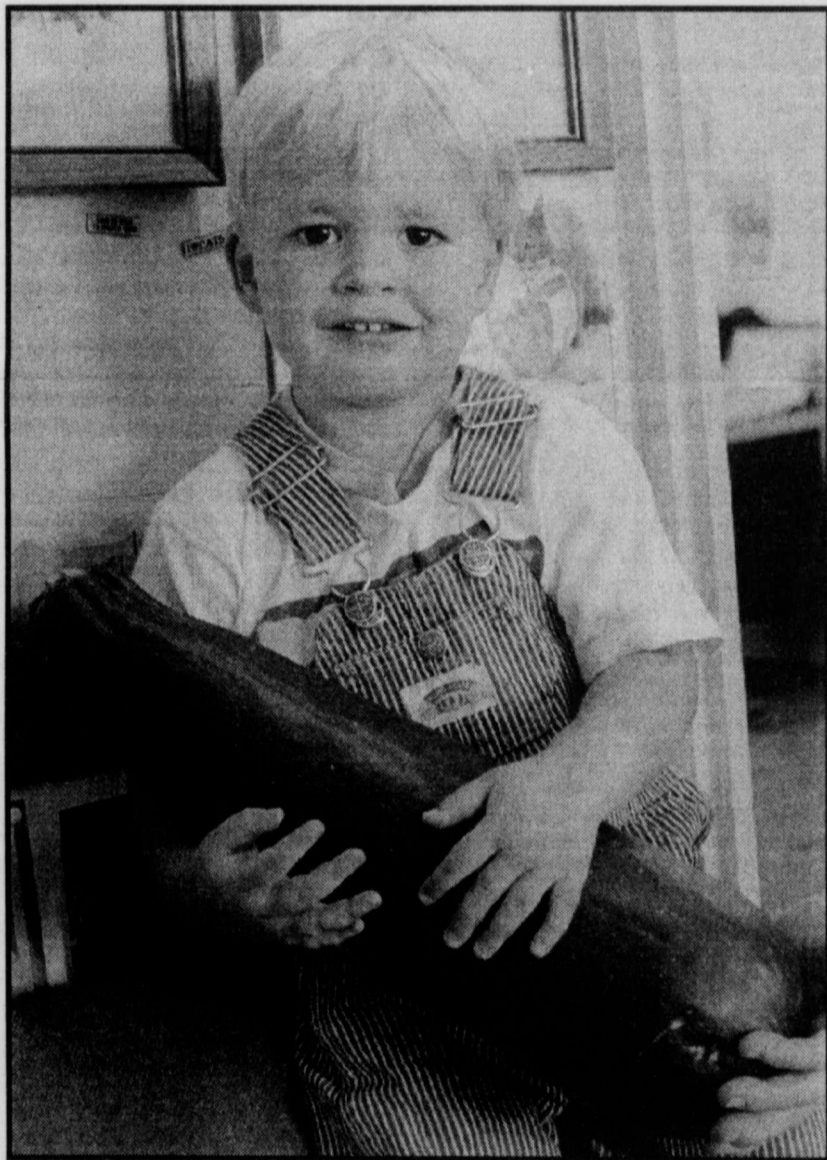
Chad Barnes and Marsha Burden are the group's two vocalists.

Street paving and complaints about roosters occupy Deport City Council

Repaving Ruth and Trail Streets received the Deport City Council's stamp of approval Monday night, during regular meeting. The council unanimously approved complete repaving of the streets as soon as the engineering process can be completed and a contract let on the project.

Mayor Charles Foster reported two of the deeds have been collected and the third deed promised for the buildings on the north end of Main Street. As soon as all deeds have been obtained, and the city's attorneys have had time to prepare all legal documents, work will begin on tearing the three buildings down.

A petition from citizens about pens of roosters on property located at 322 South Depot Street in Deport was discussed by the council. A committee of council members was authorized

to speak to the owner of the roosters about removing them from the property.

The council agreed to have two new phone lines added to the city office to accommodate the fax and computer lines as well as the regular phone line.

They also rescinded previous action on retirement for fire department members.

No action was taken on a retirement plan for city employees at the present time.

The council discussed action to be taken against a resident on Depot Street who connected to the city's water system without paying connection fees.

Bills were paid, and the financial report was approved.

