Web Tracks

For those who want to know more about the internet but don't know where to start!

The free ride on the Internet appears to be over. On Monday, May 12th, UUNET Technologies, Inc. said it would begin charging Internet Service Providers (ISPs) for transmitting data traffic if the ISP is unable to handle reciprocal traffic loads from UUNET's network. This would require the ISP to have backbone transmission equipment. Smaller ISPs do not have this

In the telecommunications industry, carriers pay each other fees based on the amount of traffic traveling over each other's network. The action by UUNET will make the Internet access business more closely resemble the economics of the telecommunications business.

The federal telecommunications reform of last year required that the FCC provide schools and low-income and rural areas with advanced phone and Net services. On May 7th, the FCC enacted a plan to make Net access affordable

The plan will pay for itself by charges to businesses and residences with extra phone lines. It seems they have slammed the door forever on per-minute charges for Net access. Long distance providers will be charged \$2.20 for each added line. The phone companies, of course, will pass this along to their customers. Businesses will pay and additional \$2 for each additional phone line, making the increase to businesses about \$4.20 per month by next year. A ISP with 100 lines would have new charges of \$420 a month. The first increase of 40 cents will be billed in July. Direct fees to businesses could increase by about \$1.50 a year for the next three years. Residences with extra phone lines will pay \$1.50-\$2.50 plus the \$2.20 charge for the privilege. The residential rate will go up by \$1 every year until 2001.

\$2.25 billion each year will be allocated for discounted Net access for disadvantaged schools and libraries. Rural health care providers will have access to \$400 million a year for high-speed Net connections.

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
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

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

After packing for cold weather, we found it to be in the 80's, which was quite a surprise, if not an unwelcome one. Phil kept saying for us not to count on the weather holding, that it was supposed to snow later that week. Naturally, we assumed he was kidding.

We stopped by the English city of Bath to see the Roman baths. It was fascinating to tour through the only hot spring in Britain and see the amazing lifestyle the ancient Romans lived. Hollow floors allowed hot water to circulate under them, heating the

rooms, a huge bathing pool provided mineral baths. At one time Bath had quite a large complex of temples, bath houses and rooms.

We then went down to the oldest shop in Bath, Sally Lunn's bakery. Huge, fresh baked buns combined with a variety of choices for delicious

Aquick drive around Bath showed us the renowned Georgian architecture with the graceful, timeless doors and their intricate fan lights above them. We learned from Phil that the number of chimneys a house had used to be a status symbol.

Leaving Bath we took back roads and it was truly lovely. The hillsides were coated with bright yellow, the oil producing plant Rape. Phil said that they are genetically engineering a blue colored strain of the plant. It has a rather pungent odor, not unpleasant but not exceptionally pleasant, either. In the United States it is known as Canola seed.

It wasn't long until we crossed the Severn River's gracefully soaring new bridge into Wales. Tired out of our overnight flight we were delighted to check into Sant Y. Nyll House just outside of Cardiff overlooking the Vale of Glamorgan

This elegant, slightly shabby house provided us with big rooms overlooking the gorgeous vale or valley. It sits among beautiful grounds that feature dove cots, a couple of friendly dogs, banty chickens, geese with goslings and a couple of ghosts.

Yes, that's what I said, a couple of ghosts. At least that's what Paul Renwick, our host claims. One, he says, is simply a warm, friendly presence in the room next to ours. The other is out by the old wood shop and is the sound of a horse and trap loaded with lumber that goes rattling by during the night. Our host told us about these ghosts with a perfectly straight face...but a gleam in his eye. Paul is a tall, thin man with a white moustache. He and his wife Monica spent thirty years farming in South Africa, and they have a wonderful collection of Africa carvings, collectors items and paintings throughout the house,

as well as centuries old English antiques. It is a place where the more you look, the more you discover ... tiny animal carvings perched on lampshades, an ostrich egg in a wardrobe, sea shells tucked into flower

I will warn you know, the names in Wales are difficult for those not accustomed to them. Sant Y Nyll is not pronounced in the way it sounds, and is one of the simpler names we can

After a nice hot bath in a seven foot long tub with enormous brass faucets we all felt better, and roamed around the grounds, talking to members of the family, out enjoying the gorgeous weather with their small children.

We went down the hill to the Three horseshoes, a local pub, for our dinner, experimenting with Indian food such as chicken balti, and laughing at a commercial for a beer brewed only the Cardiff, Wales area. The name of this beer is "Brains" and the commercial features aliens landing and saying "We've come to drink your brains". Of course, the poor Welsh people in the commercial flee in fear of their lives!

As dusk fell we looked over the ruins of an old stone windmill where once, history say, Cromwell's troops fought a huge battle, slaughter thousands in the area. It's a wonder the ghosts of those poor men aren't out haunting the field next to where we slept, or that Paul Renneck hasn't created that story, anyway!

The wisteria was blooming over our second story window, and as the last light faded I was treated to a view of exquisite beauty. Before me the Vale of Glamorgan spread in it's misty glory, delicately laced trees, stone fences, dozens of shades of lush green grass were all highlighted with the occasional slate-roofed cottage with a warm light shining forth as if in welcome. It was a scene to soothe the most turbulent soul, and it did mine a great deal of good.

So it was early to bed and ready for a big day in the Welsh countryside the next day. We'll continue on through St. Fagan's Folk Life center and a Mayfest, and then to a real coal


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
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

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Seniors awarded scholarships from TNP



The Patriots would soon find out why the Yellowjackets were rising a 20-game winning streak. By the fifth inning, they had put up 15 runs to the Patriots none.



