Old plumbers never die, they just remember close calls!

Roy Lee Castlebury was the first person to give us a call about our request concerning what plumber's candles were for.

Roy's brother, Elton Castlebury, is seventy-five years old and lives in Columbus, Mississippi.

Upon reading my column last week Roy called his brother, who said that plumber's candles were simply used for light in dark spots before the advent of flashlights.

He reports that they were frequently fixed to pieces of two by four lumber to give them a very stable base when crawling around under houses.

In addition, plumbers would rub the wax from these specially made candles onto a joint of lead pipe to help it slip together easier when plumbing old fashioned metal pipes.

Elton recalls that the last time he ever used a candle was in the 1940s in Paris, Texas. He had not purchased a flashlight, which were just truly becoming common.

As he crawled around under a house over on Pine Bluff in Paris he was happily using his lighted candle. He peeled a patch from a sewer line to begin work and a pocket of sewer gas ignited!

He says that "we darned near burned the house down". He also was without eyebrows for some time!

Apparently after that he decided an electric flash light would be an excellent investment. Don't blame him a bit.

On Tuesday night we had a call from a long-time subscriber, Wayne Grogan, who wanted to put a lady who lives next door to them on the phone. She was Mary Jordan De Briyn, formerly of Victoria, Texas. Her father was mayor of Victoria for 14 years, and started out working as a plumber. She confirmed what Mr. Castlebury had told us. The wife of a retired Airforce Colonel, Mary recalled that when she and her husband went to the Azores in the 40s her dad sent a number of plumber's candles with them because electricity there was so uncertain.

A number of other people agreed with the these two as to the uses of the sturdy little candle.

So, once more my plea for information has yielded the answer. I think we have more knowledge floating around out there among our readers than the internet has...after all, the internet failed to turn up anything at all on this subject.

## Truck downs power pole on Church Street in Deport

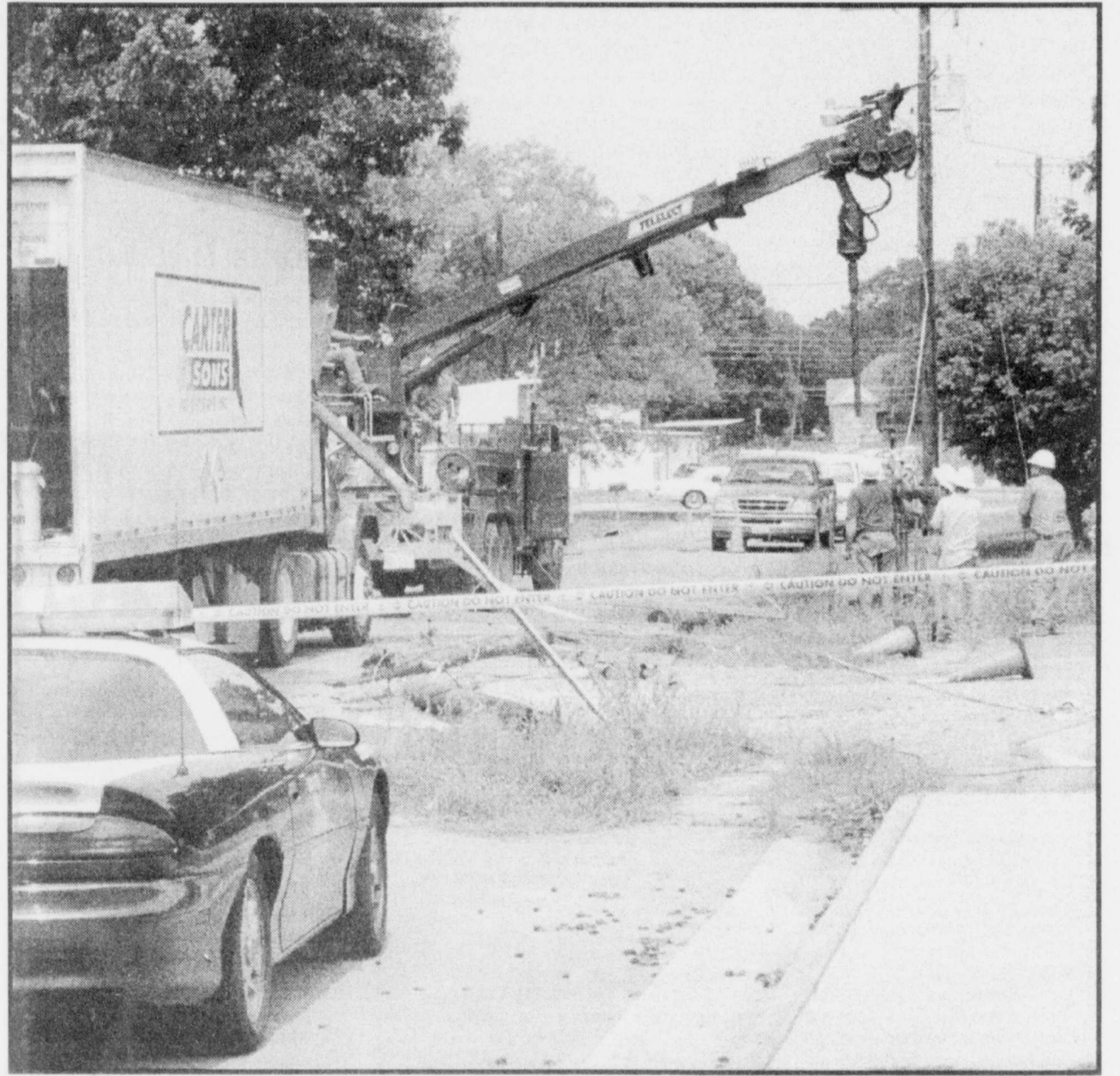
A power outage occurred at approximately 12:45 p.m. Monday, June 8 when a delivery truck belonging to Carter and Son of Carrollton, Texas and driven by Grady Jones caught a n overhead cable and broke a Texas-New Mexico utility pole, according to a spokesman for Texas-New Mexico Power said Tuesday.

