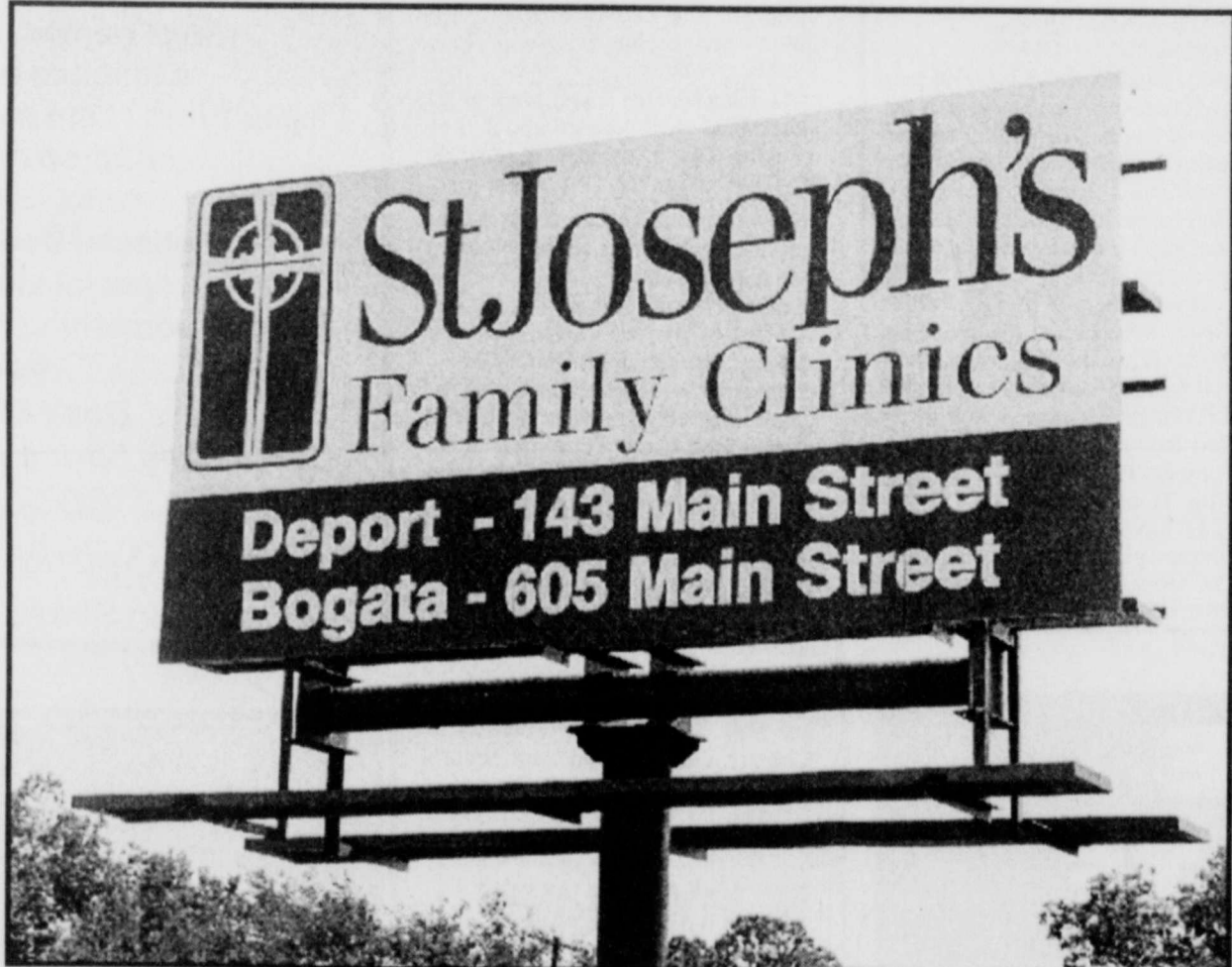

Prairiland ISD begins 1997-98 year

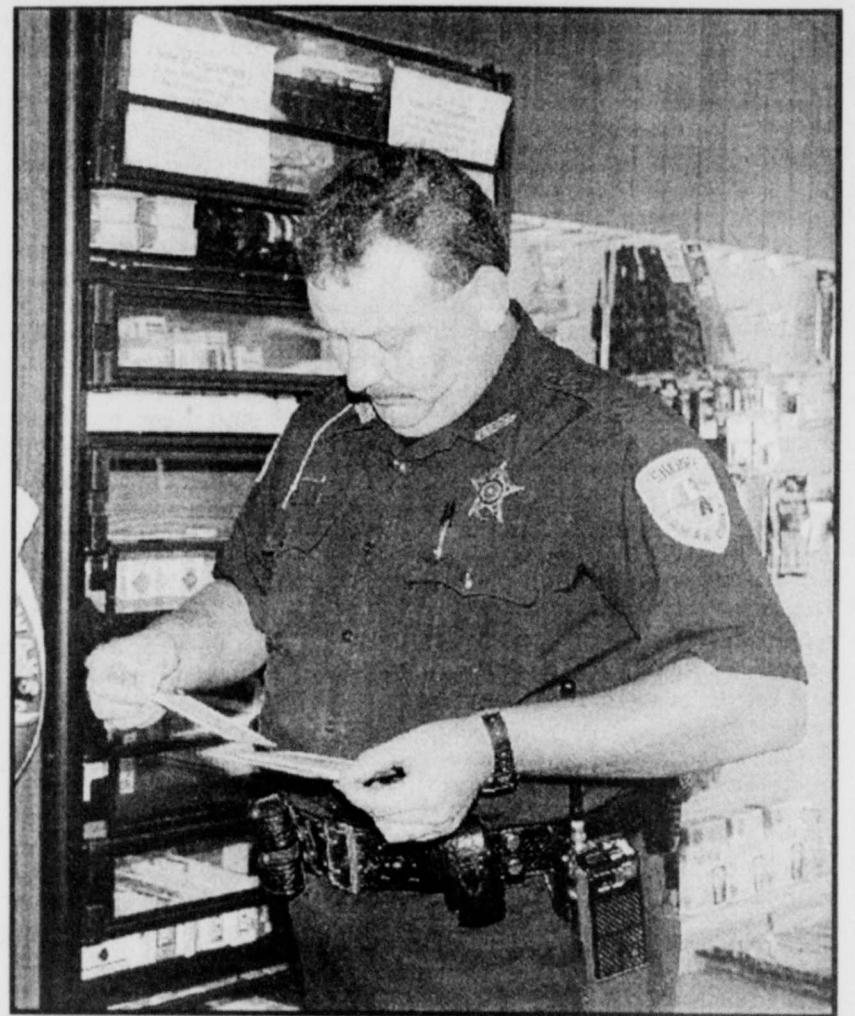

The annual Red River Valley Fair will open Tuesday, August 26 and run through Saturday, August 30 at the Paris Fairgrounds.

This week is our "Salute to the Sardine". You know that lowly, silver, smelly little fish that no one likes! Well, surely someone likes him. . . . I found sardine recipes! That's right sardine recipes. They had their own place in a cookbook, maybe it was a 1940's cookbook. . . but there were recipes. I could not resist it. . . so here they are! But first let me give you some facts about sardines.

Sardines are members of the herring family (European sardines are *Sardina pilchardus* and Pacific sardines are *Sardinops sagax*--you never know when this might come up in conversation--so be ready!) and an important food fish. The word sardine refers to several groups of "fishes". It is used mainly for such species as the Pacific sardine or pilchard. Other members of the herring family, including sprats and young Atlantic herring, are also sold as sardines. The name sardine was given to the fish because they were first caught near (you guessed it!) Sardinia, an Italian island in the Mediterranean Sea.

Sardines live in warm ocean waters near the shores of almost all the continents. They are especially plentiful off the coast of Japan, northwestern Africa and western South America. They average 9-12 inches in length and about 4 ounces in weight. The upper part of their body is bluish-gray and the lower part is silvery. Adult sardines usually swim in large schools. They feed on small animals and plant life called plankton.

Most sardines are caught at night with special nets with the worldwide catch totaling about 11-1/4 million

short tons or 10.2 million metric tons. In other words, lots of the little critters!

Cans of sardines are seen in grocery stores. Canneries precook sardines and remove part of their natural oil and moisture. Sardine oil is used in products such as linoleum, paint and varnish along with animal feeds and fertilizers. Small ones are used as bait in commercial tuna fisheries.

Sardines and Fried Onions. Okay. . . . and Amy thought just plain liver and onions was bad!

Sardines and Eggs on Toast would not be one to have for every day for breakfast. . . . maybe a weekend treat!

Sardines and Crackers the perfect thing to send with your spouse on a hunting trip. What other human would want to get near them!

We hope you enjoyed our little bit of fun with the sardine and if anyone ever got deserted on a desert island, I'm sure if they got hungry enough, sardines would be wonderful. See you in the kitchen!

