things because they love to "piddle" with them and make them work again.


There is a type of person who buys things because they look "forlorn", and another type who loves to buy rusty, dirty items and shine them until they are like new.

St. Joseph's closing Deport Clinic

closing, St. Joseph's Hospital and Health Center has announced. It will close effective January 1.

"We truly regret this action", said Monty McLaurin, St. Joseph's president and CEO. "We have been a part of the Deport community since 1996. Closing the Deport Clinic is much like losing a family member. However, increased cost pressures and reduced reimbursement in almost all quarters have forced us to reexamine our rural outreach efforts. As much as we want to be there, the fact remains that our Deport Clinic did not have sufficient utilization to justify sary.

The Deport Medical Clinic will be continuing to operate the clinic without significant financial subsidy by the hospital.

"I wish it could have turned out differently. We will continue to monitor the capability of the area to support a rural health clinic and in the future if the patient demand increases sufficiently, we will reevaluate the possibility of offering health care in a clinic setting again.

Patients wishing to have their medical records transferred may contact the staff at the clinic. They will also be available to assist you in finding another healthcare provider if neces-






Mrs. Walker was a retired teacher aide and member of the Martin Memorial United Methodist Church.





Dear Editor,

This is a follow-up to my previous letter about the advertising sign at Main and 271.

My adventures with the mayor began over a year ago. I asked the city council to make Church Street oneway entirely or not at all because the present one-way ends at Pecan Street and is very confusing to someone not familiar with the area. I later told the mayor that a stop sign had to be erected on Church at Pecan Street so you could tell when the one-way ended and you wouldn't drive into oncoming traffic. His exact reply was "You don't tell me what I have to do." After that, all I said went in one ear and out the other. There is still no stop sign on Church at Pecan Street or any sign showing where the one-way ends. This is on the street where the school is located. I am amazed that the PTO that originally proposed the one-way has not complained that there is no stop sign there or at either end of Church Street. There are numerous streets that connect to Main and Monroe streets that have no stop signs. These should be considered "Traffic Hazards."

I tried everything I could to fight the local TxDOT's refusal to issue me a permit for the sign. I wrote several people and called several state offices.

Bottom line: We have to move the the sign back about 35 feet.

I wish the citizens of Deport would pick out what really are 'traffic hazards" in Deport and report them to the mayor and to the Texas Department of Transportation. They are numerous, very obvious and in my opinion, the sign at Main and 271 is not one of them.



Screwworm case confirmed in West Texas

According to the Texas Animal Health Commission, the state's live-stock health regulatory agency, one of nine suspicious maggots submitted to the National Veterinary Service Laboratory in Ames, Iowa, was confirmed to be a screwworm larvae. A rancher near Rocksprings in West Texas' Edwards county collected the maggots in late October from an Angora goat that had suffered a shearing wound.

Ranchers, hunters or anyone handling livestock or wildlife should check animals and pets closely and call us immediately if there are any maggots or larvae in wounds. A TAHC or USDA field specialist will

go to the ranch or hunting lease to pick up the larvae for laboratory submission and gather information for the investigation.

Field staff from the TAHC and USDA have distributed nearly 2,400 screwworm submission kits to veterinarians, county agents, livestock markets and feed stores. The kid consists of a cardboard tube containing a test tube filled with a holding solution and small plastic bags for maggot collectyion. Animals infested with the larvae should be held in a pen or barn so they may be inspected.



Pair of cousins discover 58 year gap doesn't break a bond


