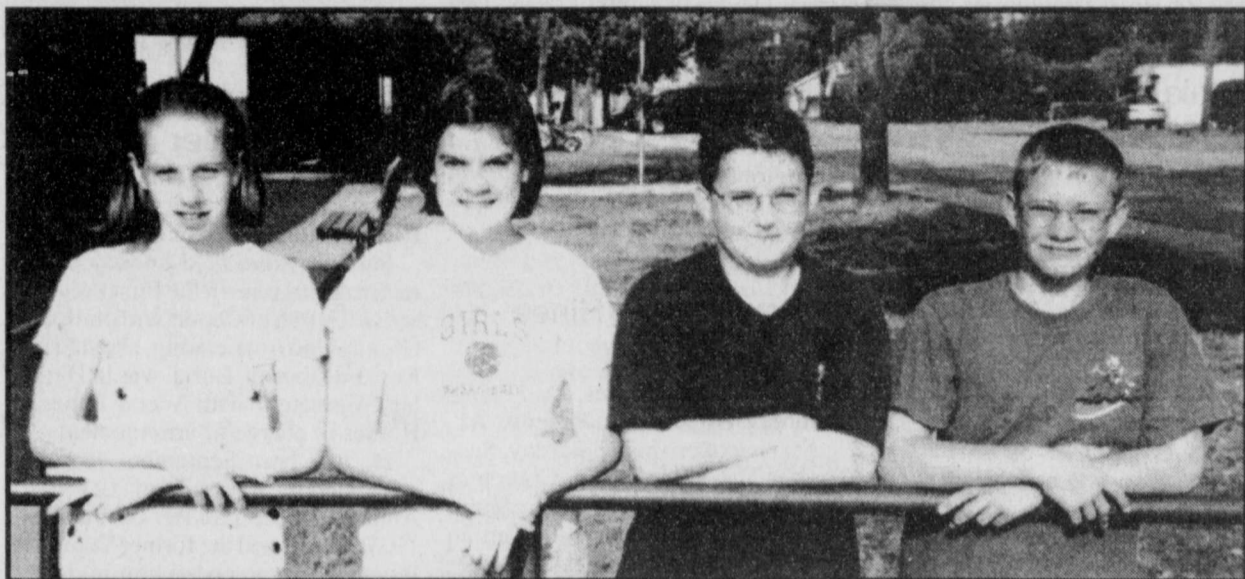

High TAAS scores qualify students

Four seventh grade students at Deport Elementary have met the qualifications to participate in the Duke University Talent Search Program. Mandy Weddle, Sarah Tubbs, Timothy Cox, and Aron Arrasmith were selected to participate based on their test scores on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS). These students may take the College Board's SAT: Reasoning Test (SAT) or the American College Testing Program's Assessment (ACT).

In order to qualify for the Talent Search, students must live in or attend school in one of 16 southern and midwestern states, be in the seventh grade and score within the top three percent on a nationally normed test.

The Duke University Talent Identification Program seeks to identify the very bright students at an early age, to facilitate the education of those students, to follow and nurture their talent through the critical middle and high school years, and to develop and effective research effort to help understand the nature of the academically talented adolescent.

Two of the students, Mandy Weddle and Sarah Tubbs, qualified based on their performance on both reading and math. Timothy Cox was accepted on based on his performance in math and Aron Arrasmith qualified based on his reading score. Mandy Weddle received a perfect score in both reading and math.

Blossom 10 year old sets record straight

Gerald Justin Enox is ten years old and a 5th grader at Blossom School and knows exactly what he wants to do when he grows up...race cars!!! Not just any cars, mind you...but NHRA dragsters. You might say he is in training right now! Justin recently won the National Jr. Drag Racing League's National Championship in the racing capitol of the world, Indianapolis.

For his efforts he received a \$5000 college scholarship to be put in trust until he needs it, a 24 karat gold-plated trophy, 24 karat gold-plated medallion and a gold card which allows him to race anywhere in the United States for free.

