For Juanita Davis of Deport it is definitely "Life in the Fast Lane". To prove it, she has been named the Lone Star Street Rod Association's "Lady Street Rodder, 1997". Now, before anyone calls the highway patrol, being in the fast lane doesn't mean that Juanita drives fast, but that she is constantly "on the go" attending Street Rod Runs.

She received the state street rod association's top award for women May 31, 1998, at a state meet in Hillsboro, Texas. She has even been invited to write a column for Street Scene magazine's "Lady Rodder" column. Modestly, Juanita is not sure she wants to do that!

Juanita and her husband, Sonny, attended their first rod run in 1989 at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. They were hooked from then on. They now have a 1934 Ford Pickup, a 1940 Model Sedan and a 1929 Ford Roadster.

Sonny does the work on the machines, but Juanita is comfortable in them, even to attending rod runs that aren't too far away by herself when work keeps Sonny from being able to go.

They attend street rod meets (known as rod runs) from April through November, at least one or two per month.

Enthusiastically, Juanita says "the best thing about being part of this is getting to meet people from all over and keep contact with them." She and Sonny are members of the North East Texas Travelers, and they really enjoy being friends with other members and travelling as a group, too.

The furthest away from their home in Deport they have been? St. Paul, Minnesota.

In 1997 Juanita retired from teaching at Deport Junior High, where she was an exemplary history teacher for many years. While she misses the kids, she likes having more time for street rodding!

Unlike antique car buffs who keep their vehicles "classic", street rodders customize their machines with vibrant colors, body modifications, big engines and lots of chrome and accessories. Many rod runs are charity events, raising money for a wide variety of worthy causes. A rod run is a meet, not a race.

Of course, Sonny and Juanita have time for their two adult sons, Jay and Dickie, and their grandson Brandon.

When asked if she has any other hobbies besides street rodding she grins "There's not TIME for anything but this".

With an excited smile, Juanita says "I never expected such an honor, I'm just overwhelmed!". Watching her enthusiasm, excitement and devotion to street rodding it isn't difficult to see why Juanita Davis has been awarded the State Lady Rodder award. Congratulate her if you get the chance, but you might want to hurry, she probably going to be on her way out of town!

I made my first batch of homemade ice cream for the year on Monday night for my daughter Amy's birthday. This is what she wanted and so I dug out the freezer after a desperate search for the paddle that goes into the middle of the container. 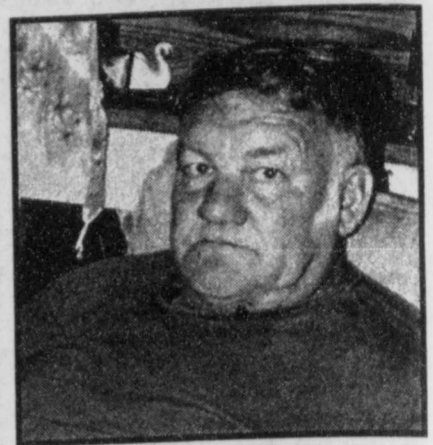

Frozen Dessert

1 egg yolk
1 teaspoon sugar
1 teaspoon vinegar
1 cup marshmallow cream
1 pint whipping cream
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons powdered sugar
1 can pineapple tidbits
1 can peaches
1 jar maraschino cherries
1/2 to 1 cup chopped pecans

Cook egg yolk, sugar and vinegar. Add marshmallow cream; stir until mixed. Chill. Whip 1 pint whipping cream, add vanilla, powdered sugar and fold in pineapple, peaches, cherries and pecans. Freeze 12 hours and slice and serve. If you use Cool Whip in place of whipping cream, omit powdered sugar and vanilla.

Frozen Strawberry Goodie

1 large box vanilla wafers-crushed
2 boxes strawberries-crush w/juice
2 beaten eggs
1/2 cup oleo or margarine
1 pound powdered sugar
1 large Cool Whip

Crush wafers and spread all but 1 cup in 9x13 dish. Cook beate eggs, oleo and sugar over low heat till thickened. Pour over wafers. Let cool and spread strawberries on evenly. Spread Cool Whip on top and nuts if desired. Add remaining cup of wafers. Freeze and serve frozen.

Frozen Hawaiian Pops

bananas
peaches rings
Hawaiian Punch

Insert popsicle stick into a one-inch slice of banana. Place banana at bottom of cup with stick up. Cut up peach slice or ring around banana. Pour punch over to one-half inch of top. Cover with foil and freeze.

2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon milk
4 tablespoons flour
4 eggs-separated

Mix 1 cup sugar, flour and egg yolk and 1 quart milk together. Cool until thick. Add remaining milk, sugar and vanilla. Beat egg whites stiff and add last.