Salute to the Sardine

Broiled Deviled Sardines
Serves 4-6

2 cans large boneless sardines
4 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons dry mustard
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup fine cracker crumbs
1 lemon

Drain oil from sardines. Cream butter and work the mustard and Worcestershire into it. Spread both sides of the sardines with the deviled butter. Roll sardines in crumbs until well coated. Place in a shallow pan and broil 5 minutes or until golden brown. Serve hot with quarters of lemon.

Sardines and Spinach
Serves 4-6

1 cup medium white sauce
2-1/2 cups cooked spinach
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 cans sardines

Combine sauce, spinach, salt and pepper. Heat thoroughly. Put sardines in broiler and brown both sides. Put in center of platter and surround with spinach.

Sardines and Mashed Potatoes
Serves 4-6

2 cups mashed potatoes
2 cans sardines
1/2 tablespoon lemon juice

Line bottom of baking dish with half of potatoes. Arrange sardines on top. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Cover with remaining potatoes. Bake in moderately hot oven until potatoes are brown.

Sardines and Fried Onions
Serves 4-6

6 sliced onions
1/4 cup cooking fat
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cans sardines

Fry onions in fat. Sprinkle with salt. Place in mound on hot platter, surround with sardines.

Sardines and Eggs on Toast
Serves 4-6


3 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1-1/2 cup milk
4 sliced-hard cooked eggs
2 cans sardines
6 slices toast
1/2 teaspoon paprika

Blend butter and flour. Add salt, mustard and milk. Cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Add eggs and heat. Arrange sardines on toast. Heat in broiler. Remove to hot platter. Pour over egg sauce. Sprinkle with paprika. If desired 2 teaspoon chopped onions may be added to the sauce. Flaked salmon, tuna fish or mackerel may be used instead of sardines.

Sardines and Crackers
Serves 1

2 cans sardines
box of crackers
salt and pepper to taste
large onion sliced

Set alarm for 4:00 a.m.. Pack sardines, crackers and onion in knapsack. Travel to nearest fishing hole or deer stand. Wait for first light and hope for very large bass or trophy buck.

Clover management is important for pastures

How to properly manage clovers in pastureland is a question often asked at the Natural Resources Conservation Service. To a large extent the answer depends on landowners particular type of pasture and how it is managed.

Growing clovers and grasses in combination does require more management than if either plant were

grown by itself. But, there are a number of advantages in growing a combination of both. Besides offering additional grazing in the late winter and early spring, cloves will increase the protein of the forage. They also add nitrogen to the soil by taking from the air and fixing it in small modules on the root system of the plant.

One clover that to focus your attention on is Red Clover, which is being grown in Red River County with much success. One of the ranchers growing clover is Charles L. VanDeaver.

Red Clover is a late maturing legume. It does well on high lime soils with a pH near neutral to slightly alkaline. Soils in Red River County with this description are near the Clarksville and Whiterock areas. Most of the soils will need large amounts of phosphate and some potash to grow red clover.

Most local ranchers use this legume in a grass mixture. The grass-legume mixture is harvested for hay and is allowed to make seed between cuttings. Red Clover turns a dark color when cut, but the hay is eaten readily by cattle.

Charles L. VanDeaver has a good start of red clove located about .3 of a mile south of the hospital. VanDeaver has the clover in a mixture with common bermudagrass and tail fescue. When asked how long he has had the clover, VanDeaver replied, "about 25 years."

Most of the red clover grown in this area is the Kenland variety. However, several other varieties of red clover are being grown in the United States. Red Clover is mainly biennial. The seed germinates and produces a green plant the first year. During the second winter, the plant makes new growth and produces flowers and seed during spring.

Red Clover should be planted on adapted soils from September 15 to November 15. Pastures can be overseeded with 10 pounds of seed per acre. For more information on Clovers, contact your local Natural Resources Conservation Service at 1606 East Main Street in Clarksville.