Youngsters have to be eight years old to participate and it is a once a year national event. It hails eight different classes with winners in each event. Only NHRA sanctioned tracks can send jr. dragsters to this event. The top 10 jr. dragsters from each track all over the United States and Canada attend. Ten places are earned at the NHRA tracks by winning points. Points are given for

entering winning rounds and bonus points are given for winning each night. Justin is currently #1 at the Paris Drag Strip, a position he has held all year!

851 youngsters raced at Indianapolis, with 126 competitors in Justin's class. Major events in North-east Texas and Southeast Oklahoma usually have around 150 competitors total...with anywhere from 5 to 30 kids in each class. So the class Justin competed in at Indianapolis had as many as most major events do total in our area.

Justin's jr. dragster is the fastest in the area, hitting as much as 63 miles perhour. The dragster was purchased for him by his grandparents, Mike and Melba Boulware of Clarksville. They just purchased him a new one recently that should hit around 70 miles per hour. He was the #1 qualifier at Indianapolis in the 10 year old division, qualifying by best light. A .550 is perfect. Justin had .502.

To say that this is a fun sport is putting it mildly. There is a lot of work involved. He raced for a total of

over 16 hours on Saturday, July 25 to earn this title. They started with time-trials on Thursday and Friday. The races went over past midnight with Justin actually leaving the winner's circle at 1:30 a.m.

A certain amount of publicity also goes along with this honor. He has been featured in the Paris News and Dallas Morning News. He has also been interviewed for articles in the National Dragster Magazine, Jr. Dragster Magazine, The American Drag News and has been asked to be in a National Think Child Safety Publications. Also doing a television spot on ESPN, speaking to the Clarksville Rotary Club and invited to Las Vegas for the National Banquet.

Justin is sponsored by the Paris Directional Drilling Company out of Paris. He is the son of Glenda Boulware of Blossom and Gerald Enox of Paris. His sister Brandy, 6, and brother Michael, 5, plan to race just like big brother! Grandparents are Mike and Melba Boulware of Clarksville and Anna Belle Enox of Paris.

Contributions to help with pavilion construction at Bethel Cemetery

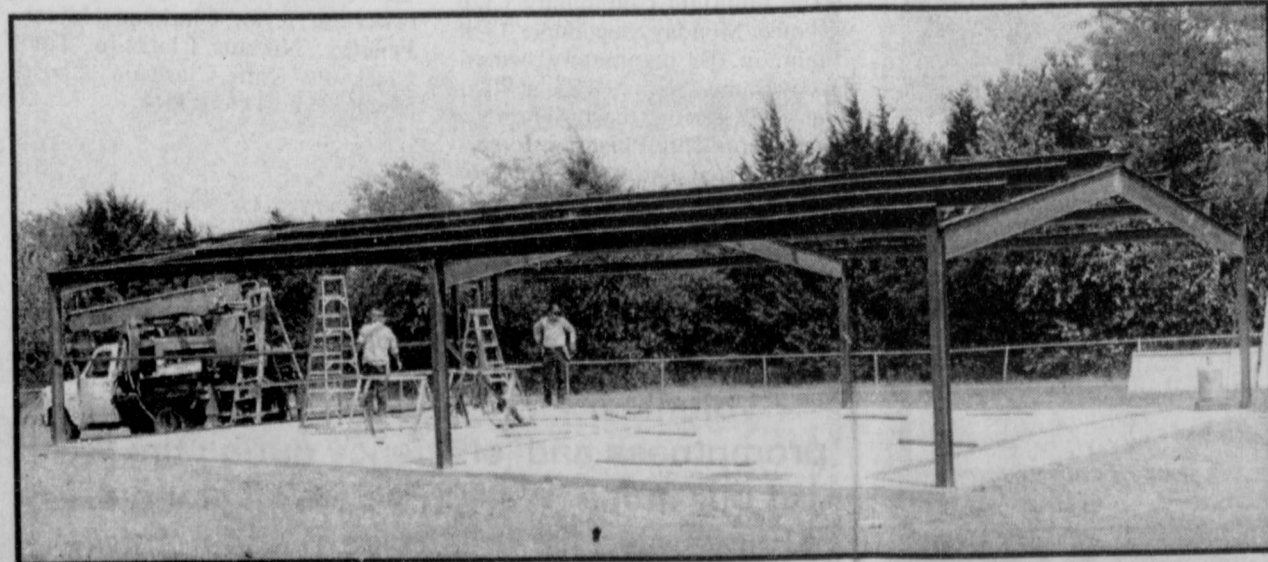
Work on the pavilion at Bethel Cemetery is almost done. The pavilion is 30 x 45 feet, and is located at the north east portion of the cemetery. It will have a 30 x 40 open space and an enclosed area of 30 by 5 ft. for rest rooms and storage. This building will be used for graveside services, interment services during bad weather, a place where families can meet, and many more uses. It is an all steel building on a concrete slab and should last for many generations. Loren Hackler, a retired metal builder, has supervised the erection. He is working with the contractor that sup-

