Runoffs elect Blackburn and Lovett Locally

Tuesday's runoff elections had some close races statewide and a very close race locally.

The Sixth District Judge's run off between Jim D. Lovett and Dean Loughmiller was "neck and neck" until the final vote tally was in. When it was over Jim D. Lovett had won with 4,475 votes to Dean Loughmiller's 4,244, a margin of 231.

The runoff for Precinct One Commissioner, Lamar County between incumbent Troy Owens and Mike

Blackburn came out with Blackburn winning with 1044 votes to Owens' 640, to put a new commissioner in that office.

Max Sandlin won the runoff against Jo Ann Howard for U.S. Representative.

Victor Morales won against John Bryant in his bid the Democratic right to run against Phil Gramm in the U.S. Senate.

Deport Council discusses streets, water lines, hydrants and city hall

What will it cost to fix the streets and add water and sewer lines to the most needed areas of the city of Deport? That was the question open for debate Monday night at the city council meeting.

For months some citizens have complained about their streets, others have requested new water lines and others have requested fire plugs be added for fire protection and to help insurance rates.

The city council estimated that the projects could total as much as \$500 to satisfy everyone's needs.

The City of Deport is also in violation of the American Disabilities Act, signed into law in July of 1990 by President George Bush.

The American Disabilities Act, the council reports, requires that Deport City Hall be completely accessible to anyone disabled. Part of the Monday

night discussion included the possibility of building a new City Hall that would meet all ADA standards.

The council agree to retain the services of a financial advisor to determine the best procedure to follow in satisfying all or most of the needs for streets, sewers, water lines, fire hydrants and compliance at City Hall with regulations.

In other business they agreed to post signs to make motorists aware of children playing along the streets in the city of Deport.

They approved the audit report from McClanahan and Holmes.

The month of April was proclaimed as Fair Housing Month.

Council members drew for position on the May election ballot.

All bills were paid and the financial report was approved. The minutes were also read and approved.

The Deport Ball League President Randy Boren reports that the league had a very successful fund raising weekend in conjunction with the chili cookoff. Their auction held Friday night, brought in \$5200, the hamburger supper took in a little over \$1000.

On Saturday their games and events brought in \$2400.

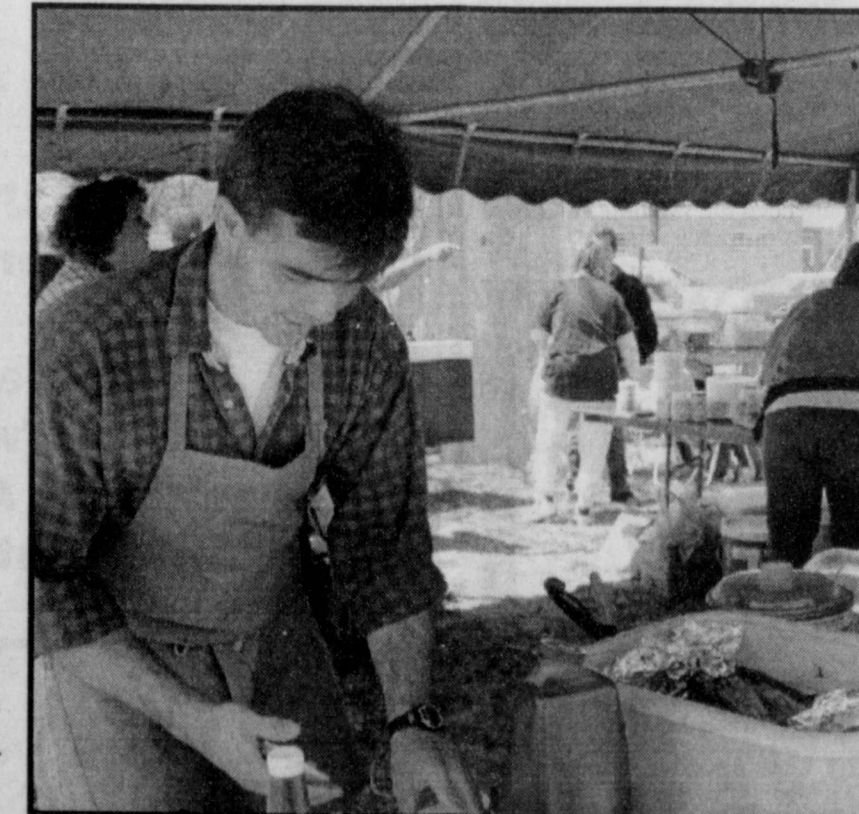
This brings the total to \$8600, before expenses.

