But, I don't think I've stressed what would really fix the problem....neutering.

Yes, having a cat or dog "fixed" does cost money. A male cat is about \$30, a female about \$45. A medium sized dog is \$52 for a male and \$72 for female. Lots of money, right? Yes and no. Puppies and kittens cost money too. Feeding them is quite expensive. I guess it's a little easier on the pocketbook than neutering because dog food can be bought a week at a time, but in the long run people spend more on food than on neutering. And, the problem of unwanted puppies and kittens is avoided with neutering

Puppies and kittens are adorable, but sadly only a few will ever reach their first year because of illnesses that prey on the young, cars and the many other dangers that fill a small animal's world.

When Zachary Allen was selected as one of 16 young athletes in Texas and Oklahoma to be on "Team Texoma" a baseball team that was to play exhibition and tournament games across Europe this summer, it seemed like a great thing to do. When time came to go, the step onto that plane was pretty big, but he made it. Some young men did not take that step....literally. They backed out at the airport!

Zachary's family, parents John and Phebe and brother Dustin and sister Hollie, decided that they would also fly to Europe, and watch Zachary and the other teams play. They even gathered their courage and drove a rental car in the Netherlands and Germany.

Zachary and the other team members and teams flew in to Rome, than traveled by bus across Italy, Switzerland and into Germany. They played games in Germany, but mostly in Holland.

'It rained every day, but the countryside was beautiful" Zachary states. Like his family, one of the biggest problems he faced was finding something to eat that wasn't strange and different.

"We ended up mostly eating at the ball parks" he grinned. "We would each snitzels (like large hot dogs) a toastee (grilled cheese with ham" potato fries and picantos (a cross between sausage and chicken)."

The young athlete, who graduated from Prairiland High School this past spring, enjoyed meeting new people.

His dad says that "I have always had a good sense of direction, but I completely lost it driving in Europe". The narrow streets and winding roads kept him turned around. "I would see something we wanted to get to, and it up being a major deal to get there" he similar to a country club membership states. Zachary and the coaches and other boys stayed at Youth Hostels, which provide basic shelter, shared baths,

dormitory style beds and not much else. That, Zachary says, wasn't too much fun. He really did enjoy play-"The little kids are just crazy about American baseball" Zachary says,

"They ask for pictures taken with tour you, autographs, anything. They go nuts for American baseball cards. We gave away lots and lots of them"

Meanwhile, John, Phebe, Dustin and Hollie were staying in hotels which were a little more luxurious than the hostels. They found them pretty different, though, with small rooms.

One night the only lodging they could find was at a converted chapel. Phebe used a convertor to plug in the hair dryer. Something wasn't right, though, and the lights for the whole place were knocked out! Laughing, they relate her asking John a little later to try and turn up the heat in the room.

"No" he said firmly "we've already put out the lights, we're not going to mess anything else up". So, they slept cold.

Cold in July in Europe is something many Americans have trouble with. It's hard to go from nearly 100 degrees to about half that!

The whole family says they headed for every McDonald's they say, as did most other team members and their families.

Zachary says his team was the only one made up of high school students, the rest were mostly college students. Many of the European teams are made up of adults. The Germans would look simple, but it would end and Dutch have club memberships rope few people have...though the

Zachary said that his team place fifth which he felt was pretty good. While the tams were practicing ball, the rest of the Allen family were doing things like going up in windmills and doing some touring of the countryside. The windmill they went

up in was grinding meal to be mixed with cattle and horse feed, and the man who runs it gave them quite a

One of the nicest things that happened, the Allen family agrees happened when they met a little boy who has just turned 13.

"He's crazy about the U.S." Phebe relates, "and he wants to come to the United States so much. He thought that Team Texoma was 'it' and every day he came to the ball park in Holland with his camera, fresh fruit, waffles and other goodies. His mother drove him forty miles every day to get there" she remembers. He wants to come to the United States as an exchange student and one feels that he may have no trouble finding a host family!

Probably the least thrilled of the family was Dustin. He frankly didn't enjoy his trip much. He says the only way he would ever go back was if "there was a national emergency and I was drafted and sent there"

But, overall the family learned a lot. They enjoyed seeing how other people live. Zachary says he has made friends for life and would probably go back if invited again.

His parents agree they might go back if they could take a tour instead of trying to find their own way around, Hollie would go along too.

So, the Allen family has returned with souvenirs, memories and lots of experiences to chalk up.


Knowledge and Skills.