Chocolate-add 5 tablespoons cocoa to custard mixture
Caramel Nut-carmelize 1/2 cup sugar by melting and browning on top pf stove. Add nuts.
Strawberry-add 1 pint crushed strawberries
Homemade Vanilla Ice Cream #2

1 egg
5/8 cup sugar
1-3/4 cup milk
3/4 cup whipped cream
5/8 tablespoon vanilla
1/8 teaspoon salt

Mix all ingredients together and put into ice cream freezer. Mix until done

Strawberry or Peach Ice Cream

6 tablespoons flour
3 cups sugar
1 teaspoon salt
4 cups milk
6 eggs

1-1/2 pints strawberries or peaches
2 tablespoon lemon juice
4 cups half and half
2 tablespoon vanilla
dash red food coloring-optional

In a heavy three-quart sauce pan, combine flour, 2 cups sugar and 1 teaspoon salt. Beat in milk and eggs until blended. Cook over medium heat stirring until mixture thickens and soats spoon. Cool. Crush berries or peaches with lemon juice and 1 cup sugar. Pour half and half, vanilla and coloring, egg mixture and fruit into freezer.

Jack Herrington gives history of Lennox house to Fulbright Club

Red River County District and County Attorney Jack Herrington met with the Fulbright Community Club on Monday evening, with the main

topic of discussion being the Lennox House in Clarksville.

Herrington, who is also president of the Red River County Historical Society, gave a short history of the house and the Lennox family. The Queen Anne style home was built in the 1890's and was given to the Red River County Historical Society two years ago. Some historians believe that the house was built in 1895 and some say 1898.

The house was built by Martha Washington Lennox' father, Charles David Lennox, Sr. He was involved in farming, raising cattle and banking. The Lennox family owned approximately 21,000 acres of land from Sulphur River to the Red River in Red River County. The family was noted as one of the early Texas settlers. In fact, Martha Lennox grandfather, Albert Hamilton Latimer, signed the Texas Declaration of Independence. The house is located at 601 Broadway in Clarksville.

All the furniture in the home has been completely refinished as well as the doors and hardwood floors. New windows made in the exact design of the originals, with double panes, have been installed throughout the house. Six fireplaces were found in the house, but only five could be refurbished. Most of the light fixtures were replaced with new fixtures fashioned after Victorian type fixtures of the time.

Air conditioning and heating have also been added to the home. Funding for the restoration of the Lennox house has been provided through the Lennox Foundation. Over the past two years, \$500,000.00 has been spent on the project.

An open house will be held the second Saturday in October. At the present, tours by appointment are being conducted at the house for an admission fee of \$5.00 per person.

The house is also available for weddings and other special events. The money raised from the tours and special events will be used by the Historical Society to maintain the facility.

