Bids for reconstructing Ruth and Trail Streets in the city were discussed. Drake Construction Co. of Paris turned in the lowest bid of \$52,000.00. Total for the project including the engineering fees will total \$62,000.00. The council accepted the bid.



Prostate screening is September 19

Men throughout northeast Texas and southeast Oklahoma are invited to take part in the annual Prostate Cancer Screening sponsored by McCuistion Regional Medical Center on Saturday, September 19.

The free screening will be held in the MSI Building across from Pavilion I and II, 2875 Lewis Lane from 8 a.m. until 3 p.m. This is a relocation of the screening from previous years. All men over the age of 50 or any man with a family history of prostate disease are strongly encouraged to take advantage of this screening.

Included with the screening will be a prostate specific antigen blood assay test and a digital rectal examination will be performed by qualified physicians.

Dr. Donald Wikoff, the lead physician again in this year's screening stressed the importance of the PSA

and digital exam in combination. Individually each of the tests are estimated at 65% accurate. Combined, the two tests yield a 95% efficiency rate. The incidence of prostate cancer for a white male is one out of every 11 men and the figure increases

to one in nine for black males. When diagnosed early, prostate cancer can be cured. Figures indicate over 80% of all patients with tumors which were diagnosed early survived the disease. Even in advanced cases, the disease can be treated more effectively than in past years.

Results of rectal exam will be given to the men at the conclusion of their examination by the physicians. Lab test results of the PSA will be mailed to each participant within 2-3 weeks after the screening.

Our soup recipes this week can be made ahead of time and frozen for your convenience for future use. A soup is any combination of vegetables, meat or fish cooked inliquid. It may be thick (like gumbo), smooth (like a bisqe) or chunky (like a chowder or houillabaisse). Though most

soups are hot, some like vichyssoise and many fruit soups are served cold. Soups are often garnished with flavor enhancers such as croutons, grated or cubed cheese or sour cream. They can be served as a firs course or as a meal, in which case they are often accompanied by a sandwich or

We hope you enjoys these recipes and we will see you in the kitchen! Potato Soup-everyone loves potato soup and here is just another version to try with ahint of ham

French Onion Soup-browned onions and simmering will make this

/4 cup brandy 1/2 teaspoon fresh-ground black pepper 5-1/2 thick slices French bread

1/2 pound Gruyere cheese-cut thin slices In large pot, melt butter with 2 tablespoons of oil over low heat. Add onions and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cover and cook, stirring occasionally, until the onions are very soft for about 20 minutes. Raise the heat to moderate and cook, stirring until onions are a rich brown for about 10 minutes. Be careful that the onions don't burn. Add flour and cook, stirring about 2 minutes. Add wine and scrape bottom of pot to dislodge brown bits. Add stock, thyme and remaining salt. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer, partially covered 40 minutes. Add brandy and pepper to soup. Meanwhile, trim bread to fit bowls. Heat broiler. Place bread on baking sheet and brush both sides with remaining oil. Broil both sides until brown. Heat oven to 375 degrees. Place oven-proof bowls on baking sheet. Divide soup among bowls. Float toasted bread on soup and top with cheese. Bake soup until cheese is bubbling and golden





Mrs. Prince was born November 30, 1946 in Carlsbad, NM, the daughter of Walter Ollie and Leila Boyd