The truck was making a freight delivery to Deport School. The damage caused a spill of transformer oil. Precautionary measures were taken in the clean up of the spill. A sample of the spilled oil was sent to be tested, and Tuesday reports indicated that it

was not toxic. Care was taken with the spill on the possibility that it might contain polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) which is a carcinogenic compound.

TNP reported approximately 9 customers to be inconvenienced by this outage for a short period of time.

TNP extended a thank you to the Deport Volunteer Fire Department, who were on the scene for many hours in helping with the accident, which closed off Church Street overnight and into Tuesday. They also thanked the City of Deport for their assistance.

## Deport council takes no action on several items

No action was the ruling to several items on the agenda for the Deport City Council Monday night. First was action on access to an alley from Keith Yarbrough's property.

No action was taken on that or a water meter for Marilyn Glover. The topic was discussed, but no action taken, concerning a water leak on councilman Eric Pearson's property.

Council Pearson accused a city employee of breaking the water line to his property with a city tractor while mowing. City Water and Sewer Superintendent Herman LaRuestated that in his judgement the water line was broken before the tractor and mower the city employee was driving drove over the meter serving the Pearsons' residence. Councilman Pearson agreed to pay a bill in the amount of \$140.

The buildings on the north end of Main Street were discussed. A contractor is working on an estimate for tearing the buildings down at the city's expense.

No action was taken on a sugges-

tion of erecting "No Trucks" signs in areas of the city.

No action was taken on a retirement plan for city employees. Council gave their approval to an interaction agreement between the city and county to support an Emergency Management Plan.

City Secretary Sharon Francis reported to the council that property with delinquent taxes in the city limits have been turned over to the city's tax attorney.

The council heard from Dan Zack about the lack of pressure on north Depot Street to operate a new sprinkler system he has installed at the Gresham residence.

Zack stated that in order to obtain a minimum pressure of 36 lbs. to operate the sprinkler system he need a 2nd water TAP from the city main line. Council agreed to a 2" tap to be installed.

Minutes from previous meeting were approved all bill paid and the financial report was approved.