plies the metal, cut, fitted and ready to assemble.

The cost of the facility is \$8,500. The cemetery association now has about \$6,963.81 in the maintenance fund. They are hoping for memorial gifts, contributions or estate settlements to help them pay for the project.

They hope to send all who can contribute a picture, an invitation to a Bethel Homecoming Program and a covered dish luncheon in October when weather will be cooler.

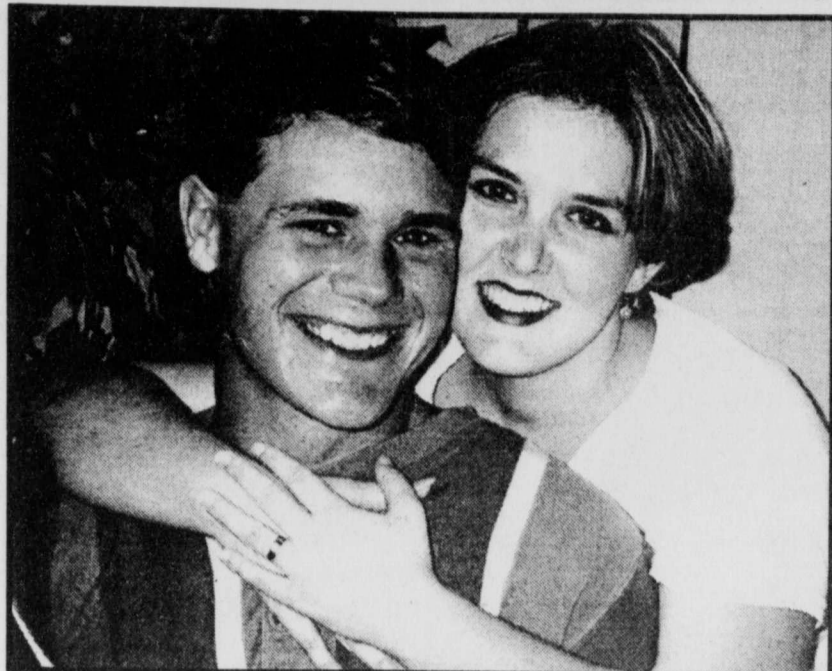

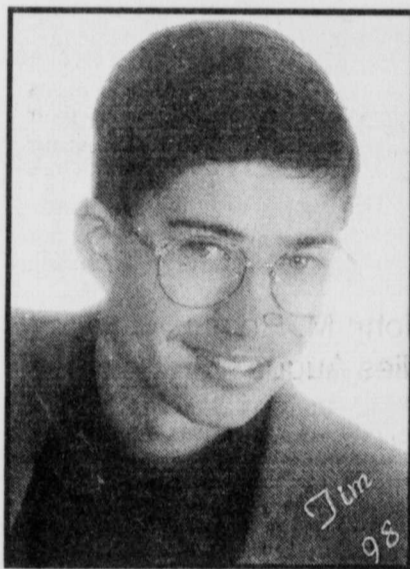
Peeples in Who's Who again

Freshman Michael Jones proved to be the hard hitter for the evening, leaving many Foxes shaking their heads in confusion as to what did hit them.

