
fill up with the mixture. Then I could throttle back and take the good, loose mulch to an area that could use it. I would speed up again, and slowly the hay could sift out onto the ground.

Jerry Jones, noted banker, dies March 15

Respected Titus County banker Jerry Jones, age 69, died Friday, March 15 at Titus Regional Medical Center following a battle with cancer.

86th YEAR, No. 41

Until 1992, Mr. Jones chaired the board of Talco State Bank and served on the board of Guaranty Bancshares Inc. and Guaranty Bank.

At the time of his retirement, Mr. Jones 46 years of experience in the banking business.

Services were held at 3:30 p.m. Saturday at Talco Church of Christ. Dub Mowery and John David Wright, Church of Christ ministers, officiated. Burial followed in Talco Cemetery

A native of Talco, he attended Talco High School and is a graduate of Texas Christian University. He later joined the U.S. Army and served as a staff sergeant in the finance corps.

He began his banking career at Trinity State Bank in Ft. Worth He served as a loan and discount clerk and was promoted to loan officer in 1949. In 1950 he joined the Texas Banking Department as an assistant examiner

A year later he returned home to serve as vice-president of Talco State Bank, working alongside his father, Felix Jones, who served as president of the bank until 1964 and chairman until 1970.

It was in 1964 Mr. Jones became president at Talco and served in that capacity until 1988.

Mr. Jones began his association with Guaranty Bank in 1969 when he was elected as a director and chairman of the board. In 1979, he became vice-chairman and held that post un-

til his retirement.

In addition, Mr. Jones served as chairman of Guaranty Bancshares Inc., a multi-bank holding company whose subsidiaries include Guaranty Bank, Talco State Bank, Guaranty Leasing Company and the Guaranty Co.

Mr. Jones was born April 25, 1926, a son of the late Felix and Ruth Jones. He was also preceded in death by brothers Boyd and F.A. Jones and a daughter, Tracie.

Surviving are his wife, Dorothy Shaddix Jones; two sons and their families, Rusty and Carla Jones and their children Josh and Angela and Barry and Niki Jones and their daughter Taylor.

To commemorate the transition to ETMC Clarksville the public was invited to the ceremony.

Refreshments, giveaways and door prizes and remarks from various people highlighted the well-attended event.

The affiliation agreement was announced in early February by James Wood Red River General Hospital board president and Elmer G. Ellis, ETMC Regional Healthcare System president and chief executive officer.

Following state licensure, the ETMC System will begin operations at the Clarksville hospital April 1.

Under terms of the agreement, affairs for ETMC Clarksville, which is licensed for 52 beds, will be guided by a board of directors consisting of representatives of the ETMC System and Clarksville/Red River County community leaders.

Wood cited the ETMC System's proven record in managing rural hospital as the primary reason the ETMC System emerged in the the search for a larger affiliate.







Overuse harmful to child athletes

Some children participating in athletics may be pushing too hard, too soon.

"There are young athletes who get overuse injuries because they're pushed too hard or too fast by a parent or coach, and they may not have been taught proper technique," said Dr. Albert C. Hergenroeder, chief of adolescent medicine and sports medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. For instance, baseball pitchers may develop shoulder problems at a young age by throwing too many pitches, especially if their technique is poor.

In some cases these injuries can cause life-long problems, Some injuries can force athletes to the sidelines, causing them to miss competitions. Other athletes drop out of sports all together if the pain persists and is not treated. Overuse injuries can occur in athletes in any sport where there are repetitive motions, including gymnastics, softball and tennis. A key to avoiding injuries is good

coaching. Overuse -injuries often develop

because athletes are overtraining and in some cases, not using proper technique. I is up to the coaches to ensure that athletes are not putting in too much time on the practice field.

It is up to parents to get more involved if they feel their child is not learning properly by going to practice and helping to reinforce what the coach is teaching. Sitting down to talk with a coach about workouts can also be beneficial for all involved, as can discouraging overtraining at home.

Overuse injuries may be reduced by urging children to participate in different sports throughout the year, and building rest periods into their athletic schedule.


Hergenroeder, who is also chief of adolescent medicine at Texas Children's Hospital, says," the constant day-to-day grind of training programs for growing teenagers can lead o injuries and burnout. The body needs time to recover, and rest periods are necessary to allow the body to heal and stay healthy. Young athletes can be competitive in athletics without training year round, although certain sports, such as swimming, gymnastics and ballet do train all year.' Sports are the fourth leading cause

of injury to adolescents, behind automobile accidents, alcohol-related incidents and firearms. Although, they are a distant fourth they could be even further down the list if physicians, coaches, parents and athletes themselves recognize their seriousness and work together to prevent them.

Guaranty Bank receives perfect score from SBA

Arthur B. Scharlach, Jr., President of Guaranty Bank, Mt. Pleasant, received word from the Texas Department of Banking that a February 28th article in The Wall Street Journal on Texas banks and how they ranked on lending to small firms had included them and given them a perfect score on the Small Business Administrations analysis scale.

The article begins: "Many banks say small-business loans are dear to their hearts, but for borrowers, it often seems a case of unrequited love.

So the Small Business Administration is trying to act as a matchmaker.

In a major analysis of lending practices, the agency has rated every lender in the nation-including Texas' total of 959, more than any other state's to determine which ones are small-business friendly"

The goal is to help small business owners target which bank to apply for a loan to.

Using banks' quarterly regulatory filings, the SBA created a small-business scorecard for the year ended June 1995. Defining small-business loans as loans to business of less than \$250,000, the SBA looked at a variety of measures, including the dollar amount and total number of such loans, as well as the ratio of those loans to total assets and to business

loans in general. Points were then assigned based on the figures.

The article says " Guaranty Bank, for example, makes its home in Mount Pleasant, a small town in the northeast corner of Texas. 'Our bank was chartered to make loans,' says Art Scharlach, chief executive of Guaranty Bank. 'We concentrate on small business lending. It's an integral part of our economy and an area that most lending institutions stay away from.

Indeed, with assets of around \$172 million, the bank has \$50.4 million of small-business loans under \$100,000 on it's books, according to SBA data, a very high ration. Mr. Scharlach says the loan portfolio is a mix of agri-business, Manufacturing, retail and service companies.'

The story continues that "Mr. Scharlach is proud that the bank, founded in 1913, continued to make loans during the state's rough economic times during the 1980's. 'The only way out of it was reinvestment," he says.'

Guaranty Bank-Mt. Pleasant captured a perfect score of 50, the highest possible on the SBA scale.

The Small Business Administration sent a letter of congratulations to the bank for their work.


The group has just returned from Festival 96 in Waco where 12 kids attended. The theme was "Making America a Better Place, One PIP At A Time.



The United Methodist Women met March 18 in the fellowship hall at the church for its regular meeting.