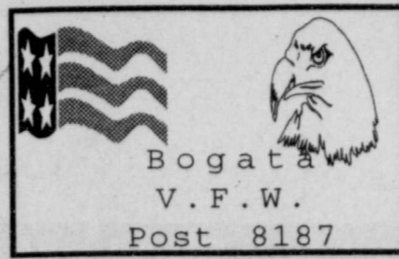

**Sour Cream Pound Cake**  
2-3/4 cup sugar  
1 cup butter (1/2 pound)  
6 eggs  
3 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon soda  
1 cup sour cream  
1/2 teaspoon orange extract  
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time and beat well after each. Sift flour, salt and soda together. Add alternately to butter, sugar and egg mixture; beating well. Add extracts. Pour batter into well greased and floured 10 inch tube pan. Bake 350 degrees for 1-1/2 hours. Cool in pan for 15 minutes. Then invert.

**Pecan Sand Tarts**  
1 cup butter  
2 cups sugar  
2 eggs  
2-1/2 cups sifted flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
pecan halves  
Cream butter, sugar and eggs; beat lightly and add flour sifted with baking powder. Mix together and add vanilla. Place on lightly greased cookie sheet in about large teaspoonsful. Press pecan half in center of cookie.

**Burgundy Binge**  
1 pound can dark bing cherries  
3/4 cup burgundy or any good red wine  
2 tablespoons corn starch  
2 tablespoons red wine vinegar  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1/4 cup corn starch  
Drain juice from cherries, 1 cup or nearly. Add cornstarch, mix well and stir until mixture is smooth. Add wine and vinegar and corn syrup and bring to a boil; stirring constantly. Mix lemon juice in slowly. You should have about 2 cups of sauce. You can use some to glaze ham for the last half hour of cooking. Add cherries.

**Chocolate Pot de creme**  
Melt over hot water in double boiler one-fourth pound German Sweet Chocolate bar. Gradually stir in until smooth one-half cup heavy cream. Remove from heat, slowly blend into 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Pour instantly into very small after-dinner coffee cups or tiny dessert dishes. This should make four servings. Can be doubled or tripled. Top chocolate with a dollop of sweet whipped cream and shave a chocolate bar on top of cream. Just a small amount. Place cup or dessert dish on plate and serve with small spoon.

**Fruit Soup**  
2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca  
1-1/2 cup cup water  
1 tablespoon sugar  
pinch of salt  
1 large can of frozen orange juice concentrate  
fresh fruit of all kinds  
Put tapioca in water and bring to a boil; stir constantly. When tapioca bursts into clear bubbles remove from heat. Add sugar, salt, frozen juice. Let cool and stir once after 15-20 minutes. Cover and chill. When ready to serve add fruits, cherries, grapes, peaches, orange sections, strawberries, etc. If too thick add small amount of juice.

**Plantation Peach Shortcake**  
2 cups flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Into this mixture cut in:  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
1/2 cup Crisco  
Cut into pieces as for pie crust. To this add 1/2 cup chopped nuts, 1 egg and 2/3 cup milk. You will have to spread the mixture with your fingers on the bottom of two 9-inch cake pans with removable bottoms. Place when cooked and cooled bottom tart with peaches (sliced and sweetened) and whipped cream. Add second tart same as first layer on top. Swirl several peach slices on very top.