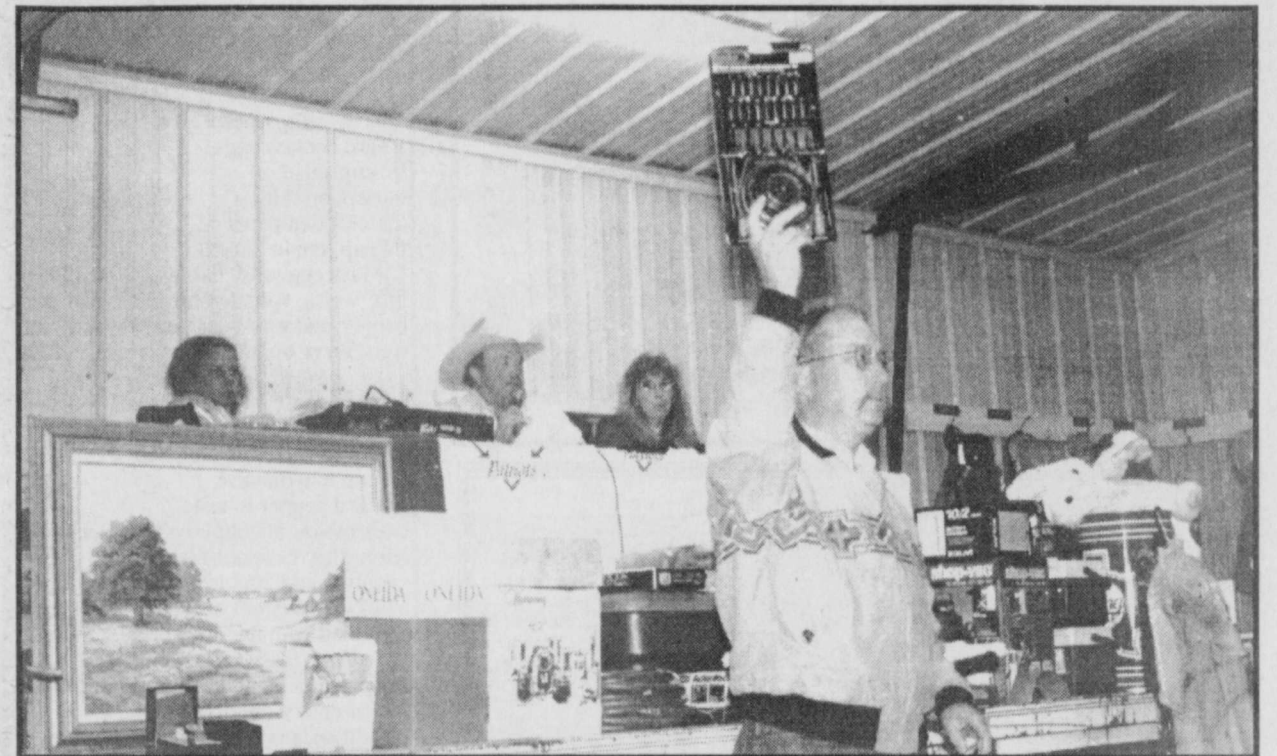

After executive session Kent Wright was hired as district computer technician to start at first year teacher schedule and with an eleven month contract.


The minutes from previous meeting were read and approved, the bill payment was approved as was the financial statement.

Egg Salad Dressing
 5 hard cooked eggs
 1/2 cup salad oil
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 1/4 cup lemon juice
 Mash egg yolks in bowl. Add oil and mix well. Add lemon juice, salt and pepper and chopped egg whites. Stir well; serve on lettuce leaves.

Shrimp Salad
 1 cup large shrimp-cooked and chopped
 1 cup chopped celery
 3 hard boiled eggs-chopped
 1/2 cup mayonnaise
 salt and pepper to taste
 Combine all ingredients. Serve on lettuce leaves or stuff large tomato. For variation add 2 tablespoons pf chopped pickles pr 2 large avacados, diced and sprinkled with the juice of 1/2 lemon.

