He was employed by a messenger service and was one of about 25 employees.

It was noted that the number of messengers was down from about 45 the year before to 25.

That set me to pondering whether there are any of these messengers left at all.

The television program was about 12 years old. I'll bet there aren't any of them functioning

Think about it. With E-Mail and the fax machine, a proliferation of electronic wire transfers and the like, the need to hand carry documents, checks or forms has decreased to the point of virtual non-existence!

It's like the old newspapers, who had copy boys to run stories, information and proofs back and forth, up and down between reporters and editors and printers....it just isn't done that way anymore. The need for those pneumatic tubes that went from floor to floor in department stores carrying money and sending back receipts has ceased

to exist, too. So, it seems unlikely that even a city the size of New York has much need for a skilled, energetic cyclist to carry "hard copy" documents or information from place to place.

They must be making their living doing something else, now. It's amazing just how fast technology can change things in only a few years!

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



smooth top. Fill a 2 quart baking pan halfway with hot water and place on bottom rack of oven. Bake in middle rack for I hour. Turn off oven and leave cake with door closed for 30 minutes. Remove and cool on wire rack to room temperature. Cover cake with foil and refrigerate at least 4 hours. Pour melted chocolate over top and set pecan halves evenly spaced around edges

Butterscotch Cheesecake

I cup graham crackers 2 tablespoons flour 2 tablespoons sugar

4 tablespoons butter

12 ounces butterscotch chips

1/4 cup heavy cream 16 ounces cream cheese-softened 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar 4 large eggs-room temperature

l cup sour cream 2 tablespoons flour

l tablespoon vanilla

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Lightly butter springform pan. In bowl, combine graham cracker crumbs, flour and sugar and stir in butter until thouroughly blended. Press the crust over the bottom and one-quarter of the way up the sides of the prepared pan. Bake 15 minutes, then set aside to cool. In double broiler set over barley simmering water and melt butterscotch chips with heavy cream, stirring until smooth and creamy. Remove pan from heat. Add cream cheese and brown sugar in a large bowl and beat until smooth using the electric mixer on medium. Add eggs, one at a time, beating for 20 seconds after each addition. Scrape down bowl. Add dsour cream, flour and vanilla and beat until smooth. Add butterscotch mixture and beat at low until smooth. Scrape down sides. Pour filling into prepared pan and smooth top. Fill a 2 quart baking pan halfway with hot water and place on bottom rack. Bake cake on middle rack for I hour. Turn off oven and leave door closed for I hour. Remove and cool to room temperature. Cover with foil and refrigerate for four hours. Garnish with one 8 ounce jar caramel topping-warmed

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Lightly butter springform pan. In bowl, combine crackers, butter and peel. Press erust over bottom and halfway up sides Chill while making filling. Put cream cheese and sugar in large bowl and beat until smooth, using electric mixer a medium speed. Add eggs, i at a time and beat 20 seconds each. Scrape down bowl. Add sour cream and beat until smooth. Add lime juice, vanilla and almond extract and peeel, beating until combined. Scrape down bowl. Pour filling into prepared crust and smooth top. Fill 2-quart pan halfway full and place on bottom rack of over. Place cake on middle rack for I hour. Turn off over and leave for additional hour with door closed. Remove and cool to room temprature. In top of double boiler set over barely simring water, whisk together egg yolks and sugar until combined. Slowly stir in the lemon and orange juices until smooth. Cook mixture, stirring constatnly with a wooden spoon until thick. Remove pan from heat and stir in butter until smooth. Strain hot curd through fine-mesh sieve into a bowl and let cool slightly. Pour curd over cheesecake, then refrigerate cov-

TNP shares Spring and Summer safety tips

Bogata, TX - Texas-New Mexico Power Company is offering a few helpful reminders to make the most of spring and summer outdoor activi-

"Some of the safety advice we provide may sound like common sense, yet every year, people are injured because they didn't use these simple precautions," says Gary Petty CRC Bogata-Emory Area. "The basic rule of thumb is to treat every power line as if it's energized, even if it's a downed line that you think is

TNP recommends avoiding any contact with power lines and to follow these safety basics:

* Never climb power poles or trees that are in the vicinity of power lines.