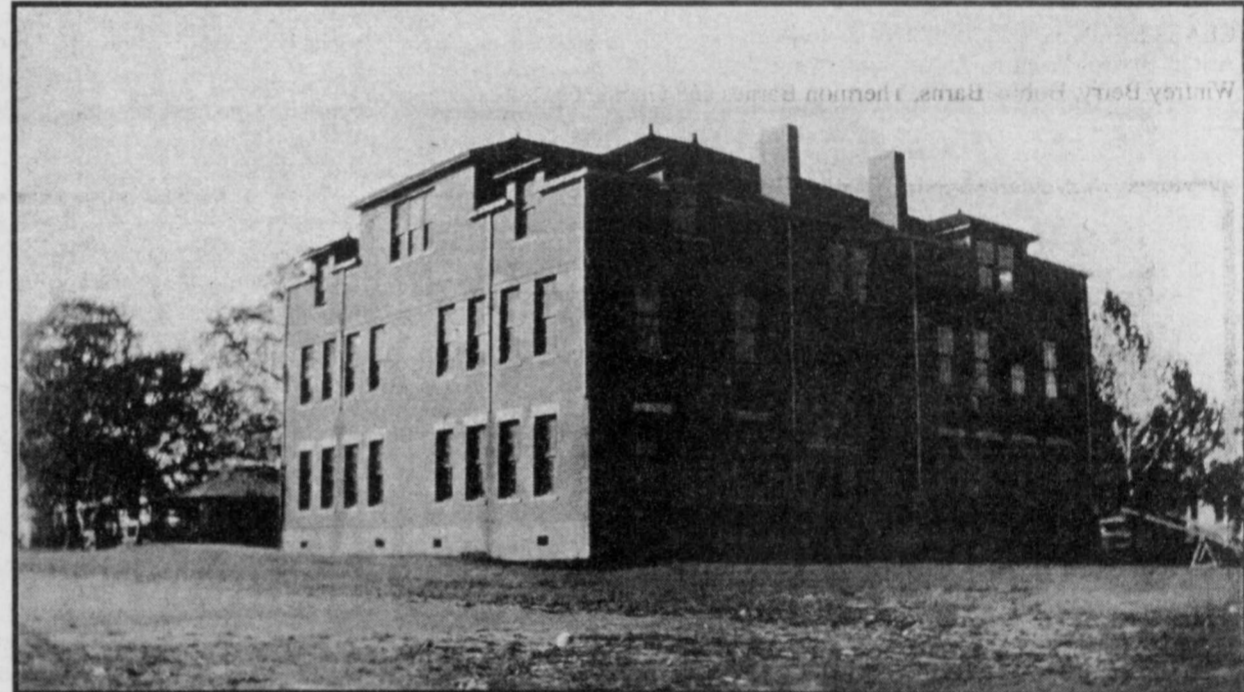

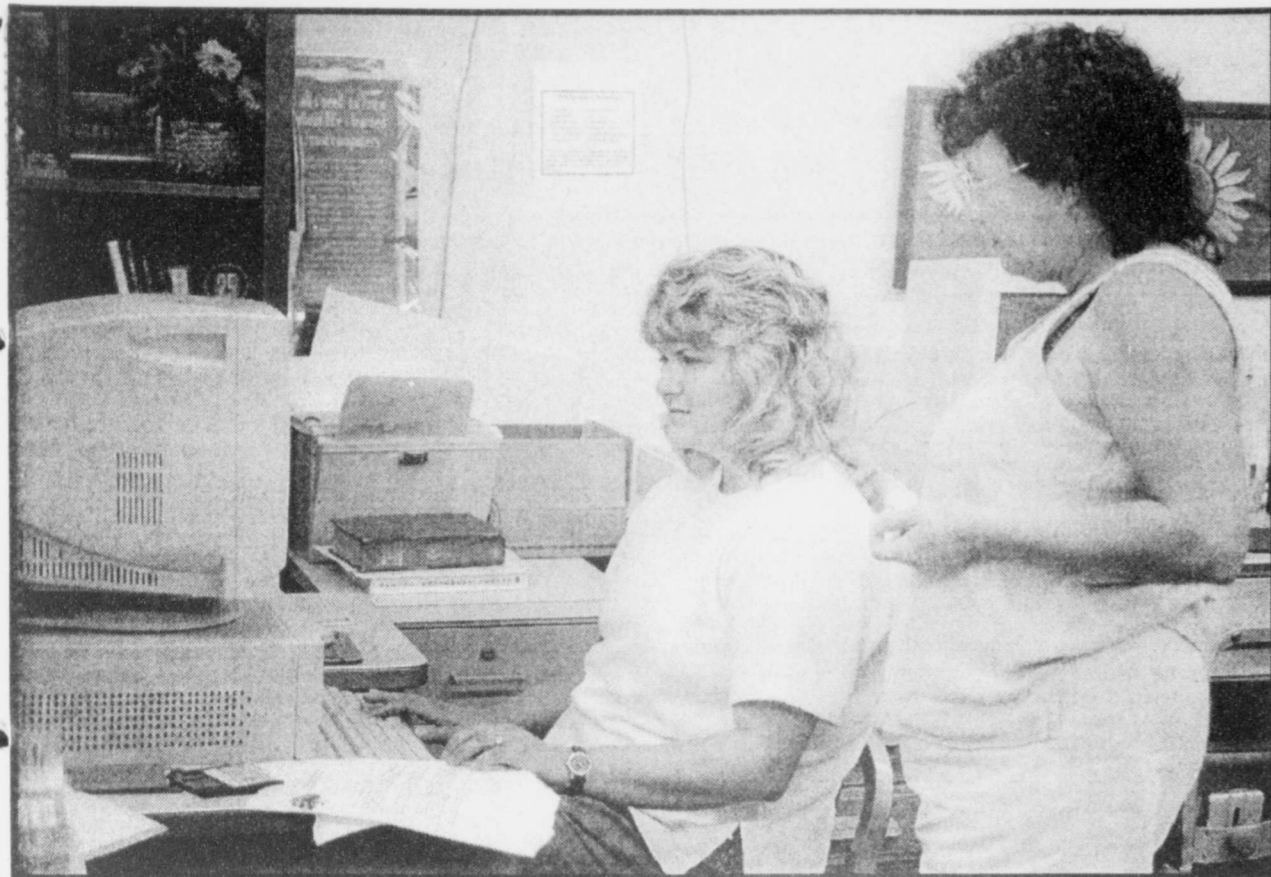

**Aggies study El Nino effects on lightning**

COLLEGE STATION - The effects of El Nino are everywhere — it has waterlogged the west coast, pummeled Florida with tornadoes and turned winter snows into winter sunshine — but scientists have yet to determine the effects of the system on thunderstorms and lightning.

By studying lightning, Texas A&M University meteorologists hope to better predict where lightning will occur next in order to protect lives and property and help power companies anticipate power outages.

The scientists will combine radar, satellite and lightning data to get a more complete picture of storms. The lightning data will come from the National Lightning Detection Network, which is run out of Tucson.

"It's going to be interesting this year to see what El Nino is doing to lightning activity," said meteorologist Richard Orville.

Lightning is classified as either positively or negatively charged with positive-charged lightning being the more dangerous. Researchers expect to see not only more lightning associated with El Nino but also more positively-charged lightning, Orville said.

"Being able to look into a storm system and see where the most dangerous lightning is occurring means you can tell what parts on the ground will be most threatened by the lightning activity," he said.

With this knowledge, power companies can deploy repair crews to areas where and when lightning is likely to cut power, he said. The companies also will be better able to predict where lightning may occur, so they can reroute power to minimize the lightning damage and power outages.

