Then we would take them to the Talco Oil Fields, the Blossom Mineral Well and museum, and Detroit's Garner house and main street.

In Paris there would be a drive around tour, the Maxey House, and even the residential neighborhoods, which look so very different from European neighborhoods and then the monument with the cowboy boots on it would conclude the tour. If they had more time we could range farther afield and take them to the circus section of the Hugo cemetery, on to Idabel to the Indian Museum there and even up to Broken Bow park or down through the Piney woods and to Jefferson.

The whole exercise set us to contemplating that most of us think we live in a colorless, boring area....but through the eyes of visitors our world is beautiful and unique. Try riding around and looking at our world through a stranger's eyes....it is revealing.

Deport Council still working towards streets, sewers and city hall

The Deport City Council listened to proposals for street repairs, water and sewer lines in their regular meeting Monday, May 13th.

Reeves Hayter presented the idea of the city receiving a loan from FHA or a public lending institution for the purpose of resurfacing streets on Beville, Choctaw, 5th street, Ruth, South Jeffus, and 4th street, and putting in water lines and fire plugs on Milton-Minter Road and a new city hall. The street right of ways would have to be 20' to 50' wide for streets and shoulders. Discussion of a bond issue is set for the next meeting.

An estimate of between \$350,000 and \$400,000 was made for the

projects. A tax increase of 75 cents per \$100 evaluation was purposed to pay for the work.

The 1996-97 budget was accepted by the council and it was okayed to sell the old, wrecked fire truck to the Faught volunteer fire department for \$350.00

IT was decided to have the city attorney write a letter and start procedures to have something done about buildings on the north end of Main street in Deport.

The Lamar County Appraisal District budget was discussed and no action taken.

A new Meter Deposit application

was approved by the council. The new application retains the \$75 meter deposit and has a \$25 processing fee and requires more information be given than previously.

Canvassing of the May 4th election was held, Mayor Foster received 16 votes, Floy Williams 15 and Duane Glover 15 votes.

Mayor Pro Tem Nancy Gresham swore in Mayor Foster and the two council members.

The minutes were approved as read, financial report approved as presented and payment of all bills approved.

Layered Vegetable Casserole

Spray a two quart casserole dish with non-stick cooking spray and layer the following ingredients:
1st layer: 1 can whole kernel corn-drained
1 can french style green beans-drained
2nd layer: 1 cup chopped onion
3rd layer: mix together-1 can cream celery soup
8 ounce sour cream
4th layer: 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
5th layer: mix together-1/2 stick oleo 1 cup seasoned stuffing mix
6th layer: sliced almonds to garnish
Cook 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves 10-12 generously.

Master Mix

5 pounds flour
2-1/2 cup dry milk
3/4 cup baking powder
3 tablespoons salt
2 tablespoons cream of tartar
2 pound vegetable shortening
Stir in baking powder, salt, cream of tartar, dry milk and sugar in unsifted flour. Sift together. Cut in shortening until mix looks like corn meal. Place in a tightly covered container. Store at room temperature. Yield 29 cups mix.
Biscuits: 3 cups mix, 3/4 cup water
Pancakes: 3 cups mix, 1-1/2 cup water
Muffins: 3 cups mix, 1 egg 2 tablespoon sugar cup water
Waffles: 3 cups mix, 1-1/2 cup water 1 egg
Cookies: 2 cups mix, 1 egg 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup sugar, 2/3 cup water, 1/2 cup nuts
Coffee Cake: 3 cups mix, 1 egg, 1/2 cup sugar, 2/3 cup water

Ham and Vegetable Hot Dish

4 cups cut-up cauliflower or broccoli
1/4 cup margarine
1/3 cup all purpose flour

1 cup milk
2 cups ham -cubed
4 ounces cheese
1-3 ounce can mushrooms
1 cup bread crumbs
1 tablespoon melted margarine
1/2 cup dairy sour cream
Cook cauliflower and or broccoli in small amount of boiling salted water, covered till crisp-tender. Drain-remove from pan. Add cheese and sour cream; cook and stir over low heat until cheese is melted. Stir in ham, mushrooms and cooked vegetables. Turn into 2-quart casserole dish. Combine bread crumbs and 1 tablespoon margarine or butter; sprinkle a top casserole. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 40 minutes.

Any-Way Burritos

8-8 or 10 flour tortillas
11 ounce ground meat
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 clove garlic
4 teaspoons flour
desired vegetable
1-8 ounce tomato sauce
1-7-1/2 can tomatoes
1-8 ounce can stewed tomatoes
desired seasoning
1 cup shredded cheese
Stack tortillas; wrap in foil. Heat in a 350 degree oven ten minutes to soften. For filling, in a large skillet cook desired meat, onion and garlic until meat is done. Drain off fat. Stir in flour and desired vegetable, tomato sauce, tomatoes and desired seasoning. Cook and stir till thickened and bubbly and vegetable are tender. Spoon about 1/3 cup of the filling onto each tortilla just below the center. Top each with 2 tablespoons of cheese. Fold bottom edges up and over, just to cover filling. Roll up tortillas from bottom. Fry, bake or micro-wave rolls as directed.

Grandsons served as pallbearers.

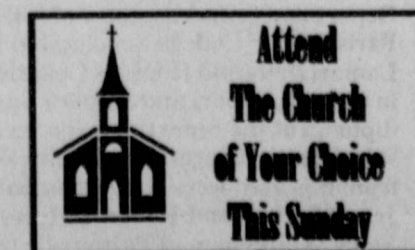
Hazel Whitney dies May 10

The effective date of such change is June 10, 1996. All classes of customers receiving service from Texas-New Mexico Power Company will be affected by said proposed rates. TNP serves approximately 170,000 customers in Texas. The proposed rates, for all of TNP's Texas operations, will not increase gross revenues to the Company over adjusted test year revenues.

The purpose of this filing is to obtain approval for TNP's transition plan, known as Community Choice, which will address potential stranded costs and increasing competition in the electric utility industry. Community Choice is comprised of the following three major elements:

(1) **Effective Aggregation of Small Electric Loads.** Community Choice aggregates electric service customers at the community level for the purpose of purchasing bulk electric energy. This approach to aggregating customers will provide residential and small commercial customers some of the same buying power that large commercial and industrial customers likely will enjoy in a competitive environment.

(2) **An Opportunity to Recover Stranded Costs.** During a five-year transition period (1997 - 2001), in which TNP will implement Community Choice, TNP will have the opportunity to reduce the so-called "stranded costs" associated with TNP One, TNP's generating plant. TNP's stranded costs are the difference between what it costs TNP to produce electric energy and what a customer is willing to pay for electric energy in a competitive environment. Rates, including charges associated with fuel and purchased power, will remain constant during this five-year period at 1995 levels. TNP will use normal depreciation, depreciation shifting, and any fuel or purchased power savings to reduce the capital cost of TNP One. In addition, Community Choice will include a mechanism for using some earnings above a specified level to reduce the capital cost of TNP One.

(3) **A Commitment to Provide Customer Choice.** Beginning on January 1, 2002, TNP's customers will have the opportunity to choose their suppliers of bulk electric energy and energy-related services. Customers will be able to choose which company provides these services to them, while TNP will continue to provide transmission and distribution services.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at the business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Consumer Affairs Office at (512) 458-0256, or (512) 458-0221 for text telephone. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the commission.
