Fiber In Your Diet Fiber is categorized as either solu ble or insoluble. Both types are found in all fruits, vegetables, and whole grains. Both types absorb water they pass through the gastrointestinal tract. Soluble fibers include pectins, which are found
carrots, and apples, and gums, which are found in oatmeal. When solabl fibers take up water, they form a gellike substance that helps slow the
body's absorption of refined sugar as well as cholesterol and other fats. Studies have shown that adding soluble fibers to the diet can lowe the level of cholesterol in the blood.
High levels of serum cholesterol are associated with an increased risk of heart disease, and it is thought that fiber interferes with the process by

By inter fering with the absorption of sugar, soluble fiber also hel lower high blood-sugar levels.