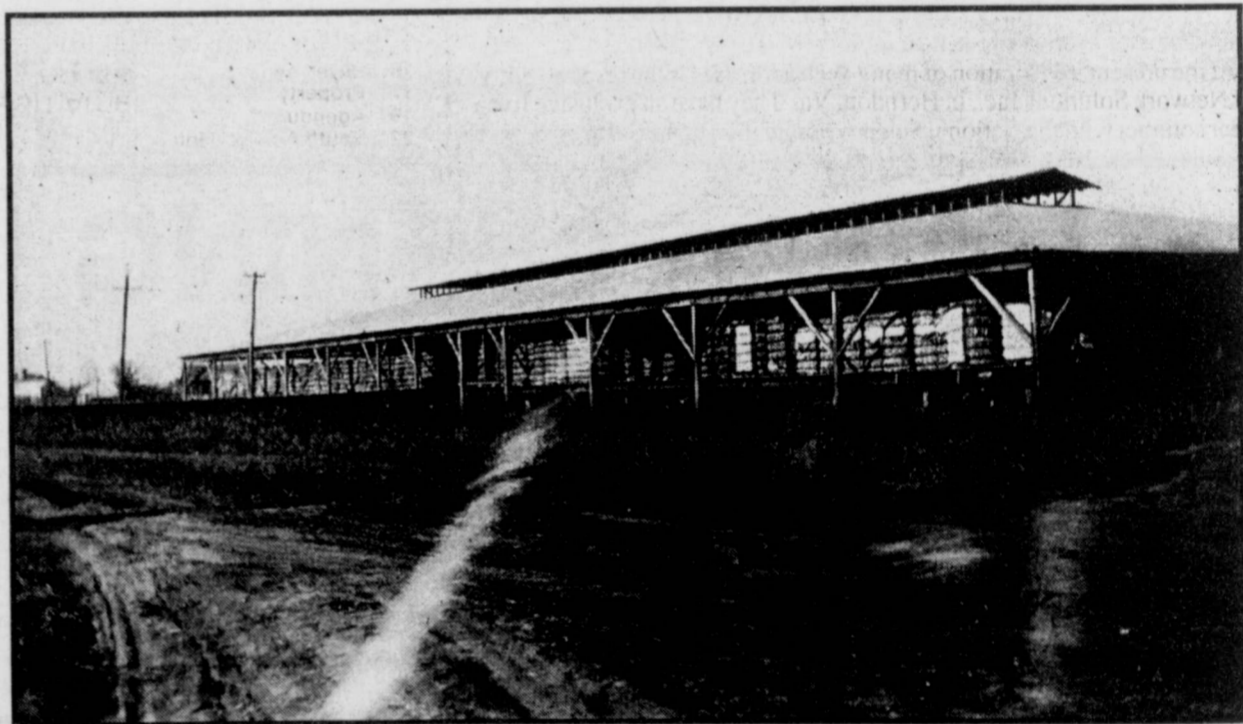

Last Friday, the Clinton administration released a plan to end our government's management of the Internet and hand over control to a yet-to-be-formed international board consisting of fifteen members. This board is expected to be up and running by October 1, 1998 and total transfer of responsibilities no later than October 1, 2000.

A smooth changeover is expected and the average user of the Internet will hardly notice.

The biggest change will be a handful of new suffixes for Web addresses.

We are familiar with .com, .net, .gov, and .org. New ones will probably be .shop, and .rec. If you want to register your own Web site address, the process will likely be easier and less costly with new companies allowed to compete for that business.

At the present, registration of many Web addresses is the responsibility of Network Solutions Inc., in Herndon, Va. They have an exclusive five-year contract with the National Science Foundation that expires at the end of September. Network Solutions will retain the role of keeper of the lists of Web sites using .com, .net and .org. Other companies will probably be this monopoly to be continued:

