Supporters are seeking pay raises for Sheriff's Department employees with petition

signed a petition this week, supporting a request for the Lamar County Commissioners Court to raise the minimum salaries of employees with the Lamar County Sheriff's Depart-

The petition is being circulated by supporters of the Sheriff's Department to request the Commissioners Court to raise the Sheriff's Department's employees salaries to be comparable with other law enforcement agencies in the area and

An example of the difference in salaries is: The Chief of Police of the City of Paris salary is \$57,772.00 per year. The Lamar County Sheriff's salary is \$29,599.00 per year. The Assistant Chief of Paris is \$40,144.00 per year and the Sheriff's Chief Deputy's salary is \$21,890.00 per

Sheriffs Department Investigator's \$21,268.00. A patrolman for the City of Paris is paid \$27,274.00, com-Department salary of \$19,438.00.

In an interview with Lamar County Sheriff B.J. McCoy, he stated that his department has lost 36 employees ranging from dispatchers to Chief Deputy in two years. "My Department has lost three deputies in two weeks," stated McCov.

The petition is legal under legislation recently approved by the State Legislature.

The petition must be signed by 25% of the last election's total voters. Approximately 2,900 signatures are needed to achieve the goal. If the petition with the ample number of signatures is presented to the Lamar County Commissioners Court, the year. A City of Paris Lieutenant's Court is required legally to do one of County Auditor's office.

Deport resident Kathy Figueroa salary is \$36,608.00 compared to a three things, according to Sheriff McCoy: 1) give the raise requested, 2) negotiate with five people chosen from the names on the petitions, and pared to a Deputy for the Sheriff's 3) call an election and let the people vote on the issue.

If the salary increases are approved, and there were not sufficient funds available, it could cost the taxpayer \$7.00 per year for property valued at \$50,000.00, according to the Lamar

They approved the guidelines for students to attend the Alternative School at Paris Junior College. In executive session the board heard from three parents about discipline problems.

Mendy Cole was assigned as head softball coach for \$1,500 and cross country coach for \$500.

The school was named as contractor for a new concession stand at Deport. Minutes from previous meeting were read and approved.

The bills from August and the financial statement from August was approved as were the bills and financial statements for September

McCuistion expands healthcare services

McCuistion Regional Medical Center has expanded the healthcare services available in this region with the addition of the area's first rural mobile health clinic. At present there are four other mobile units providing similar services in Texas, and the Texas Department of Human Services has encouraged the mobile clinic concept as an effective way to bring needed health services to underserved

The 40-foot mobiile clinic is complete with two examination rooms, laboratory, office area, computer link ups, and accomodations for patients

with limited mobility. Initially, the unit will be used as a rural mobile health clinic in the Roxton and Detroit communities. It will be in Detroit on Thursday and Friday from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00

A graduate of Southwestern Medical School in Dallas, Laura Guthrie will oversee the clinics. She previously served as the physician's assistant in the Northeast Medical Center Clinic in Honey Grove. Dr. Donald

Lewis will oversee the mobile clinic. The end result should be greater access to healthcare and improved healthcare in the areas served by the clinic.

First of all this week, let me tell everyone that sent in, mailed, faxed or otherwise, their copies of recipes for Key Lime Pie. . . . Thank You! I received around 7 copies of this recipes. What would I do without my faithful readers? Guess I will have to try each and everyone of them! I will let you know which one we like the best. My daughter Cari will have to be the judge. She ate these when they were in Houston this summer at the FFA Convention and came home and told me that I would have to learn to make her Key Lime Pies. That they were absolutely delicious! While looking through my many recipe books, I could not find a Key Lime Pie recipe and relied on you readers to help me

But, this week's column is dedicated to the much maligned, lowly, Jalapeno. These Texas favorites are used in a variety of recipes from Picante Sauce on down to Jelly. Not only can they be purchased in a wide range on the heat index, from extra mild to wild and red hot, but they can also be purchased sliced, diced, minced, dry, canned and many other

Where Jalapenos used to be sold in only specialty stores, now everyone sells them. They adorn nachos, though only the hearty will eat them; used for dressing up a dish and pushed aside and left to be thrown out; dropped in the occasional pot of Texas Chili to liven it up a little; are painted, stitched, ironed on and are now even seen adorning the necks and ears of high fashion models as Tex-Mex and Southwest seems to be the latest fashion craze.

