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## Report says

"Small Schools Work Better"
1996 issue of Texas Center for Educational Research entited "Sizing seems to work better because people seem to flourish better in environments where they have some sense of
control or influence. Breaking orge control or infuence. Breaking orgaunit contributes to greater efficiency and adaptability, the article says. The report stated that at the school level it is important to create a smaller environment wherceachers and stu-
dents can come to know one another The article gave some examples of schools in the U.S. that are using the "School-within-a-school concept to break their schoors and classes into
smaller Units. One examplecited was that of the city of Philadelphia which has reorganized its 22 neighborhood high schools into "charter schools" of 200 to 400 students to raise academic standards and improve the personal
relationships between teachers and relations.