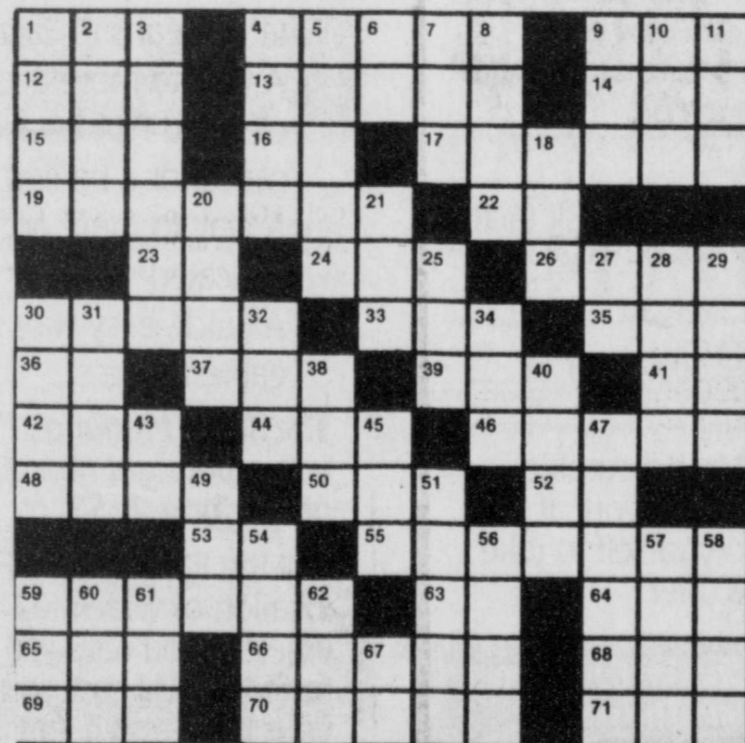

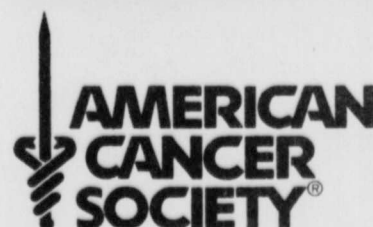

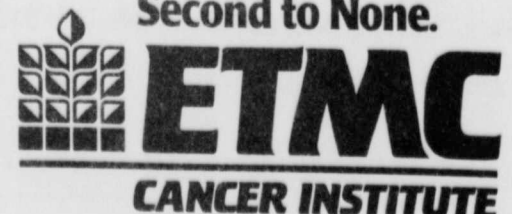

### Hydroxyurea study under way

Hydroxyurea, a drug that has shown promising results in preliminary adult HIV studies, will be tested in HIV-positive children for the first time.

A phase I study enlisting 15 children ages 1 to 16 has begun at Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital in Houston. Inexpensive and easy to take, hydroxyurea will be given in combination with either ddI or d4T, two standard HIV medications.

When this drug was tried in HIV-positive adults, the amount of virus found in the body was dramatically reduced according to Dr. Mark Kline, professor of pediatrics at Baylor.

Hydroxyurea, a drug that works by inhibiting DNA production, has been used in the treatment of leukemia and solid tumors in children and adults. Currently, studies are also being conducted for treatment of sickle cell anemia.

In adults hydroxyurea has shown impressive results in lowering viral load. In some cases where treatment included the drug ddI, the amount of HIV was suppressed below the level of detectability. Two individuals had no detectable virus more than one year after discontinuing the study drugs. Kline hopes to see similar results in the pediatric study.

Hydroxyurea may be a good choice for children, because it is taken once a day, versus two or four times per day for other HIV medications. In addition, the drug has no taste and dissolves easily in juice or other beverages. It costs only pennies per dose, according to Kline.

Drugs such as protease inhibitors which are the accepted treatment today, don't taste good. Often kids spit out the medicine or refuse it entirely.

The Baylor study will confirm safe dosage levels, drug levels in the blood and the effect that hydroxyurea has on viral load and T-cell counts.

# Victory by ten votes! Bond Issue Passes by close margin

Predictions that the nine million dollar Talco-Bogata Independent School District bond election would be close came very true Saturday, as the measure passed by 10 votes.

Six hundred fourteen votes were cast for and six hundred and four votes against the bond issue.

It is considered a record turn out for a school election in Talco-Bogata.

There is definitely the possibility of a recount since the voting was so close. It will probably be called for with a petition of twenty-five or more

people who were against the proposal.


The vote was called for a \$9 million dollar bond issue to put grade school and junior high school as well as the high school at the Rivercrest Campus.

This will eliminate school campuses in Talco and Bogata.

If the recount changes nothing, there will be a 20-cent yearly tax increase per \$100 evaluation, with state funds expected to cover the remainder of the cost of the project.

Dr. Gary Vandaveer, Superintendent, said that "the first job is going to be to get with a finance company and get the bonds issued and work with the architect pursuing the preliminary planning to try to get production work going". He says that he believes people will work together for the good of the students now that the election is over.

"We have been told that from the time the election passes to the time the new buildings are completed will probably be about two years" Dr. VanDeaver.