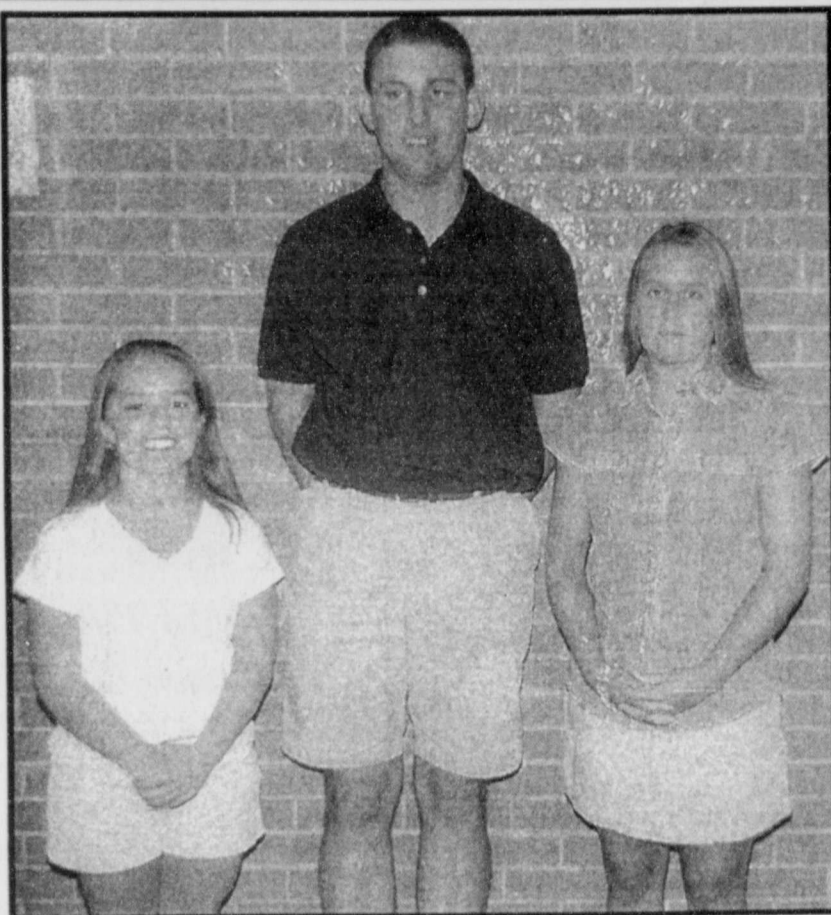

Lady Pat cheerleaders earn awards