Understanding Tornadoes



If you are caught in your office during a tornado, move toward the center, away from windows, and lie flat.

(NAPS)—Knowing when a tornado is coming can save your life...if you know what to do.

 A young woman from Wichita Falls, Texas, got into the storm cellar with her family but the wind blew the door open. So they just got into one corner and got down together. They survived that 1979 tornado.

• In a 1982 Illinois tornado, a man ran with his wife and year-old daughter into the center bathroom (they had no basement), where the woman and child lay in the bathtub, while he lay on the floor beside them. "We could hear the house coming apart," the father said. All that was left was the bathroom and two interior walls.

• An insurance agent in Huntsville, Alabama, and his staff huddled under a desk as their office

was flattened by a tornado in 1989.
An Indiana man felt his mobile home rocking, then he dropped from the door to the ground as the home was being lifted into the air by a tornado before being shattered.

• Caught driving during a 1994 tornado in Wisconsin, a man survived by getting out of his car and lying on his stomach on a gravel parking lot.

How can these examples help you survive? The safety experts at State Farm Insurance point out that you can learn the following:

Don't stay in a mobile home. Seek shelter elsewhere, even if it's lying flat on the ground.

nado is underground, as in a basement or storm cellar, ideally under something sturdy such as a work bench. In this case, being away from the door also was important.

• The bathroom is another alternative because it's reinforced and because of the presence of heavy objects such as a bathtub.

 People in offices and other places away from home need the same kind of protection. People in a store without underground protection, for example, should move toward the center, away from windows and lie flat.

 Residents in mobile homes, even with tie downs, should seek shelter elsewhere, even if it's lying flat on the ground.

 Automobiles—even large trucks—can be thrown about like toys, so never try to outrun a tornado; get out and find protection.

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
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McCuistion to participate in "Decisions Near the End of Life"

In an effort to improve the capacity of its physicians, nurses and other professionals to communicate more effectively with one another and dying patients and their families, McCuistion Regional Medical Center today announced that it will participate in the nationally respected program Decisions Near the End of

Decisions deals with a set of tough issues, namely the ethical, legal and psychological dilemmas that patients, family members and healthcare providers face when choosing to initiate or forego life-sustaining treatment. The controversy is relatively new, first brought to public attention in 1976 by the Karen Ann Quinlan court decision that allowed removal of life support technology, nurses, physicians, patients and families have had to face an increasing array of difficult choice, fraught with moral and ethical uncertainties.

The Decisions program, which has trained staff from 190 hospitals and nursing homes across the United States since 1991, was co-developed by Education Development Center, Inc. of Newton, MASS, a not for profit educational and research institute, the Hastings Center of Briarcliff NY, a bioethics research and policy

Dr. Mildred Z. Solomon, the project leader at Education Development Center, lauded McCuistion's willingness to examine its own policies and procedures for working with dying patients. For many people, it is not death that is feared but suffering and abandonment.

The Decisions program has five objectives:

to improve clinicians' understanding and medical ethics and their ability to integrate that understanding into clinical practice;

to support the involvement of patients and their families in decisions about the ways in which they live and

to strengthen institutional policies and procedures regarding the use of life sustaining treatments;

to improve communications about healthcare providers, patients and families concerning the difficult medical ethics issues posed by the availability of life sustaining technologies; and

to delineate appropriate roles and responsibilities for the various disciplines involved in critical and terminal care, fostering teamwork, conflict resolution and mutual support. Professionals in these disciplines include physicians, nurses, social workers, attorneys, administrators an pastoral counselors.

The Decisions program has a four part format. First, a leadership team made up of Dr. David Stewart, Digestive Disease Physician; Dr. Donald Lewis, Director of McCuistion's Mobile Clinic; Bob Robertson, RN, Nursing House Supervisor; Bob Campbell, McCuistion Board of Directors and Raymond Armstrong, D.Min., Director of Pastoral Care from McCuistion participated in a three day conference with groups from other institutions in the state and across the country. The purpose of the conference was to prepare staff to assume leadership roles on these issues when they return to their own hospitals or nursing homes. Dr. Stewart, Bob Robertson, Bob Campbell and Raymond Armstrong are members of McCuistion's Ethics Committee.

Second, professional staff from McCuistion who work with critically and terminally ill adults will complete a questionnaire, in order to identify the attitudes and beliefs of their hospital staff regarding ethical issues and practices. Education Developmen Center will analyze the information collected at the participating institutions, and will provide each hospital or nursing home with information that can be used as the basis for a customized training program.

Third, McCuistion will conduct grand rounds and teaching seminars on ethics, using the information gained during the first two steps of the program.

Fourth, on the basis of both the questionnaire and the educational activities, teams within the institution will take specific steps to improve care, such as ensuring that all dying patients receive adequate pain

The hottest topic at a recent Internet trade show was "push technology" is which directly broadcasts customized news or website updates to computer users hooked up to the Internet. Privately held PointCast Incorporated and seeral other start-up companies deliver customized news to computer users seeral times a day. Instead of searching the Web for the data you want, it is sent directly to your PC. I have used PointCast daily for several months and consider it my "morning newspaper". It contains CNN breaking news, weather, sports and several newspapers to browse off-line. Others are rolling out a new service, classified advertising. Several studies shown that hte internet is cutting into television viewing time, giving online newspapers anopportunity to win back some readers they lost to television over the past 30 to 40 years.

On Friday, January 10, 1997, there was an estimated 100,000,000 people onthe Internet. That day there was 1,577, 809 WWW sites onthe Internet.