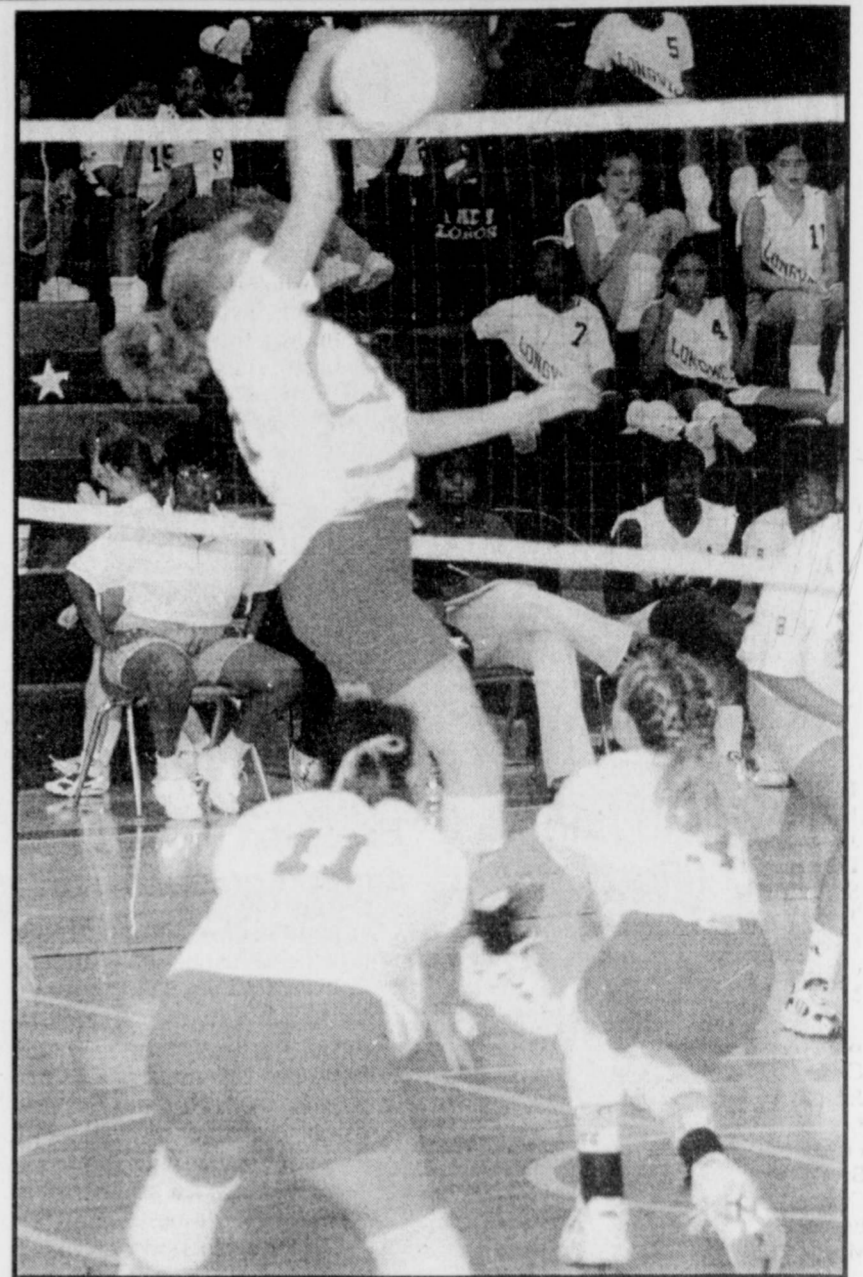
Sophomores Drew Riddles and Chris Berry show real go-getter power as they slapped down Fox passes time and time again.

