But slowly as I sat there, I began to hear tiny rustlings, minuscule sounds of movement and a sense of presence.



The Council approved the new tax rate of .47004 per \$100.00 valuation for 1996. The new rate is only slightly higher than 1995, by just over 2.5 cents per \$100.00 valuation.

The Council unanimously approved a raise in the sewer rate from \$4.50 minimum of 1,500 gallons to \$8.00 with a 1,500 gallon minimum for residential customers. The new rate will generate revenues of approximately \$14,400.00 per year. The water rates for city residents and businesses will remain unchanged at the present time.

Council members expressed concern over placing a burden on city residents by raising all rates any more than absolutely necessary, but at the same time, the city needs to keep in step with neighboring cities service rates. The Council is still challenged by raising funds for much needed

David K. Falls, project manager for Hayter Engineering, Inc. discussed and advised the Council to

pay estimate #1 to Pioneer Mechanical Contractors, Inc. of Texarkana on sewer, water and fire hydrant projects. The Council agreed to pay the #1 estimate of the project amounting to \$20,230.37.

The Council agreed to permit Cecil Pool to locate a trailer house on his property at 441 Hwy. 271 in Deport.

The Council approved a proposal to pay 1/2 of the expenses for three Deport Volunteer Firemen who attended the Texas A&M Fire School.

A resolution from the Texas Department of Transportation requiring additional funds to maintain and expand its 77,000 miles of state maintained highways was adopted by the Council.

After the bills were paid and minutes approved, the meeting was adiourned.

The 1996-97 Prairiland School Budget of \$5,624,484 was adopted Monday night, August 12 in a called meeting of the Prairiland ISD board. The 1995-96 budget was \$5,556,350. The difference is \$68,154 over the previous year's budget.

A request to supplement Statewide Administrative Ed-Flex waivers was passed as was approval of Policy Update number 51.



Bills were paid for July, the tax report approved and financial statements approved.

Guess what? Yes, you guessed, it there kittens there.


We fed them or buried them, we . did not let any of them starve.
