

Jo Ann Howard makes campaign stop in Deport

Jo Ann Howard, East Texas District I Congressional candidate for Democratic Nomination, visited Deport last Thursday and was honored at a coffee hosted by several friends. 

Stroke symptoms require fast action

Stroke symptoms require fast action, just like a heart attack.

'Recognizing stroke symptoms and reacting promptly can make a difference," said Dr. James Killian, professor of neurology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Strokes are a loss of circulation to the brain caused by a closed off brain artery or by a blood clot that has moved from the heart or large arteries in the neck. Ruptured blood vessels in the brain can also cause strokes.

According to Killian, any of the following stroke symptoms warrant an immediate trip to an emergency room: loss of strength in an arm, leg or both, loss of speech, or a sudden severe and unexplained headache.

"With these symptoms, it is crucial for physicians to determine what is wrong and to begin treatment to prevent worsening or a second stroke," Killian said. "The goal is to minimize damage to brain cells caused by loss of oxygen and to lessen the amount of

impairment."

Emergency room physicians will monitor the heart rate, regulate the blood pressure and take an x-ray of the brain called a CT scan.

"The CT scan is the gold standard in stroke evaluation," Killian said. "If it shows no bleeding in the brain, then blood thinners may be started to avoid further damage. With bleeding, medications are used to cut down swelling

and surgery is considered." Symptoms indicating a possible stroke include:

* Numbness or odd sensations on one side of the body or face * Temporary loss of vision, double

vision or slurred speech * Dizziness or loss of balance. With these symptoms, talk to your physician as soon as possible and go to the hospital if they persist.," he

Symptoms that go away within 24, Killian says are called "transient ischemic attack" and are often a stroke warning sign. Even if symptoms clear up, there is still some circulation problem that needs to be checked by a

Stroke risk factors include previous transient ischemic attack, high blood pressure, heart or carotid artery disease, and life-style factor such as high cholesterol, excess weight and lack of exercise, smoking and excess alcohol use.

Within a year or two, Killian expects to see wider use of experimental clotbusters currently under study at major medical centers. The drugs appear to lessen the severity of stroke but must be given within three to six hours of the onset.

"Future treatment of stroke with these drugs will depend upon patients coming to the ER quickly, "he said. "All the more reason to recognize the seriousness of these symp-



Motorists urged to get in the habit of buckling up kids

Texans are being encouraged to give their children a gift of love by making it a habit to buckle them up whenever they ride in vehicles.

Co ordinated Campaign Safe and Sober began stepping up its efforts in February to educate motorists on the law relating to child safety restraints and to crack down on violators. About 40 Texas communities are involved in the campaign to save lives through a combination of law enforcement, public information announcements and distribution of educational mate-

Depending on the town or city and the time of year, Campaign Safe and Sober focuses on the use of safety belts, speed and DWI, said Marlene Albers, Campaign Safe and Sober coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The law enforcement component is implemented through Selective Traffic Enforcement Programs (STEPS), where police officers conduct periodic, highly visible, enhanced enforcement of

particular laws. The statewide campaign is supported by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Texas Department of Transportation, numerous local law enforcement agencies and organizations.

"When used correctly, child passenger safety seats are 71 percent effective in preventing fatalities and 67 percent effective in preventing serious injury," according to Janie Harris, Extension passenger safety specialist. "Minor injuries are prevented 50 percent of the time when children are in safety seats.'

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that more than 265 children under age 5 were saved as a result of child passenger safety restraints in 1992. About 2,061 lives were saved by child restraints from 1982 to 1992. Experts believe that if child safety restraints were used and used correctly with all children under age 5, about 50,000 serious injuries would be prevented and 455 lives would be saved each

Surprisingly, adults buckle themselves up more often than they buckle up their children, said Susan Bryant, chief of Traffic Safety Section for the Texas Department of Transportation in Austin.

We think that's directly related to their understanding and their knowledge of the laws." Bryant said. "We're not sure that Texans and parents are truly aware of how important it is to buckle up their children as well as themselves."

People are aware of the primary law in Texas related to safety belts -- the driver and the front seat passenger must wear a safety belt and wear it correctly, she said. What many are not aware of is that a child under the age of 4 must be either in a car seat or a safety belt and a child under the age of 2 must be in a child safety seat.

A number of studies have been conducted to determine why parents are not buckling up their children, Bryant said. Three common factors stand out - adults may not be aware of the law, they consider that there is little risk when they're only going for a short distance and they complain

that it is not always easy to keep a child in a safety belt or a safety seat.

Campaign Safe and Sober will focus on the law relating to child safety protection to help people understand the danger of riding unrestrained, and encourage parents to place children in safety restraints on their first car trip from the hospital to their home.

One of the least known child vehicle safety laws is that children 12 and under are prohibited from riding in the bed of a truck traveling at a speed of more than 35 miles per hour. In 1994, eight children were killed in Texas while riding in the bed of a pickup, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety

Where should children ride? They should be safely restrained in the cab of the pickup. Traffic safety experts say that the back of a vehicle is safer for young children than the front seat, especially in cars with air bags.

The air bag that saves your life could kill your child." said Bill Priest, retired DPS officer and campaign spokesperson for the Abilene area.

Adults should never put a rear facing child seat, those used with infants, in the front seat of a car with an air bag, Priest added. The back of a rear facing child seat would sit very close to the dashboard and could be struck with enough force from the air bag to cause serious or even fatal injuries to a baby.

It only takes three seconds to buckle up and just a few minutes to secure a child, Albers said. " A life is worth that amount of time."