The Pats proved to hot to handle and tromped the Foxes 27-13.

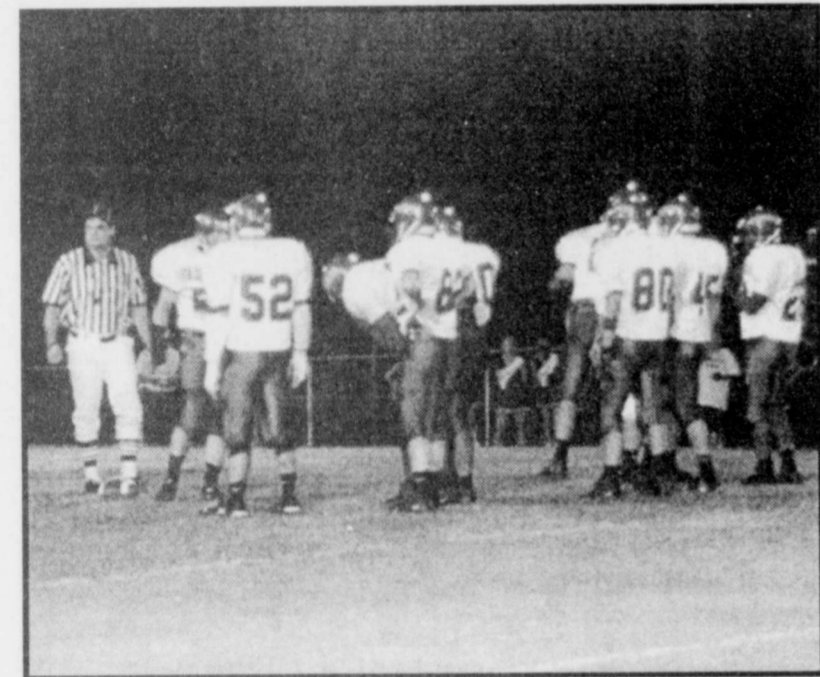

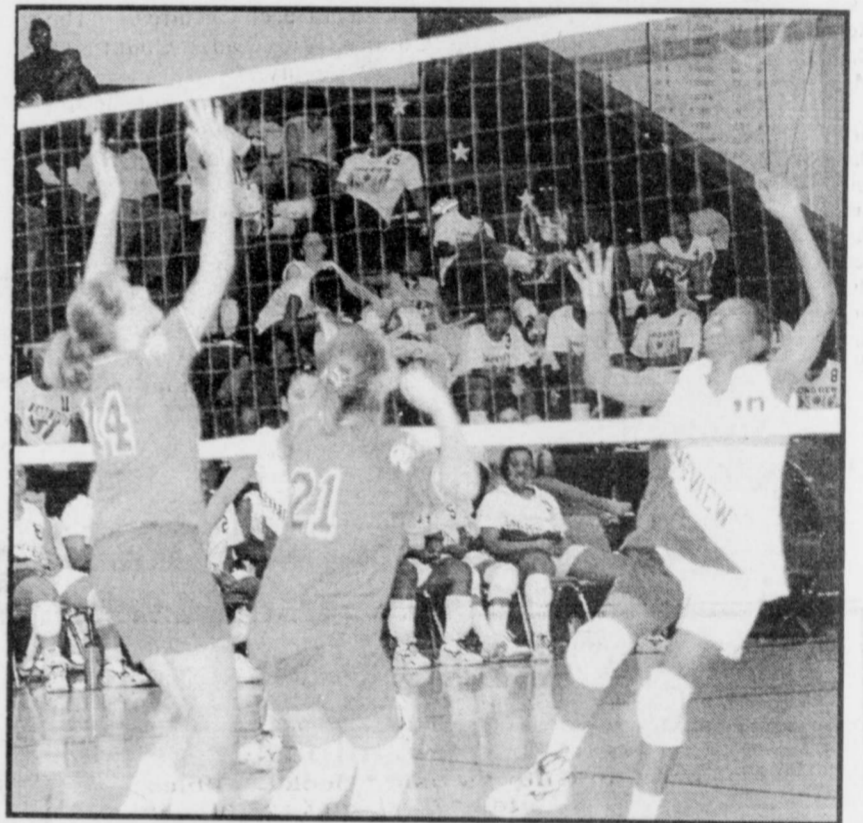

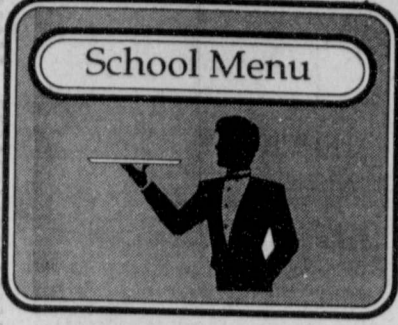

37 die in Labor Day traffic accidents

Preliminary reports (and these could increase if additional reports are received, and they almost always are) indicate that at least 37 persons died in 32 traffic crashes during the 78 hour reporting period that comprised the Labor Day Holiday. Thirty-four had been predicted. Twenty-nine of the thirty-two involved single fatalities, one collision took three lives and three of the deaths involved were in Northeast Texas. One death each occurred in Hunt County, Van Zandt County and Morris County. There were two auto-pedestrian deaths, one fatality involved a pickup and a train and another involved a pickup and a cow. There were three motorcycle fatalities, none of which were wearing helmets. Fifty-four percent of those killed were not wearing seat belts. This included one twelve year old boy. Finally, at least four deaths were DWI related. It is predicted that this number will definitely increase as the investigations continue. Statistics are courtesy of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Census Bureau prepares for Census 2000

Although the Census 2000 is still two years away, government officials are already working to make sure that the nation's population count is complete and accurate. Census statistics are governments primary source of information. This information collected (population, age, ethnicity, housing, etc.) is extremely important for state and local jurisdictions, which use this data to plan for such things as roads, schools and hospitals. Census data also influences decision making for private industry on where to locate.

The Census essentially performs two direct functions for the people. The first, is based on the population in a given area, it determines the appointments of representation in Congress as well as the state legislature. The second, based on population statistics, determines the amount of federal aid. In 1990, the state of Texas lost approximately 41 billion in federal aid money (averages to roughly \$100 million a year). The Census 2000 forms will be shorter, with 5 out of every 6 households receiving the short

version which consists of 7 questions. To accurately conduct Census 2000, the bureau must first determine the correct address and location of every household. The address listing operation concentrates on rural and suburban areas. Everyone is encouraged to help those working with the census in their area by filling the forms out correctly which in turn adds federal aid dollars to the area.

