# Some Tips for a safe and happy Halloween

The Deport American Legion Post passed out safety pamphlets to Kindergarten through fourth graders on safe Trick or Treating. We found it to be useful for children and parents and are hereby sharing with all of our

Trick or treat can be done safely. Mothers and fathers should walk their small children. Older children should

go in small groups with their friends. No one should go alone and everyone should have flashlights. Each child should know their phone number and home address just in case they get lost and they could know to dial 911 in an emergency. Children should know to never go anywhere with any stranger. It would be a good idea for parents and their children to agree on a family password. Children would be able to know it was safe to go with someone if that person knew the password.

Children should stay in their own neighborhoods and stop only at houses that are well lighted. They should not go inside of any house.

They should use sidewalks or walk facing traffic. Children should not run, and should cross only at corners and be careful of running between parked cars. The should wait before crossing any street, and stop, look and listen.

Costumes should be light colored and reflective tape is a good idea. Costumes should not tangle nor trip a

According to the 1996 November issue of the Texas Monthly, the Blossom and Deport School campuses have been named as 3-Star Schools. The list rates 3,172 of the elementary schools in Texas. The rating system is based on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test, the one consistent, uniform, statewide measure of what students are learning. Several hundred schools were excluded from the ratings because they tested fewer than fifty students or contained only one or two grades and thus did not meet the Texas Education Agency's definition of an elementary school, according to the article.

Continuing, the article stated that TAAS scores alone does not tell them much about what a good job a school is doing. To compare a surburban school with an inner-city school, even in the same area, is like comparing apples to oranges. A good rating system has to compare a school with others, whose students have similar characteristics.

The system was developed by 2)

The rating system assigns stars for meeting certain goals. The best schools in Texas earned four stars and continue on that level, with the worst scoring no stars. Here is the list of requirements.

1) 1 star-at least 30 percent of the

students passed the TAAS test. Darvin M. Winick of the Center for 2) 2 star-if the school ranked at or

above the median passing rate on the TAAS test for schools with a similar percentage of disadvantaged students. 3) 3 star-if at least 70 percent of the

students passed the TAAS test. 4) if school had a passing rate in the top 15 percent on TAAS with a similar percentage of disadvantaged students

The article went on to tell that the Texas Education Agency had their own way of rating schools, but in a method that was designed to identify the ones that are succeeding and the others that are failing. The Winick-Toenjes answers the question of the child being at the top or on the

Other schools in this area listed as 3-Star are Aikin in Paris and the Detroit campus. Two-Star schools listed were Chisum and North Lamar's Cecil

According to Prairiland Superintendent Dr. L.C. Stout, "Our teachers do a super job, we have the best kids in the world, a good Board and a great system."