A lot of gardeners plant them each year and they are canned in a variety of ways and added to the everpopular picante or hot sauce. They now can be purchased as plants in a variety of either mild or hot, depending on the consumers stomach lining. My husband plants several (at least a dozen) plants each year and they are always loaded with a vast amount of these succulent peppers.

Jalapeno Relish

//2 gallon green tomatoes-sliced quarts onion-sliced auarts jalapeno peppers-sliced

cups sugar quart cider vinegar quart water

teaspoons salt

cup pecans In a medium bowl, combine cheese. lives, garlic, peppers and juice. Mix nto ball and roll into chopped pecans. erve with crackers

Jalapeno Chicken boneless chicken breasts tablespoons oil pint sour cream tablespoon flour garlic clove-chopped

salt and pepper

1-8 ounce can jalapeno peppers l cup mozzarella cheese-grated l large onion-sliced

4 tablespoons chopped green onion

Preheat oven to 350 and brown chicken in oil on both sides. Arrange in a 3 quart baking dish. In blender combine sour cream, flour, garlic, salt, pepper and peppers; blend until smooth to make sauce. Sprinkle cheese over chicken top with sauce and onion rounds and sprinkle with green onions. Bake uncovered for

Jalapeno Jelly 1-1/2 cups green bell pepper-chopped finely

2 jalapenos-remove seeds 3 teaspoons juice from jalapeno 1/2 teaspoon salt

7-1/2 cups sugar 1-1/2 cups white vinegar green food coloring(optional) -3 ounce package Certo

Combine allingredients, except Certo in heavy pan. Bring to a boil and boil 6 minutes. Stir frequently. Stir in Certo and boil for three more minutes. Remove from heat; skim foam from top and pour into sterile jars. Pickled Jalapenos

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
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
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

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

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Off to see the river. . .! or down the Red the hard way! and Bill Pitts

On Friday, September 20, 1996, the fearless team of James Crawford and Bill Pitts of Blossom set off for their adventure down the Red River. The following is a true account of their adventures.

9:20 a.m. first day Friday, September 20. 1996:

We met at Bill and Barbra Pitts home in Blossom about 8:00 a.m. and had things placed in the pickups, hooked up Bill's 17 foot bass boat with 40 HP motor and left for the Red River, north of Clarksville. After finding the launch site at Mr. Greens, north of Clarksville by Highway 37 bridge. (We had talked to Mr. Green on Wednesday night in Oklahoma, he told us that he had a loading place back of his place on the river.) It was bout 200 yards back down through high grass and crooked over some deep rocks. We back the boat first and placed things like we needed them and then loaded my 10 foot flat bottom boat and covered it with canvas and straps and then backed it down and unloaded and tied it to the back of Bill's boat.

We set off down the Red River at 9:55. After 3-1/2 hours of not seeing much to report, we saw a small boy sitting on the hood of a pickup. The water was pretty swift and flowing. Bill put up the umbrella around 2:15. He had enjoyed it for a few minutes, when the wind picked it up out of it's holder and before we could turn around, it sank; in less than 10 seconds. Five hours and 22 minutes, we saw Highway 259 bridge at 3:12.

Everything else went well for the rest of the day and we stopped about 5:10 to make camp. The clouds started to build up very quickly and by 5:45, it was raining, hailing and blowing wind. We were soaked. We dried and cleaned up and by then the storm had returned and we were soaked again. At 1:30 a.m., I got up and sat up the rest of the night. Bill put on his rain suit and laid on a wet mattress. Saturday, September 21-6:30 a.m.

We got up about 6:30 a.m and cooked sausage and eggs for breakfast and then loaded up and left camp about 9:20 a.m. We put both paddles on the boat to hang and dry out things. We placed foam rubber sleeping pads(mattress) on the top of the cargo to dry out. After 3 hours, at about 12:30, we went under Highway 8 bridge north of New Boston. We kept going until 3:15 and hung upon a sand barge, but got off and came on. Had some trouble trying to find a place to camp and around 5:30 finally settled on one and threw out 5 lines that Bill had made and about 4 hooks on each line, thinking we might catch breakfast.

Sunday, September 22-5:00 a.m.