*Never thrust objects into power lines. Even a kite or string, if it contacts a power line, can produce serious shock to the person on the earth holding the kite string. The same applies to model planes and ropes.

Call the local TNP office if branches are growing around power lines. Both aluminum and wooden ladders can be conductors, so leave the tree trimming to the profession-

Practice extra precaution when using electrical lawn mowers and weed eaters so as not to cut power

*Don't attempt to rescue cats that are climbing near utility lines. They will come home when hungry. If the pet is injured, call the local TNP


*Never let a sailboat sail into an electric line and never raise the mast of a sailboat under an electric power

* Know the location of underground power lines near your home, and never dig close to them.

The advent of spring also brings spring storms. These storms, as well as some car wrecks and other accidents, can damage electric distribution systems and leave energized power lines lying on the ground. These lines are extremely dangerous and should be avoided. Contact the nearest TNP office or a local law enforcement officer in the event of a downed power line - these representatives will respond promptly to guard against injuries to anyone in the area. 



For those who want to know more about the internet but don't know where to start!

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will release "New Rules for Universal Service" by Thursday, May 8.

Most businesses would benefit from a reduction in their long distance charges under these new rules. Internet Service Providers (ISPs) use almost no long distance, but would be exempted from a per-minute charge heavily favored by the phone companies to connect their customers to the Internet.

The new rules also propose a "modem tax". On Monday, May 5, an online industry group asked the four person FCC to reject the "modem tax", which could apply a \$3.50 to \$4 monthly fee for each extra phone line in homes and

Internet Service Providers would be hardest hit by the new charges and would probably pass the fee down to customers who would have another fee for their second lines at home. The industry group wants the FCC commissioners to hold off voting on the issues concerning the Internet until the effects





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

covered by Medicare.

You are surprised and

care Handbook that

Medicare covers up to



100 days of skilled care

in a nursing home—the first 20 days without copayments. Coming from the hospital you may well have expected to receive coverage under Medicare, but the nursing home lets you know that from their vast experience, they are sure it is not covered. What should

First, do not take the nursing home's word for non-coverage. The nursing home may not be correct.

Second, ask the nursing home to file a Medicare claim so that you can learn directly from Medicare whether you are covered. You are not legally liable to pay the nursing home until you receive a coverage determination from Medicare.

Third, once you have this Medicare determination, you have the right to appeal. If your doctor believes that you need skilled care, which includes not only skilled nursing care, but also physical and other therapies, you have a good chance of getting Medicare to pay for part of your stay. Many Medicare denials are reversed, so do not be afraid to appeal.

You can learn more about issues of special concern to older Americans, including Social Security and Medicare, by joining the National Committee to Preserve Social Security and Medicare, an organization devoted to improving retirement income and health care. 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
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

A Series About Day Trips from This Area To Places of Interest



There is really so much information about Jefferson that it's hard to know where to begin. Jefferson is a town on the outer fringes of "day trip" taking a while to get there and back, but more than worth the time. Even better, would be to make it an overnight trip, staying at one of the bed and breakfasts there!

Jefferson was a riverport, and the steamboats brought it it's glory, it's commerce and its quality. A log jam brought the water level up on the river so that Caddo Basin was a perfect port. Goods and people flowed in, cotton was taken out. Then, in 1873 the log jam was removed, and the water level dropped and shipping ended. Without adequate rail service Jefferson fell from it's seat as the premier city in East Texas.

The best known founders are Robert and Harriet Potter. "Love is a Wild Assault" written by Elith Hamilton Kirkland is taken from Harriet Potter's memoirs. Potter was the Republic of Texas' first Secretary of the Navy.