Crackdown on Minors with alcohol

The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission in cooperation with local law enforcement agencies will be searching for and investigating violations of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code in area counties. A combined effort has been implemented in an attempt to reduce alcohol related violations and accidents. This will be an effort to curb the following violations, but is not limited to the violations listed. A minor for the purpose of alcoholic beverages is a person under the age of 21 years of age.

1. Minors in possession of alcoholic beverages (class C misdemeanor)
 2. Minors consuming alcoholic beverages, (class C misdemeanor)
 3. Minors attempting to purchase alcoholic beverages, (class C misdemeanor)
 4. Misrepresentation of age by a minor (class C misdemeanor)
 5. Purchase of alcohol by a minor (class C misdemeanor)
 6. Driving under the influence of alcohol by a minor (class C misdemeanor)
 7. Public intoxication by a minor (class C misdemeanor)
- Also, minors may be charged criminally for making alcoholic beverages available to another minor, which is a Class B Misdemeanor.

The following are fines and punishments that may be assessed for violations relating to minors.

- First Offense: \$0-\$500 Fine, Alcohol awareness course, 8-12 hours community service, 30 days driver's license suspension or denial.
- Second Offense: \$0-\$500 Fine, possible alcohol awareness course, 20-40 hours community service.
- Third Offense (under 17 years of age): 180 days drivers license suspension or denial Juvenile Court-child in need of supervision, or Criminal court-adjudicated as an adult.
- Third Offense (17 years of age or older): Class B Misdemeanor: \$250-\$2000 fine and/or Confinement in jail up to 180 days, possible alcohol awareness course, 180 days drivers license suspension or denial.

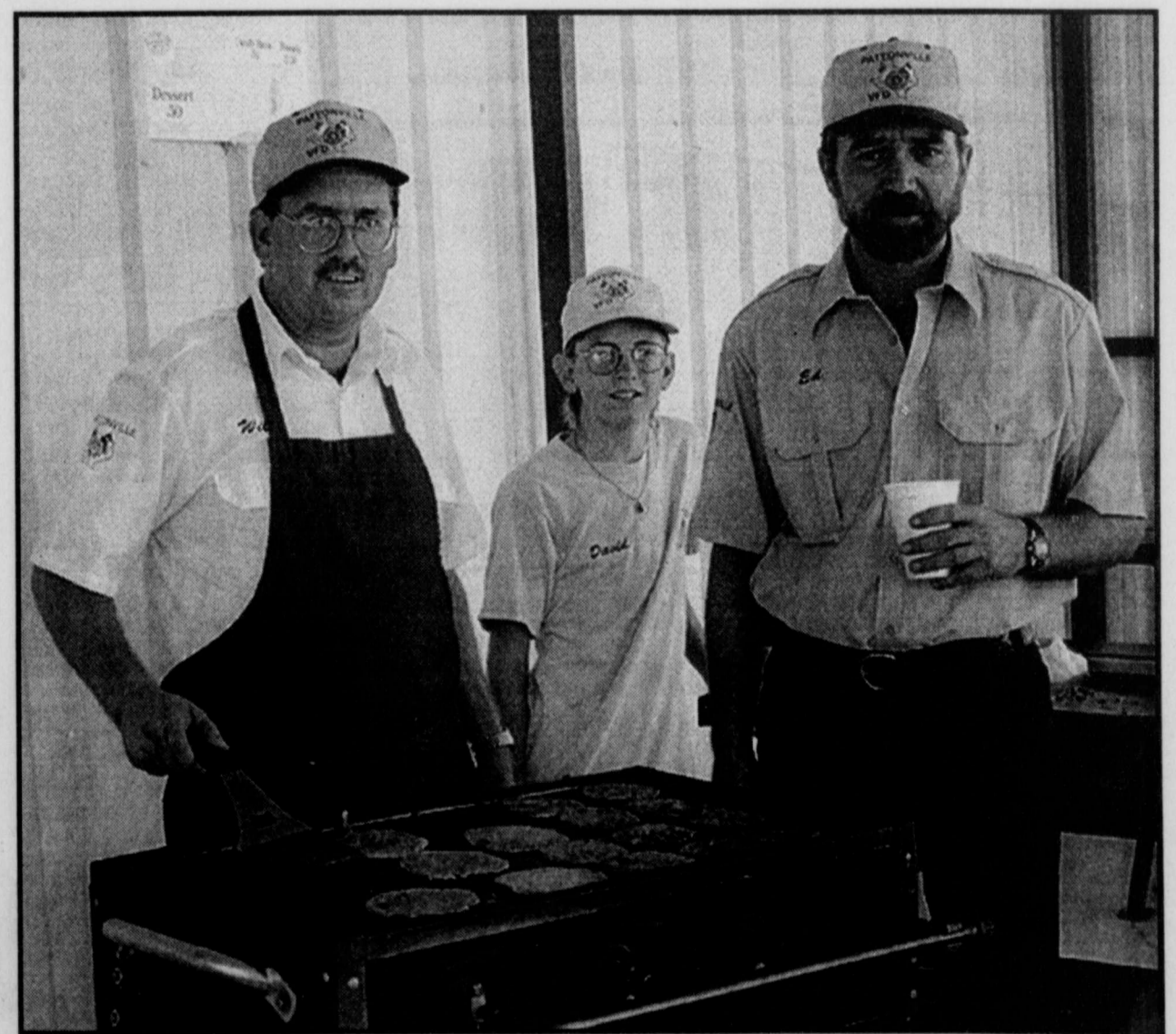
Zero Tolerance Punishments for Minors that are: D.U.I., consumption while driving, driving under the influence of alcohol (not DWI).
First Offense: \$0-\$500 fine, alcohol awareness course, 20-40 hours community service, 60 days drivers license suspension, 30 days ineligible for occupational license.
Second Offense: \$0-\$500, alcohol awareness course, 40-60 hours community service, 120 days drivers license suspension, 90 days ineligible