Hot Baked Chicken Salad
 2 cups chicken-cooked and chopped
 2 cups celery-chopped
 1/2 cup pecans or almonds
 1 can water chestnuts
 1 cup salad dressing
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoons minced onion
 2 tablespoon lemon juice
 1/2 cup grated cheese
 1 cup potato chips-crushed
 2 hard boiled eggs
 Combine all ingredients, except cheese

and chips. Pour into greased casserole dish. Sprinkle cheese and chips over top. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes. Can substitute 3/4 cup cream of chicken soup for 3/4 cup cream of chicken soup for 3/4 cup mayonnaise.

Baked Deviled Egg Casserole
 6 hard boiled eggs
 2 teaspoons prepared mustard
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 3 tablespoons plus 3/4 cup sour cream
 2 tablespoons butter
 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
 1/3 cup chopped onion
 1/4 cup chopped pimiento
 1 can cream of mushroom soup
 1/2 cup grated cheese
 Halve eggs lengthwise; remove yolks. Mash yolks, mustard and salt together with 3 tablespoons sour cream. Fill egg whites with yolk mixture. Melt butter in large skillet. Saute pepper and onion until tender. Remove from heat; stir in pimiento, soup and remaining 3/4 cup sour cream. Place 1/2 of soup mixture in 1-1/2 quart shallow baking dish. Arrange eggs, cut side up, in single layer on top. Pour on remaining soup mixture. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until heated through. This may be made in advance and refrigerated until ready to bake. Just bake a few minutes longer. Serves 12.

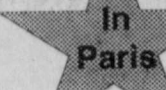

Traveling to Cooper to face the Lady Bulldogs in another double-header on April 1st, the Lady Pats would fall again in both games 14-15 and 3-16.

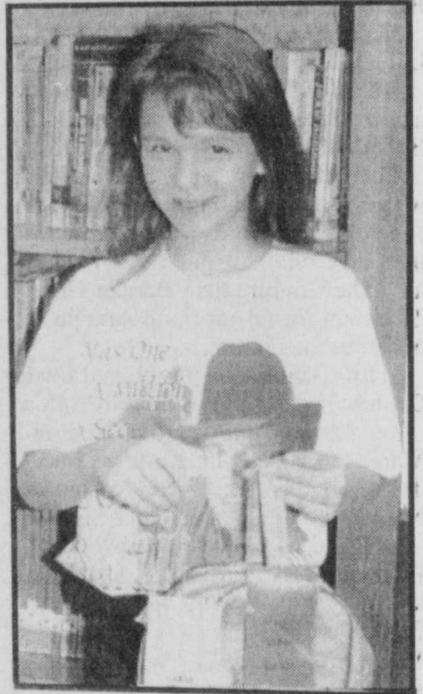
Cooper held the Lady Pats scoreless in the first inning and would run