Up at 5:00 a.m. with thewater rising and about 6 foot from the tent. It was very foggy and damp. We ate and started loading. We had to move the tent twice before we could load and get going. We saw trees 30 to 40 feet long rushing past and the water/ trees had wiped out the throw lines. We found one and had to watch for trash and dodge things as wer went n our way very slowly about 12 mph. At 9:10 we went under Highway 59 and 71 north of Texarkana, then about 11:50 we went under Highway 67 and I30. Saw a flock of pelican about 4:00 and hung up 4 times on sand bars. Thewater pump quit pumping water on motor, so Bill cleaned sand out and got it going. We stopped for the night about 5:30 and ate and made camp and slept good for the night clear and cool.

Monday, September 23-6:30 a.m. Bill had lost his teeth and glasses the night before somewhere and finally found them the next morning. Cooked bacon, eggs and hash brown bisquits and honey for breakfast. Sure was good. Saw a large ripple coming from toward us and finally a beaver

stuck his hed up, he was going upstream. Cleaned up and left at 8:55. There was no fog this morning and a beautiful day to be on the river. 12:30 saw us under Highway 160 bridge east of Atlanta. There was a good boat ramp on both sides of the river. Stopped to fish at 1:20 with Bill catching a bass which we ate for supper that night. By 4:15, we stopped for camp. A beautiful night with a full moon shining.

Tuesday, September 24-4:00 a.m. Up at 4 a.m. it was raining again and the water was still rising about 2 foot a night. By 7:30 we were out of there, wet as we could be and all our clothes and gear soaked. Almost to the end of the trip. Reached the boat ramps in Bossier, Louisiana at 11:45. Unloaded the boats as we could and layed out the stuff to dry. Mae and Barbara found us about 12:25. We were sure glad to see them drive up. We were gritty with sand, dirt and sweat. A man came over to visit and found out he was with the Texas Parks and Wildlife. He told us that we could call or write for a map of the Red River and also they plan to even-

concrete and very nice. Barbara called Barksdale Inn and made reservations for the 4 of us for the night. We had a nice room. I was concerned that the drains might stop. up from all of the grit and dirt, but they did not. I figure that it took us about 36 hours on the river, not counting the time spent stopped to camp.

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From The Pastor's Heart



Hand-Me Down Parenting

Although being a parent is one of the most important jobs in the world, it is one for which we get almost no formal preparation. Instead, we train on the job with a strong tendency to parent the way we were parented. How many times did you say "I'll not treat my children the way I was" only to end up doing the same in frustration? The trick in parenting is to adapt. Use the things taught by your own parents that were good and wholesome, but adapt the skills that you felt hurtful.

Take from your upbringing those practices you want to continue in your family. If prayers were said before meals in your childhood home, if discipline was a teacher tool and not punitive, and if encouragement was freely given, you have a good example to follow. But if there were negative aspects to your upbringing, replace them with practices based on love and what seems right for you and your children.

Two questions may help you: How can I be the kind of mother or father I would like to have for a parent? How can I create the kind of home I would

Your answers will help you decide what to accept and what to reject from your own upbringing. Your home is where the groundwork is lad for your child to think of God not as a cold, harsh judge but as a kind, compassionate parent. Think of this poem by an unknown author.

If children live with criticism, they learn to condemn.

If they live with hostility, they learn to fight. If they live with ridicule, they learn to be shy.

If they live with tolerance they learn to be patient.

If they live with encouragement, they learn to appreciate.

If they live with security, they learn to have faith. If they live with acceptance and friendship,

They learn to find love in the world.

Being a good parent is not difficult; it just takes a little time. That is the key in everything worthwhile, take the time your children are worth. Regardless of your schedule, or work habits, or even the demands placed on you, if your children are worth anything, they are worth your time.

One question always asked is: "How do I discipline my child?" As stated last week, discipline does not mean punishment. There are times when a person deserves to be punished because they have gone outside the laws and rules of society. Ask yourself when a child misbehaves: "Does punishment fit the crime?" If so, go ahead and punish the child as you deem necessary. If the act of misbehavior is not a crime deserving punishment, then think of ways you might "discipline" or teach your child to do better. I understand this takes more time, but remember, your child is worth it.

This is exactly the way God deals with God's children. God takes the time to discipline us because God thinks we deserve to learn better. God does not punish on the same basis we do. I can not think of one person that was ever punished by God as a means of discipline. I can think of several that God nurtured and loved as the Good Shepherd, however.

There are things that happen to us that we stick God with the blame, but that is not fair. God does not control us, not as we try to control our children. God does lead, guide, teach and love us by the Holy Spirit. Anyone that would tell you that God's intent is to punish us does not tell you the truth. If we as parents could simply raise our children as God raises us above our sin then we would be resembling the love of God.
