



If you have information about illegal drug trafficking anywhere in Texas, the Department of Public

Safety would like to hear from you. Beginning March 1, you can help fight illegal drug sales in Texas by calling the DPS toll-free at 1-800-525-5555 to report suspected drug activity anywhere in the state. A headquarters communications officer in Austin will relay your information to the appropriate Highway Patrol or

Narcotics officer in your area. If you believe a drug shipment is being transported, provide the dispatcher with as much information as possible about the vehicle its location, direction of travel and license plate number. If the drugs are being stored at a building or residence, provide the location and any available information about when the drugs

might be moved.

Please contact your local police or sheriff's department if you would like to report individuals possessing small quantities of marijuana or other drugs.

The main DPS 1-800 number also may be used to report erratic or drunken drivers or to seek assistance if you become stranded on the highway. When calling for these purposes, make sure to pinpoint your location and direction of travel using mile markers, crossroads or other landmarks.

Our Cook's Column this week deals with the lowly tea leaf. Many a problem have been worked out over a cup of tea or glass of iced tea.

Tea is a beverage prepared by pouring boiling water over processed tea leaves. It ranks as the most popular drink in more countries than any other beverage.

India has always played a dominate role in world tea production. Today, India produces about 1-1/2 billion pounds each year. China is the second largest producer with I billion pounds Other tea-producing annually. countries include Argentina, Bangladesh, Indonesia, Japan, Kenya, the Soviet Union, SriLanka and Turkey.

The tea-producing coundtries themselves consume over one-half of the global tea crop. Great Britain imports the greatest amount of tea-about 400 million pounds annually. On the average, about 7 pounds of tea are consumed per person each year in Great Britain. In the United States, tea is about 3/4 of a pound per person per year.

There are three main kinds of tea; black, green and oolong. They differ in the method used to process the leaves. The processing takes place in a factory or near the tea estate. All tea-producing countries manufacture black tea. Most of the green and oolong tea comes from China, Japan and Taiwan.

Grades of tea vary according to the size of the leaves. The largest leaves are selected for packaging as loose tea and are classified in order of size--orange pekoe, pekoe and pekoe souchong. The smaller or broken leaves are generally used in tea bags and are classified as broken orange pekoe, broken orange pekoe fannings and fannings.

Instant tea is made by brewing tea on a large scale and then removing the water by a drying process. When the process is completed, only a powder remains.

Tea grown in different countries or even in different parts of the same country, vary in taste, flavor and quality. To obtain the best teas, each company employs tea taster's who select only certain teas for purchase. The company then sells the blend

of tea under its own brand name. Thus ends your tea lesson for the week. So sit back, brew up a batch and solve the world's problems or just your own! See you in the

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$5,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year....and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled, or if you're 65 years old or older, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on our home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death adn lives in and owns the home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1996, you won't need to reapply for 1997 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home, or if you've moved to a new home, you'll need to file for an exemption for 1997. And if you turned 65 or became disabled during 1996, you need to file for the additional exemptions.

When and where should I file?

File applications by April 30 at your appraisal district office. If you need more time, contact us at:

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed basd on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber--not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1997 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss the deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually? If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to

reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do

so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

Comet Hale-Bopp was discovered on July 23, 1995. When first viewed, it was 250 times brighter than Comet Halley at the same distance, and is about three times as big as Comet Halley. It is said to be the biggest, brightest comet in the last century. Backyard comet-gazers can already spot it hovering on the eastern horizon each day before dawn.

You can spot the comet by looking east about 30 minutes before dawn. Hold your fist at arm's length. The comet is east-north-east and about two or three fists above the horizon. It will slowly move northward each

Comets have long evoked a range of awed emotions and strange ideas in those lucky enough to see them. Comets have been blamed for droughts, famines and floods through-

The last time Comet Hale-Bopp visited the inner solar system, Stonehenge was about to reach it's final configuration, 4,200 years ago!

Comet Hale-Bopp will come no closer than 122 million miles from Earth and is about 25 miles in diameter. The comet's tail "could" stretch across a third of the sky when it reaches peak brilliance on April Fool's