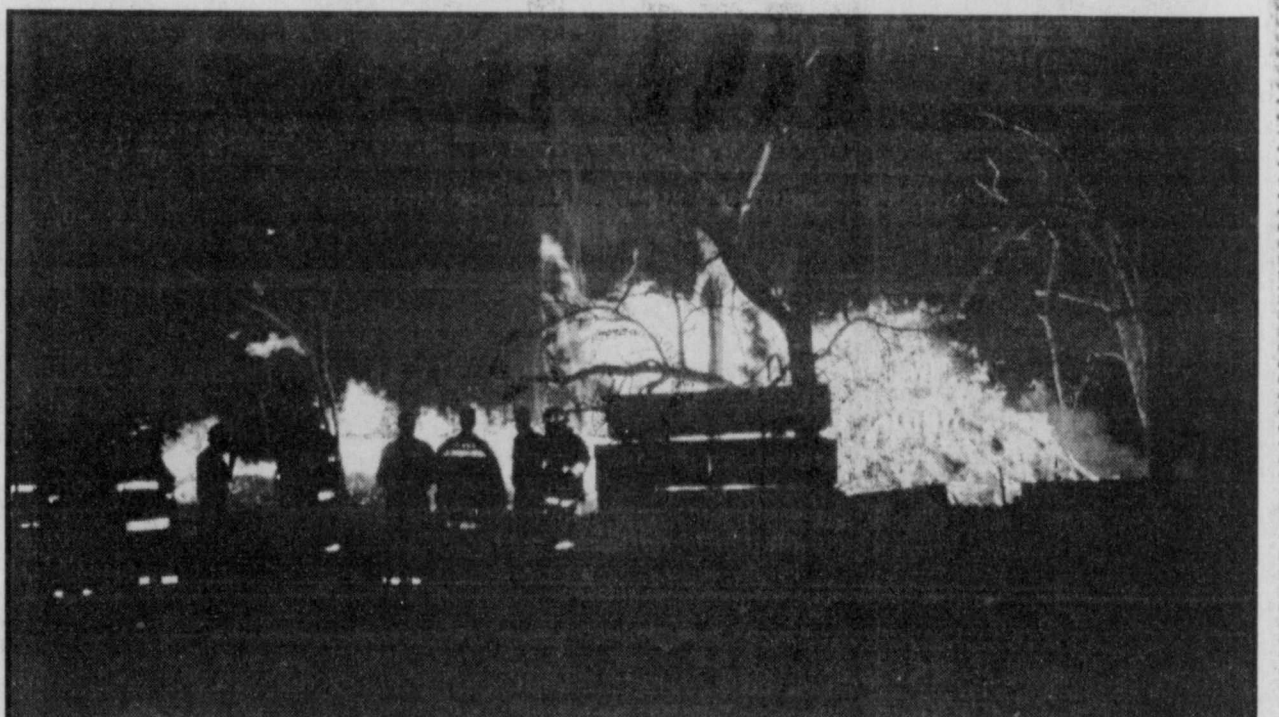

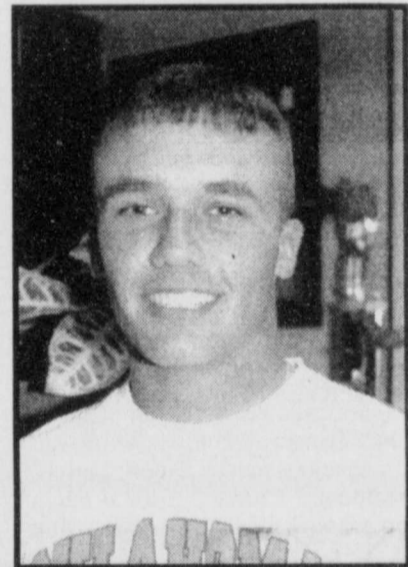
Prairiland Senior to play baseball in Europe this summer

