cooking and serving in the public eye. This is unlike the restaurants in which we eat all the time. They are allowed to cook food in the kitchen where nobody can see them and serve it to customers who are unaware of the conditions under which it was cooked.

Stew and chili cook offs, pie auctions and bake sales are the best way many worthwhile organizations have of raising money. Most of these events are run by people who are trying to help the children in a community by giving them something to do with their time so they won't end up on the streets. Cook offs buy fire trucks for volunteer fire departments. PTOs buy playground equipment for the schools with this money. The underpriviledged children and adults might not have Christmas gifts if it were not for pie auctions and bake sales. Admittedly these groups could probably go to well heeled citizens and ask for donations and raise money for these projects, but by having cook offs and auctions and well as other money making events, everyone in the community gets to be a part of helping their community. Some of them are only able to donate their time because that is all they have to donate, but time is a very valuable gift when you are trying to raise money.. Another factor is that these suppers and auctions are a very important part of community life-a way for us to come together and celebrate being part of "our town". It is a time for laughter and a time to see people not seen every day. It is a time to "break bread together", a time honored tradition with plenty of Biblical references.

Non-profit organizations are exempt from these rules...that helps quite a few events. But how many groups like cheerleaders, booster clubs, small county fairs, etc. can deal with the paperwork to become a non-profit organization that the state recognizes? Since children grow and change, the parents involved change frequently

too...making it a "whole new ballgame" pretty often.

Mr. Dan Sowards of the Texas Department of Health spoke with Nanalee Nichols, my boss, and says that if a church has a family night supper...fine, but if they advertise and put up posters inviting the communityand charge for the meal, well, they should have a permit and inspection...and once again, none of those home cooked goodies! He also says that the state isn't out to" get" bake sales and small community affairs, but wants to regulate regular food sales vendors ...still, he admits that these bake sales and small community meals DO come under these laws and are technically illegal.

Petitions against this ridiculous situation were suggested but the only people who can do anything about this is the State Legislature, so it has been suggested that citizens bombard their legislators with tons of mail telling


Mr. Dan Sowards suggested to Mrs. Nichols that people should write to Mr. Dennis E. Baker, Deputy Bureau Chief, Food and Drug Safety, Texas Department of Health, 1100 West 49th St. in Austin, Texas 78756 with specific reasons that it would be difficult for various organizations to be non-profit organizations, or why a group or organization should be exempt. That way, a "package" could be put together so that exemptions could be made. (The legislature would have to vote on this, remember)

Since writing this article, I was visited by Mr. H. Joel Sprould, R.S., a very nice seeming, public spirited, sympathetic man, from the Health Department. He understood the animosity we felt for this type of regulation, and, like Mr. Sowards, assured me that they weren't in a hurry to come out and close down our cook offs. He said that they are more interested in larger operations. He also said that his group would probably work with communities to show them the proper way to set up a cook off in a building, but each contestant would need to buy a \$25.00 permit, or the food which is cooked by the contestants could not, be eaten by the public. There could, however, be a pot cooked in an approved place on the premises of which the public could partake. Not so with bake sales. They would still be no nos.

There is still hope, though, because there are not enough inspectors to check out the places unless they get a complaint. There will not be enough inspectors until they start getting enough money from permits to start paying additional inspectors.

We are not trying to blow something all out of proportion, but it can happen, it did happen a few weeks ago in Red River County. Before they can have another stew cook off the group holding it will have to comply or gain non-profit organization status.

If you feel that bake sales and fund raising suppers are a basic, healthy part of community life...do something...write to the above address and your elected officials and try to get some exemptions made!


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
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# Patriots Fall Hard To Powerful Honey Grove Warriors


The Third quarter was played evenly except for the third of Cedrick Stevenson's touchdown catches, but the tired Patriots could not turn the

In J. V. action, the Lady Pat team won in three games: 12-15, 15-10,





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# From The Pastor's Heart