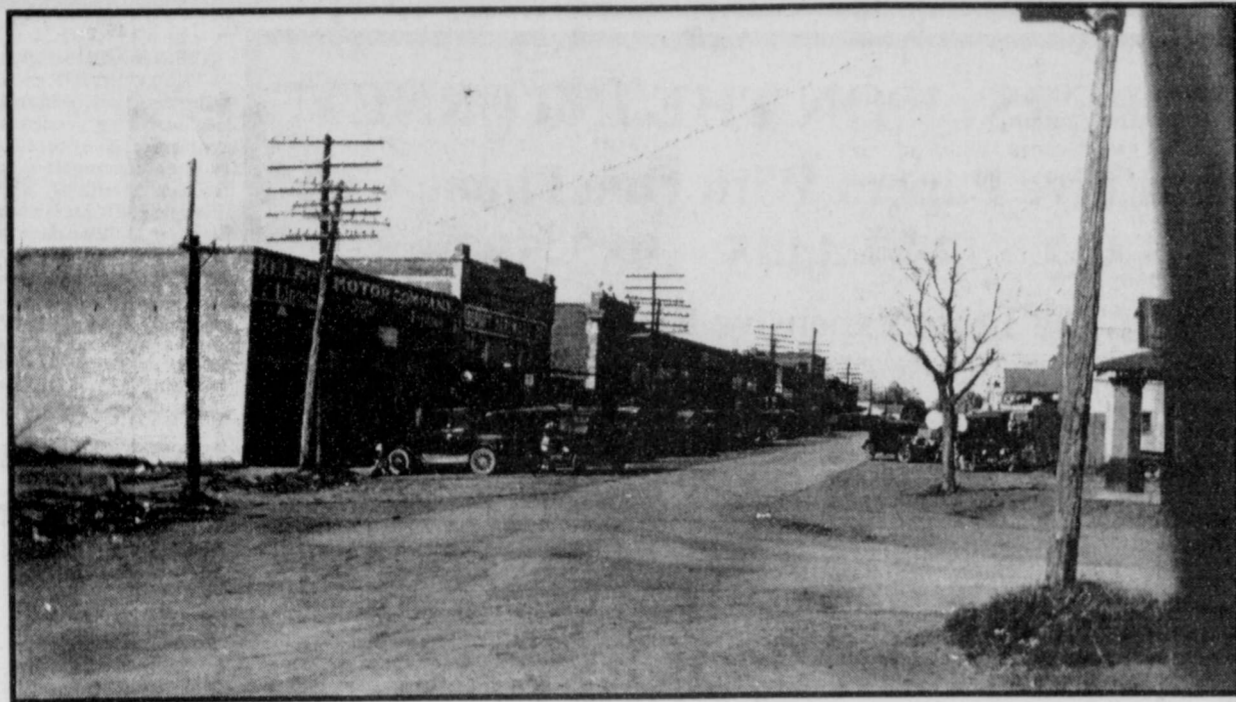

**Changed behavior may help swimsuit fit better**

COLLEGE STATION - On New Year's Eve, you stuck a picture of Cindy Crawford on the refrigerator and made a resolution to get into shape and into your swimsuit by summer.

Well, summer is here and that swimsuit still doesn't fit. While intentions were good, old habits kept you on the couch, not in the gym.

Every year thousands of people intend to eat less and exercise more because they know they should take better care of their health, but knowledge is not enough, says Texas A&M University psychologist Wendy Wood and Judy Ouellette, a psychologist at the State University of New York-Cortland.

"One reason is that behavior is a product of both intentions and habits. To change behavior, psychologists typically try to change people's conscious beliefs and thoughts, but for everyday lifestyle-type behaviors, such as eating and exercising, changing habits may be more important," Wood says.

Wood and Ouellette investigated the role of habit by reviewing 64 earlier studies and then testing their findings on college students' frequency of TV watching and recycling. They defined habits as behavioral tendencies to repeat well-practiced behaviors in a stable context (situation), like driving a car, and intentions as cognitive commitments. Habits are performed automatically, with little thought.

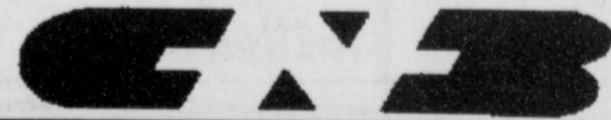
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
