## Ocean drilling scientists find meteorite evidence

COLLEGE STATION — An international team of scientists studying deep sea sediments off the coast of South Carolina has recovered new evidence of the large Caribbean meteorite impact that occurred 65 million years ago.

Scientists from the international Ocean Drilling Program (ODP), which is headquartered at Texas A&M University, believe that meteorite collision led to the extinction of the dinosaurs and many other plants and animals at the end of the Cretaceous period.

Deep sea sediment cores collected during the current ODP research expedition include a three- to eight-inch-thick layer of debris that is the blanket of material (dust and gases) ejected into the atmosphere upon meteorite impact.

The airborne debris is thought to have triggered a dramatic decline in the global temperature making Earth uninhabitable for the dinosaurs. Scientists say a mass extinction of marine microorganisms coincided with the disappearance of the dinosaurs.

The sedimentary layer documenting the global repopulation contains some of the earliest new species of microorganisms, a rare find in the oceans.



## Studies show milk milk fat may reduce cancer risk

Drink more milk, eat more butter, and you may lower your chances for getting certain types of cancers, according to a dairy specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

Moreover, the milk from cows that graze East texas pastures may contain more anti-carcinogens-compounds that prevent cancer- tan the milk produced in other regions of the country says Max Sudweeks, who is based at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

The health advantage from consuming dairy products isn't just idle speculation. There's mounting data from both mouse studies and of human populations to show that milk and milk fat may lower the chances of breast, prostate and other cancers. A critical review recently published in the American Journal for Nutritional Sciences summarized more than 70 scientific studies done in the USA and other countries.

The review noted that several studies have shown clearly less tumor development of mice fed butter than those fed margarines made of polyunsaturated oils.

Mice studies were not the only ones that indicated cow's milk and dairy fat lowered the risk of cancer. Another study found that mother's milk from women of the Hare Krishna religious sect contained twice as much conjugated linoleic acid as that of Australian mothers. The Hare Krishna

sect's diet is high in butter and ghee (milk fat). Conjugated linoleic acid is a biological compound associated with the prevention of tumors, particularly tumors of the colon.

In India, where buffalo ghee is a common component of the indigenous population's diet, age-adjusted

breast cancer rates are one-third of that of western women.

According to the review, the primary health advantage from dairy products results from the dairy cow's ability to extract anti-carcinogenic agents such as beta-carotene and betaionone from its feed and transfer them to milk. Though some of these anticarcinogenic agents come from ration components such as cottonseed meal, the more significant ones, such as beta-carotene, come from consumption of live forages-pastures.

East Texas is known for its pastures. Because of our region's mild winters, grazing animals spend a proportionately greater time on pasture her. Grazing live pasture makes for more healthful milk so East Texas' long grazing period should mean milk produced here should be some of the most healthful in the world.





## From The Pastor's Heart

**Teams and Seams** 

Everyone has the responsibility of reaching people for Christ. This charge comes from Matthew 28:16 as Jesus commands us "to go into the world". There are two characteristics that we do not understand to the point that we are willing to put them to practice. These are that the commissioner is for everyone regardless of age, and that "the world" begins in your own home and neighborhood. We know this, we just do not understand it to praxis. Praxis is a word that means "putting to practice" above theory or knowledge. It means taking what you do know and doing something constructive with it. When Jesus calls us to "make disciples" he calls us to practice what we preach. Jesus calls us to praxis.

When I was a boy my Uncle Todd would take me and his children to the city parks and streets and he would teach us by example how to reach people for Christ. I do not see this kind of praxis hardly anymore. The parks used to have its share of young people singing, dancing and witnessing for Christ but I do not see that anymore as well. I think something should be done to correct this situation. So, I have created TEAM (Teens Evangelism and Mission).

I want to hear from young people from 12 to 40 that wish to learn how to witness in the streets, the parks, the malls, the schools, the anywhere there are people. I am forming groups of TEAM, young people putting their knowledge of Christ to praxis. If you are such a person call me (652-4925/652-5017) and tell me you are ready to hit the streets for Christ. After I see how many TEAMS will available, I will announce through this paper a date in August for us to gather and organize our groups for a September start date. We will begin with a worship service at the Paris Jr. College and then disperse to points around the county. Jeff Jackson, a teenage preacher from Bogata will be our featured speaker for the worship service and music will be provided by other young people from all over

What do you have to be able to do to be a TEAM member? Nothing special, you just have to have a desire to witness for the Lord and call me and leave your name and phone number. However, if you have a special interest, like music, drama, health-care, carpentry, feeding the hungry, or whatever, then we want to pair you with others that have similar interest.

I still have fond memories of the street plays and singing we did on the streets of Dallas. I remember the people we talked to and prayed for. I remember the houses we painted, the yards we cleaned, the food and clothing we gave. It made me feel good as a teenager to know that I could make a difference with another person's life. Who knows, if the young people of this land started a movement of evangelism and mission maybe some of the older, wiser generation would join us.

So, what if you are an older person and you think this is a good idea. Can you be involved? You know it! Each TEAM group will need adult supervision and what would be wrong in developing SEAM (Seniors Evangelism and Mission) groups as well? You know, I think the Lord had something there when he commanded us to "go out and make disciples". When was the last time you made a disciple for Christ? Like the chili commercial, that's too long!