for occupational license.

Third Offense, (under 17 years of age) 180 days drivers license suspension, ineligible for occupational license, Juvenile court-delinquent conduct: or Adult criminal court.
Third Offense (17 years or older) Class B misdemeanor: \$500-\$2000 and/or Confinement in jail up to 180 days, 180 days drivers license suspension, ineligible for occupational license.

Other violations that may occur in a dry area, not limited to Minors are, Transporting alcoholic beverages in dry area, possession of alcoholic beverages in a dry area for the purpose of sell, sale of alcoholic beverages in a dry area, delivery of alcoholic beverages in a dry area, storing alcoholic beverages in a dry area and operation of an unregistered lab. All of which are classified as Class B Misdemeanors. Please be advised that persons found transporting illicit beverages may also have their vehicle seized and forfeited to the state of Texas.


It is the desire of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission as well as all other law enforcement agencies to achieve voluntary compliance of the Alcoholic Beverage Code as well as the laws of the state of Texas.

Watermelon is one of the summer's greatest gifts. It always tastes best slightly chilled, on a day that is at least 85 degrees. . . in our case, it has been slightly in the 100's, in the shade or when you are sitting on the back steps or where you can spit the seeds without anyone caring.

Don't tell the kids, but watermelon is really a giant, red-fleshed cucumber, a relative of gourds. It isn't a fruit at all. But that doesn't seem to stop anyone. Americans consumed a record 17.4 pounds per person in 1996. That same year, U.S. farmers raised an estimated 4.4 billion pounds, and consumer demand for watermelon all year around resulted in increased imports from Mexico and Central America.

Most watermelons come to the market between the months of April and October, with May through August being the peak season. The biggest seller in supermarkets are the oblong varieties such as "Jubilee" and the round to oval "Crimson Sweet" which weighs from 16-40 pounds.

Up north, midget or "icebox" varieties such as "Sugar Baby" have found their followers, even though they only reach 5-15 pounds. Because many people don't like the bother of seed, new round seedless varieties (some still have tiny, white, edible seeds) are popular too. There

are also the yellow-meated lovers as well.

So this week we are saluting the wonderful watermelon. Although it looks tough, a watermelon is actually as fragile as an egg, as anyone who has dropped one knows. It is one of the few produce items that must have hands-on care from harvest to household. So be gentle with it!

Watermelon Punch can be passed around at the next party and makes for a delicious change.

Sweet Onion-Watermelon Salsa- Serve this tangy mixture with tortilla chips or with chicken or fish.

Filled Watermelon Basket-looks great on any picnic table or a family reunion where you want to make a big entrance.

Watermelon Barbecue Sauce- use as a marinade for chicken, pork, fish or shellfish and pour enough sauce to cover and seal with plastic and refrigerate several hours or overnight.

Refrigerator Watermelon Rind Pickles-recipes for these pickles are varied and an easy way to make use of the rind and keeps for a week or two in the fridge.

Creamy Melonsicles is a wonderful, frozen concoction on a hot, summer day!