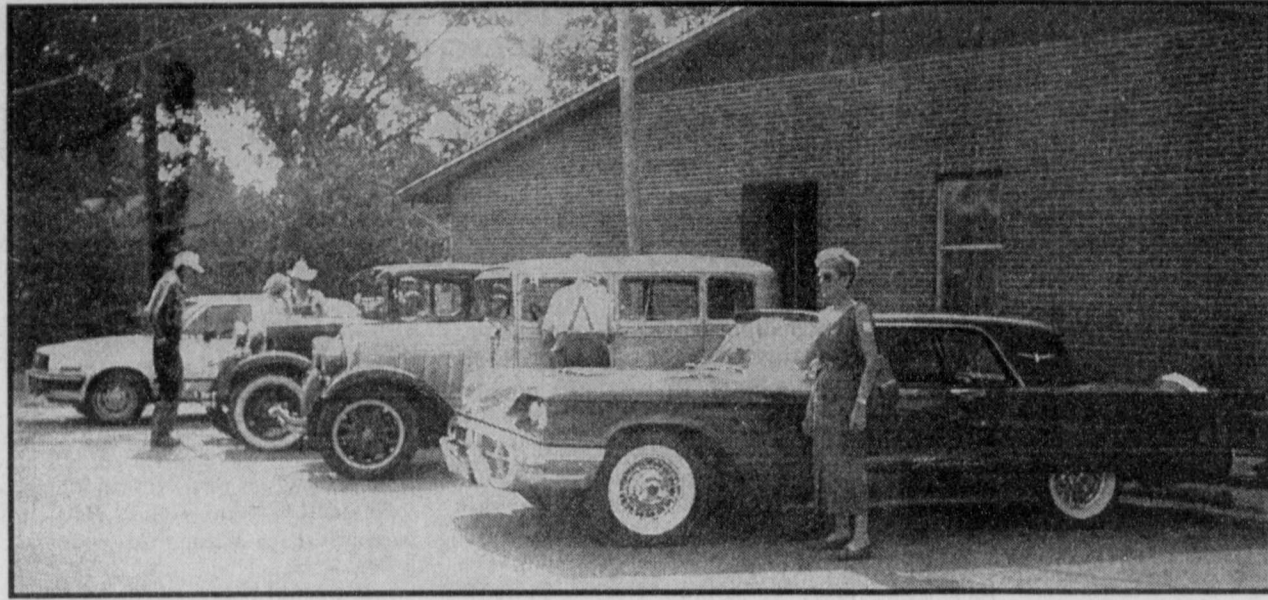

U.S. Census Bureau hiring in Red River County

The U.S. Census Bureau is gearing up now for Census 2000 by updating its maps and address lists in counties and communities throughout the state. Prostate screening is September 19

Men throughout northeast Texas and southeast Oklahoma are invited to take part in the annual Prostate Cancer Screening sponsored by McCuiston Regional Medical Center on Saturday, September 19. The free screening will be held in the MSI Building across from Pavilion I and II, 2875 Lewis Lane from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m. This is a relocation of the screening from previous years. All men over the age of 50 or any man with a family history of prostate disease are strongly encouraged to take advantage of this screening. Included with the screening will be a prostate specific antigen blood assay test and a digital rectal examination will be performed by qualified physicians. Dr. Donald Wikoff, the lead physician again in this year's screening stressed the importance of the PSA and digital exam in combination. Individually each of the tests are estimated at 65% accurate. Combined, the two tests yield a 95% efficiency rate. The incidence of prostate cancer for a white male is one out of every 11 men and the figure increases to one in nine for black males. When diagnosed early, prostate cancer can be cured. Figures indicate over 80% of all patients with tumors which were diagnosed early survived the disease. Even in advanced cases, the disease can be treated more effectively than in past years. Results of rectal exam will be given to the men at the conclusion of their examination by the physicians. Lab test results of the PSA will be mailed to each participant within 2-3 weeks after the screening. No appointment is necessary.

October 27 is deadline for bidding on forfeited land

A catalogue listing 220 tracts of forfeited state land reserved exclusively for bids from Texas veterans is now available from the Texas Veterans Land Board. Bids will be opened October 27 at 1 p.m. The catalogue, which contains bidding instructions and a detailed description of each tract, can be ordered by calling 1-800-252-VETS. Located in 97 Texas counties, the tracts range in size from five to 100 acres. The tracts, known as Type I tracts, can be purchased with no down payment. Bids are restricted to eligible Texas veterans. The VLB will finance the entire loan amount of all winning bids. There is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However, eligible Texas veterans are limited to one purchase in the sale. Texas veterans will receive a 7.64% interest rate with a 30-year assumable fixed rate loan. A \$25 non-refundable fee for each bid is required. The catalogue contains one tract in Red River County and two tracts in Titus County.
