





Salute to the Sardine

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This week is our "Salute to the Sardine". You know that lowly, silver, smelly little fish that no one likes! Well, surely someone likes him. . . . I found sardine recipes! That's right sardine recipes. They had their own place in a cookbook, maybe it was a 1940'scookbook... but there were recipes. I could not resist it. . .so here they are! But first let me give you some facts about sardines.


Sardines are members of the herring family (European sardines are Sardina pilchardus and Pacific sardines are Sardinops sagax--you never know when this might come up in conversation--so be ready!) and an important food fish. The word sardine refers to several groups of "fishes". It is used mainly for such species as the Pacific sardine or pilchard. Other members of the herring family, including sprats and young Atlantic herring, are also sold as sardines. The name sardine was given to the fish because they were first caught near (you guessed it!) Sardinia, an Italian island in the Mediterranean Sea.

Sardines live in warm ocean waters near the shores of almost all the continents. They are especially plentiful off the coast of Japan, northwestern Africa and western South America. They average 9-12 inches in length and about 4 ounces in weight. The upper part of their body is bluishgray and the lower part is silvery. Adult sardines usually swim in large schools. They feed on small animals and plant life called plankton.

Most sardines are caught at night with special nets with the worldwide catch totaling about 11-1/4 million

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Cans of sardines are seen in grocery stores. Canneries precook sardines and remove part of their natural oil and moisture. Sardine oil is used in products such as linoleum, paint and varnish along with animal feeds and fertilizers. Small ones are used as bait in commercial tuna fisheries





Memorials are requested to be made to the American Cancer Society.





with this description are near the Clarksville and Whiterock areas. Most of the soils will need large amounts of phosphate and some potash to grow red clover.

Most local ranchers use this legume in a grass mixture. The grasslegume mixture is harvested for hay and is allowed to make seed between cuttings. Red Clover turns a dark color when cut, but the hay is eaten readily by cattle.

Charles L. VanDeaver has a good start of red clove located about .3 of a mile south of the hospital. VanDeaver has the clover in a mixture with common bermudagrass and


tail fescue. When asked how long he has had the clover, VanDeaver replied, "about 25 years."

Most of the red clover grown in this area is the Kenland variety. However, several other varieties of red clover are being grown in the United States. Red Clover is mainly biennial. The seed germinates and produces a green plant the first year. During the second winter, the plant makes new growth and produces flowers and seed during spring.

Red Clover should be planted on adapted soils from September 15 to November 15. Pastures can be overseeded with 10 pounds of seed per acre. For more information on Clovers, contact your local Natural Resources Conservation Service at 1606 East Main Street in Clarksville.


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