Watermelon Recipes

Watermelon Punch
6 cups watermelon juice
2 cups pineapple juice
1 can frozen raspberry juice blend
1 small can frozen orange juice concentrate
1/4 cup lemon juice

Combine all ingredients in a large jar or pitcher and chill. To make juice, process small chunks of melon in a blender or food processor.

Sweet Onion-Watermelon Salsa
1/4 cup orange marmalade
1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro
1/4 cup finely chopped jalapeno
2 tablespoons white vinegar
1 clove garlic-minced
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups chopped-seeded watermelon
1 cup chopped sweet onion
1 cup chopped orange sections

In a large bowl stir together the orange marmalade, cilantro, jalapeno, vinegar, garlic and salt. Add melon, onion and orange sections and toss gently until coated. Chill at least 30 minutes before serving.

Filled Watermelon Basket
1 large oblong watermelon
1 canteloupe
1 honeydew melon
1 fresh pineapple
2 fresh peaches or nectarines
2 cups fresh blueberries, strawberries or raspberries
Honey-lime dressing

Cut off the top third of melon lengthwise, saving the portion for another purpose. If necessary, cut thin slice from the bottom so the melon will firmly stand upright. With a melon ball cutter, cut balls from the larger section of the melon. Remove the seeds from the balls and chill. Remove the remaining pulp from the melon to make a basket. Drain, if necessary. Cut balls from canteloupe

and honeydew melons. Remove the rind and core from the pineapple, but into bite-sized pieces and mix with balls. Cover and chill. Just before serving, peel 1 and slice the peaches and prepare the pineapple chunks. Combine all fruits in a large bowl. Toss with the dressing and pour into watermelon shell. Garnish with fresh mint leaves.

Watermelon Barbecue Sauce
1/2 cup watermelon juice
1/2 cup balsamic vinegar
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup soy sauce
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
2 garlic cloves-minced
2 teaspoons red pepper flakes

Stir in all ingredients in a glass, ceramic or stainless steel bowl. Let set to flavor.

Refrigerator Watermelon Rind Pickles
4 cups cubed, peeled watermelon rind-
flesh removed
3/4 cup granulated sugar
1 cup white vinegar
2 sticks cinnamon teaspoon whole cloves

In a medium stainless steel saucepan, combine all ingredients and bring to a boil over high heat, stirring frequently. Reduce heat, cover and simmer gently until rind is tender and translucent, about 45-50 minutes. Cool. Refrigerate in a covered glass container. Store at least 12 hours to blend flavors.

Creamy Melonsicles
2 cups seeded watermelon chunks
2 cups frozen vanilla yogurt

In a blender or food processor puree the watermelon and frozen yogurt until smooth. Pour into popsicle molds or freeze paper cups and insert popsicle sticks when the mixture is partially frozen.

Children are at high risk of exposure to high levels of ozone

Children are more at risk of being exposed to high levels of ground-level ozone during the summer than adults.

"Children have a growing respiratory tract, and breathe in more air per pound of body weight than adults, so we tend to see a drop in lung function more in children," said Dr. Nick Hanania, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "In addition, children are outside more than most adults during the summer and therefore are more susceptible to ground-level ozone exposure."

There are two types of ozone, one good, one bad. Ground-level ozone, or bad ozone, is an oxidant formed by either exhaust from petrochemical plants or automobiles and can damage body tissue. Stratospheric ozone, or good ozone, is 10 to 15 miles away from the earth's surface and prevents ultraviolet light from penetrating the earth.

"The sunlight, heat, and humidity, all factors for high ground level ozone levels, are highest during the midday period," said Hanania, a lung special-

ist in the emergency center at the Harris County Hospital District's Ben Taub General Hospital in Houston. "It is best to change play-time to either the early morning or late afternoon, and keep children in an air conditioned facility as much as possible."

Asthmatics, 40 percent of whom are children, and the elderly are also at high risk of becoming ill from too much exposure to ozone. Those affected may suffer from chest tightness, a cough, and breathing problems. This is why it is important for everyone to take ozone watches and warnings seriously.

Healthy individuals, especially those who exercise or work outside on a daily basis, should not think they are immune to the effects of ozone exposure.

"Researchers do not yet know what effect exposure to high levels of ground-level ozone will have on long-term health," said Hanania. "The best thing we can do right now is educate people on the health risks," said Hanania.

Mrs. Mills was born in Foreman, AR April 12, 1914, a daughter of William and Nancy Greer Hughes. She was a homemaker.