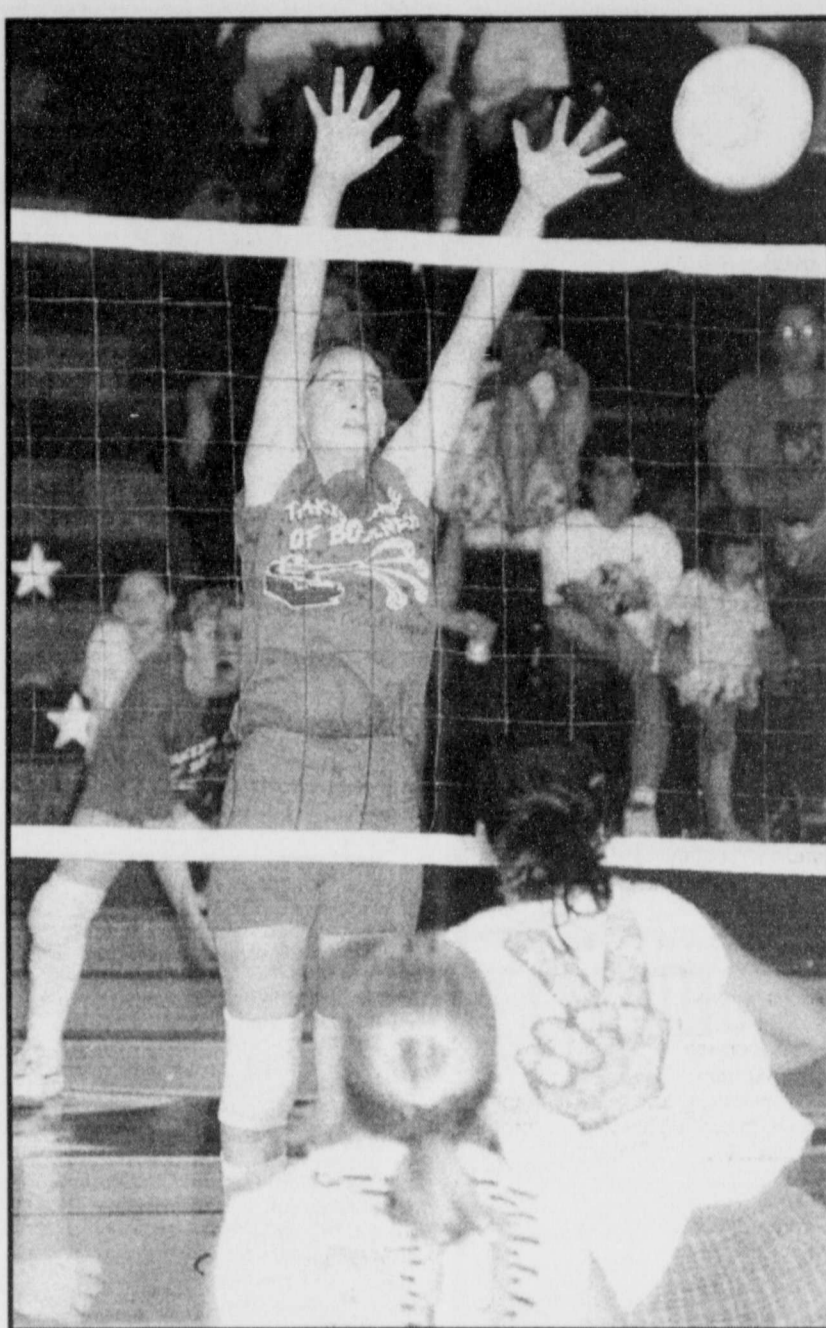

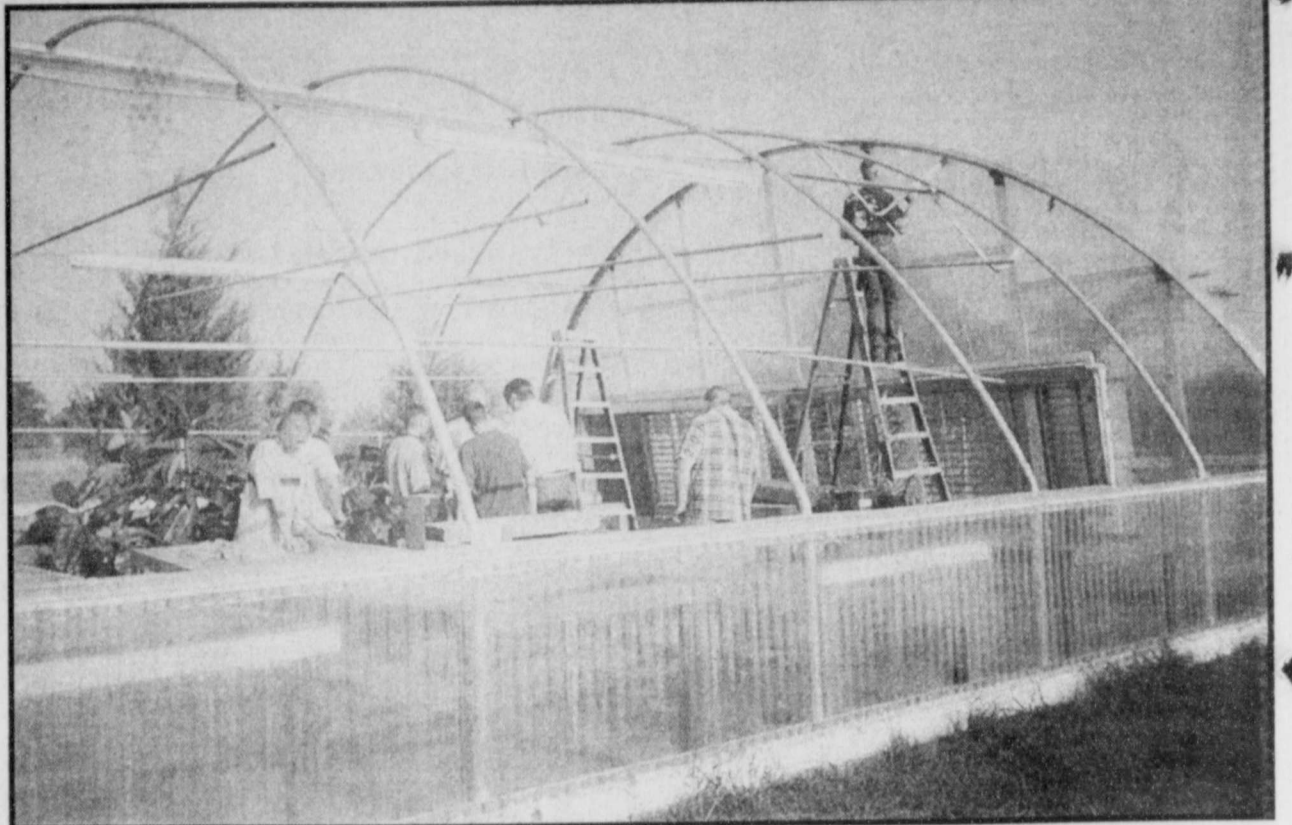