In 1836 Jefferson was the state's largest town and seaport. Cotton was a large part of the prosperity there, and Jefferson seems much more a part of the

"Old South" than the "West". There are wonderful old homes to be seen, a brick paved downtown area which great shops and places to eat and antique shops, antique shops and more antique shops. If you like browsing through antique or junk shops, you will

love Jefferson! Don't miss the museum, either. It is right on the "main drag" and is a nice small museum with some truly beautiful art objects, glassware, porcelains

The Excelsior House Hotel is still open for business, and has tours as well. It is furnished with antiques, but be sure and book in advance!

The Gould Rail Car is across from the hotel, and is interesting. It was used by Jay Gould until his death in 1892. After that the Atalanta became the private car of his son and his daughter. It was brought to East Texas during the oil boom and served as living quarters for the T&P Master and his family. It was purchased by a garden club in 1953 and is 88 ft. long, has four state rooms, a lounge, dining room, kitchen, butler's pantry and bath. The interior woodwork is quite special. Don't forget to notice the magnificent magnolia trees, the Presbyterian Church with it's painted clock faces, the House of Seasons and all the gorgeous house, most of which are in wonderful repair .

Freeman Plantation has an ox road, growing cotton and a 1934 hay barn. There are also boat trips up the river to be taken, those neat shops to drift through, ice cream and soda shops, bakeries and all kinds of other things that can appeal to all ages, including carriage rides.

Nearby is Caddo Lake, worth a tour in it's own right. Indian legend says that the lake was formed at night in the dark of the moon by powerful shaking spirits who were angered at the Caddo Indian Chief (or the New Madrid earthquake of 1811). With it's moss draped cypress there is an eeriness to this

body of water. Annual events include The Jefferson Founders Day Bed and Breakfast Home Tours, and a Taste of Jefferson in October; Candlelight Tours for Christmas when the homes and churches feature traditional decorations; Mardi Gras Upriver in February; Historic Jefferson Pilgrimage in late April and early May, A Country Peddler Show in May, and Riverfront Fireworks for the Fourth of July. There are various theatricals, including the "Diamond

drive, and the town seems to be special at any time of the year. Plan on spending a whole day in Jefferson, it's easy to just wander the streets and enjoy "going back in time" to a town with a lot of history that differs quite a bit from most East Texas towns.

Web Tracks

For those who want to know more about the internet but don't know where to start!

When you get a PC with a modem and get on the Internet, what does one 'do" with it? Five things, basically.

1. E-mail is electronic text and is global in scope. You can attach almost any file (animation, voice, video, etc.) to a message.

- 2. Discussion groups-"Newsgroups" consist of thousands of groups for debate and argument. Also known as the USENET for Users' Network, it was created by and for users and no organization--commercial, federal, or otherwise--had a hand in it originally. In many ways, it has provided much of the attitude of sharing that exists on the Internet today. Be aware that when you post to any newsgroup, you are subject to being added to a mailing list to get junk e-mail. USENET also distributes various electronic journals and publications for newusers.
- 3. Long-distance computing-this was the original inspiration for ARPNET and programmers can maintain accounts on distant computers and run programs there. Libraries offer their electronic card catalogs for free search. CD-ROM catalogs are also available through this service.
- 4. File transfers-this allows users to access and retrieve programs and text. Internet file transfers have become a new form of publishing in which the users simply makes as many copies of that part of a document he or she needs. Programs like "Archie", "Gopher" and "WAIS" catalog documents and allow you to explore enormous archives of material.
- 5. Shopping-Thousands of companies have opened their doors in the electronic shopping mall with retail sales estimated at 518 million dollars in 1996. 1997 should be the first year of real retail action on-line with "secure" credit card transactions available. Advertisers spent an estimated 40 million on the Internet in 1995 and 300 million in 1996. That figure will jump to an estimated 5 billion by the year 2000! At present advertising on the Internet is little banners at the top of web pages that when clicked on will take the user away to a web site hosted by the advertiser. The advertiser is usually charged by the amount of "hits" or times the page on which the ad is on is accessed. (to be continued)



Some fat is good for you

Believe it or not, some fat in your diet is good for you. "Certain dietary fats are essential to maintaining life, "said Lynne W. Scott, a registered dietitian and director of The DeBakey Heart Center's Diet Modification Clinic at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Fat has several important functions in the body, according to Scott. It is the most dense source of calories, providing more than twice the calories of carbohydrates or protein. Fat spares protein so that protein can be used to build and repair tissue instead of being used for energy. Fat also helps with absorption of vitamins like A, D, E, and K.