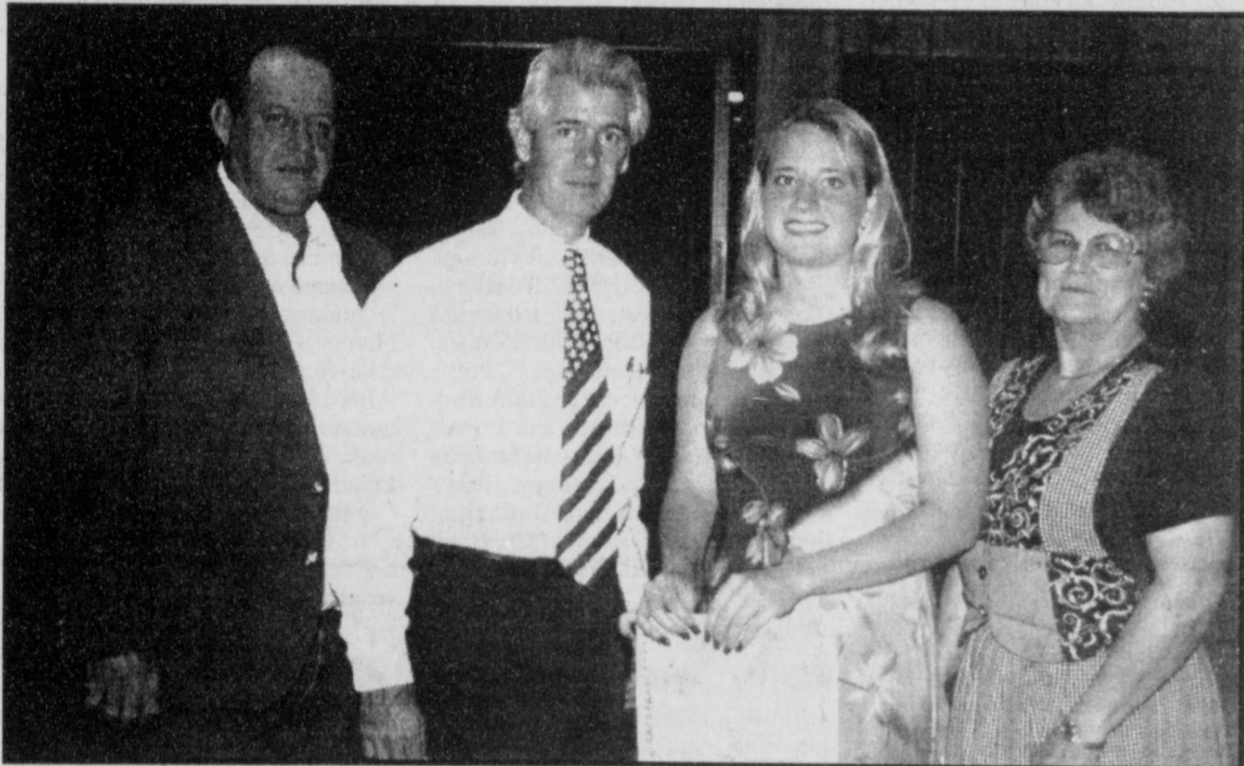

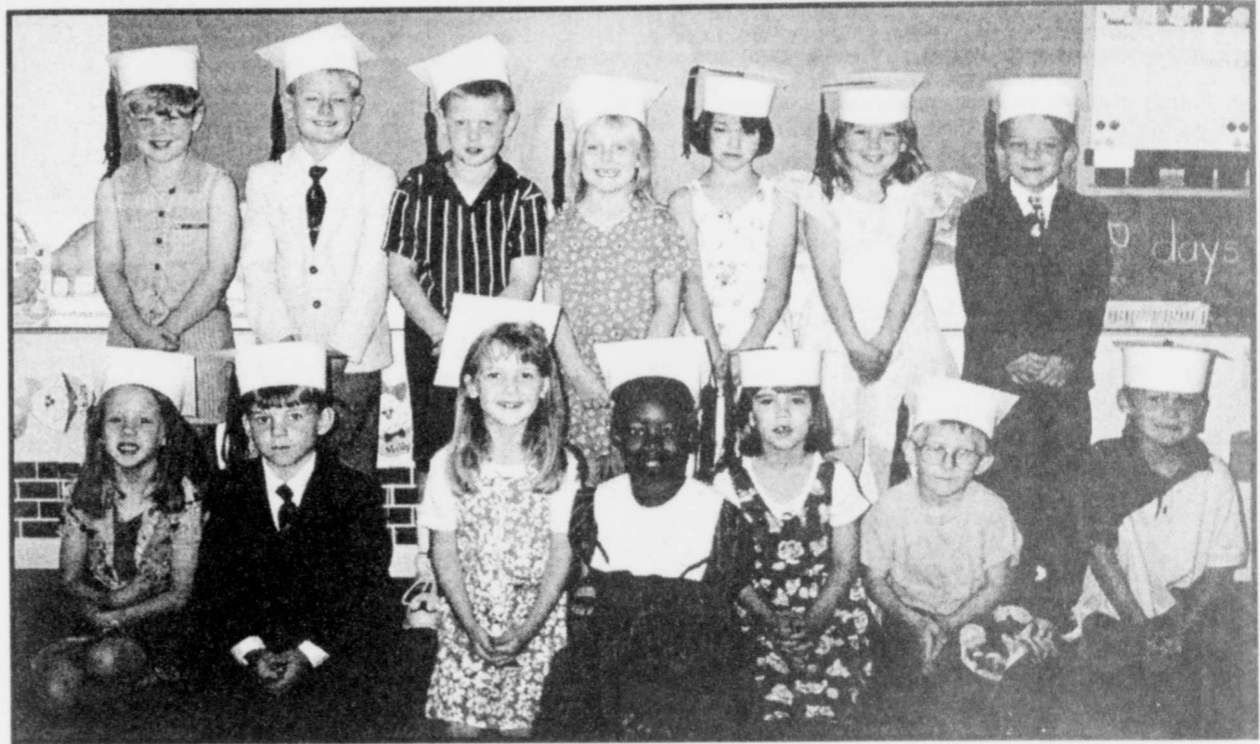

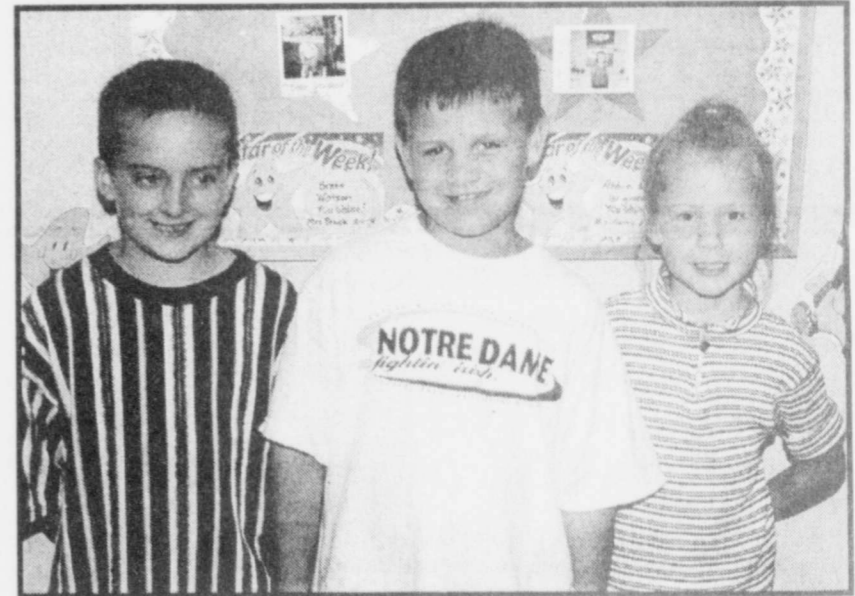