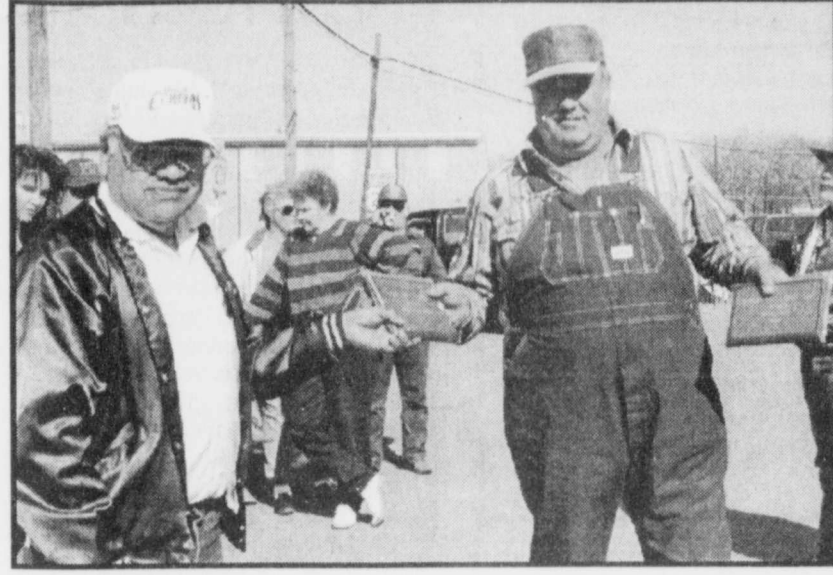

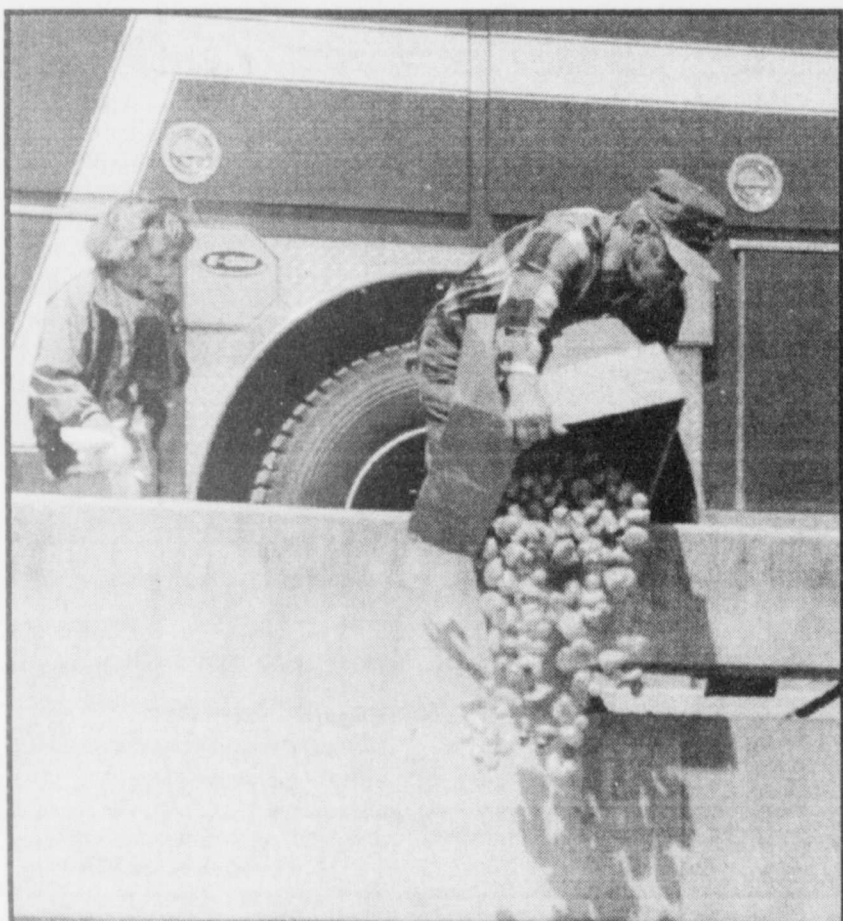