Surviving are sisters, Bonnie Sanders of Jasper and Lula Walker of Dallas; sisters-in-law, Pansy Clark of Mason, Mary Clark of Alexander, LA and Elsie Hughes of Bogata; five nieces and three nephews.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Red Mills in 1988.

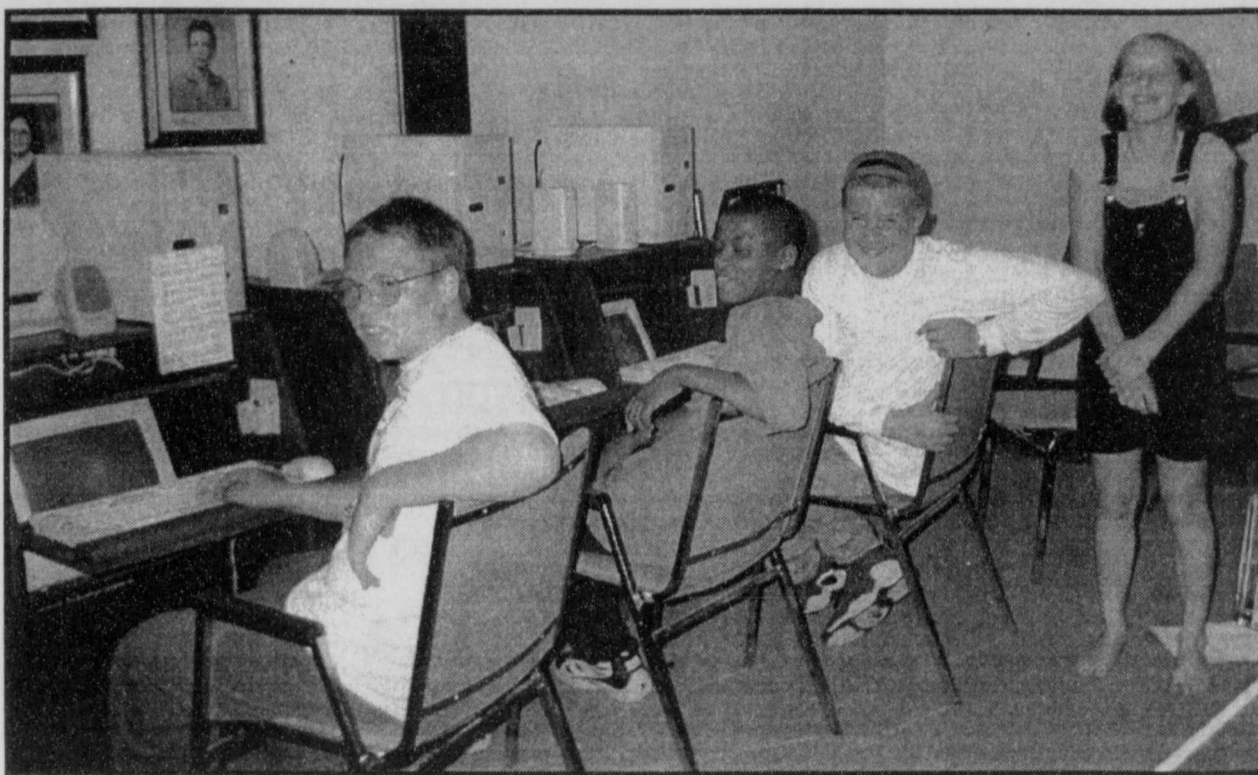

CITY OF BLOSSOM ORDINANCE #6-2-98 MANUFACTURED HOME PARKS ARTICLE 1. Definitions

The following words, terms and phrases when used in this ordinance, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Agent means any person authorized by the licensee of a manufactured home or trailer park to operate or maintain such park under the provisions of this article. The licensee or his designated agent must live on the premises.

Code enforcement officer means the legally designated code enforcement officer of the city or his authorized representative.

Driveway means a minor private way used by vehicles and pedestrians on a manufactured home stand or used for common access to a small group of stands or facilities.

HUD-code manufactured home means a structure constructed on or after June 15, 1976, according to the rules of the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, transportable in one or more sections, which, in the traveling mode, is eight body feet or more in width or 40 body feet or more in length, or, when erected on site, is 320 or more square feet, and which is built on a permanent chassis and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without permanent foundation when connected to the required utilities, and includes the plumbing, heating, air conditioning and electrical systems. The term does not include a recreational vehicle as that term is defined by 24CFR 3282.8(g). 7-16

Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a Misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200.00.