Fats comes in three types - - saturated, monounsaturated and polyunsaturated. Saturated fats are found in meat with fat and whole milk dairy products and vegetable fats such as coconut and palm oils.

Common oils such as canola, safflower, corn and olive oil contain all three types of fat. These oils all have the same amount of fat and calories. Canola oil has the lowest amount of saturated fat.

Besides its health benefits, fat helps satisfy your appetite, Scott says. People like the taste of fat. It adds to the palatability of food, "she said. "Fat slows down the rate at which food leaves the stomach and produces a feeling of fullness after a

Although ingredients such as egg yolk, sour cream and cream cheese may be satisfying, they are also high in saturated fat. The key is modera-

The American Heart Association recommends a diet with nor more that 30 percent of the calories from fat. For example, an adult requiring 2500 calories a day should get no more that 80 grams of fat a day. Knowing what kind of fat to choose is important in making wise fat choices.

Scott, who has authored a book," The New Living Heart Diet," offers the following tips on choosing lowfat, yet nutritious foods.

Read the food label and check for calorie and fat content. A low fat food has three grams of fat or less per

* Choose lean types of meat like chicken breasts without skin, fish and the leanest cuts of beef and pork.

* Prepare foods with little or no added fat. Cook vegetables with fresh herbs, spices, garlic and onions... "Paint" you cooking pan using a paper towel with a small amount of canola oil or olive oil, or use a non fat

* Don't mistake fat free foods for calorie free foods. Some brands of fat free cookies, for example, are higher in calories that their regular counter-

Most of you have been to or through Mt. Vernon. It's not really a full "day trip" from most of this area, but it is a pleasant town and there is more to see and do there than one might imagine.

Mt. Vernon, in Franklin County, lies on Hwy... 37 South and is very

close to Interstate 30. The area was settled in 1830 by Joshua T. Johnson and named Keith's for Stephen Keith, who donated 24 acres for a townsite when a post office as established. Two years later the name changed to Lone Star in reference to the nickname of Texas, but some confusion developed with a community of the same name elsewhere. At the first commissioner's court meeting held in J.E. Brook's barn, after the county was established in 1875, saloons, gambling and racetracks were outlawed and a new name, honoring George Washington's home in Virginia was selected, thus it became Mt. Vernon.

Mt. Vernon is the county seat of Franklin county and has an attractive square and a colonial styled courthouse in keeping with it's namesake.

One of the most charming things about the town is a project undertaken some years ago that has small signs in the front yards of older homes with historical interest. These name the original builders, or identify how the house is known, and list the current owners and the date the house was

There is a driving tour (the chamber of commerce can give you a brochure and map) of homes, and many of them are worth seeing.

There is a small library, a nice little fountain, a museum in the old depot building that has lots of farm equipment, and some very attractive shops. Antique shops, ice cream parlors, old fashioned soda fountains and a pizza place or cajun cafe make a walk around or just off the small square delightful.

Out towards the interstate there are more good eateries, and there is the added attraction of miles of beautiful country roads, especially pretty during the spring. Watch for the jewels of small blue birds darting along

fences rows Dairy cattle are in evidence there, as well as beef cattle, and nearby Lake Cypress Springs is surrounded by tall pines. Bass fishing, boating, jet skiing are really good on the lake.

Every year the town has Festiv'All, a Fine Arts and Ethnic East Texas event, always held the weekend after July 4th. There is an art show, courthouse concert, historical reenactments, exhibits, ethnic food booths, car show, evening street dance and much more.

There are three bed and breakfasts, all of which will do dinner by reservation, all in charming houses.

Take some time to explore this pretty small town. The Franklin County