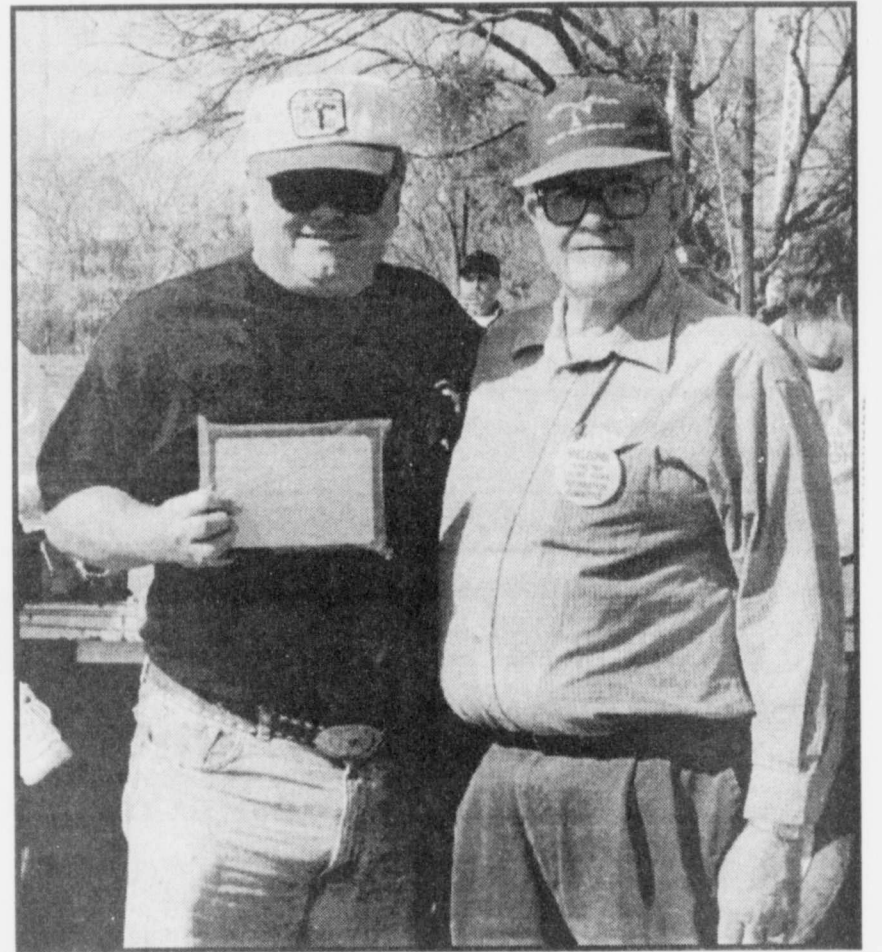

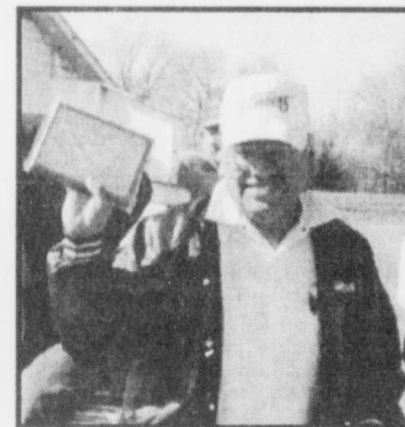

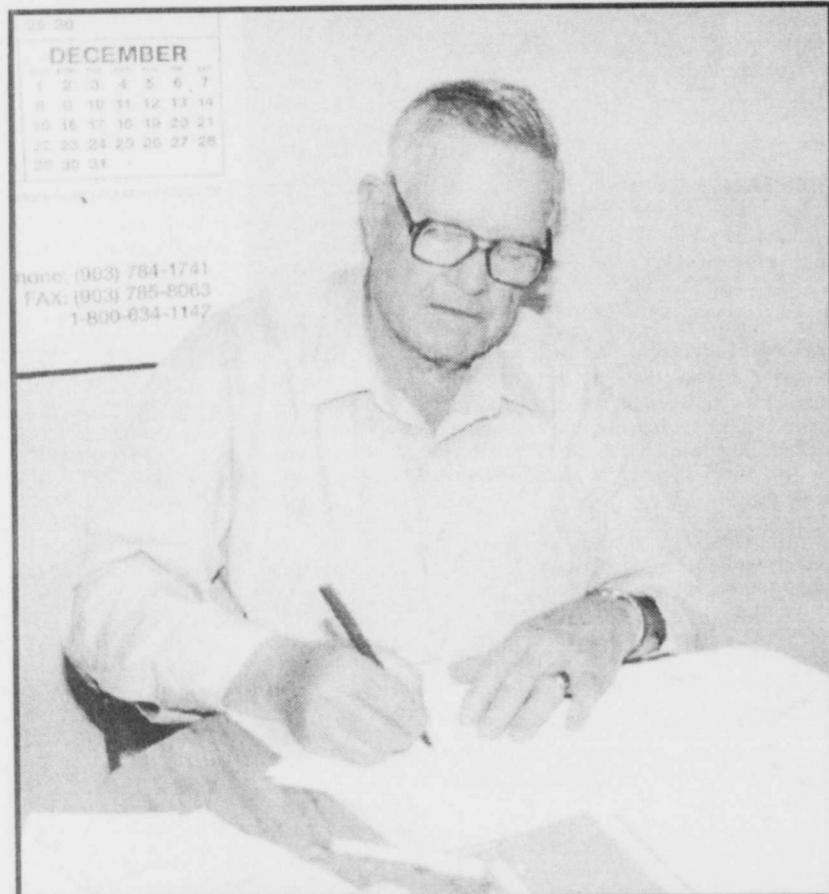
