The next meeting date is tentatively set for January 19th at the Rivercrest High School auditorium.



Work on keeping Deport clinic open still progressing

There are still hopes that the Deport Medical Clinic will be kept open.

McCuistion Regional Medical Center has expressed and interest, and Presbyterian Health Care Systems will be making a decision in conjunction with them soon. East Texas Medical Center has also been looking into the possiblity of keeping the clinic open.

A group of doctors has also expressed a definite interest in the clinic and will be making a decision soon.

Copies of the petition, which bears more than 200 signatures, has been submitted to each organization.

Nanalee Nichols, spokesperson for the citizens committee working to keep the clinic open says "we are asking everyone to be patient, we have some good possibilities here, and we are not going to rest until we have done absolutely everything possible to see our clinic survives"

Deport council considers items of business, employee raises

In a called meeting at Deport City Hall December 11 the Deport council discussed numerous business items.

The council discussed purchasing stainless stell clamps on a 6" PVC Main Water Line to be re-routed around the First Baptist Church to make room for a fellowship hall to be built north of the church.

The council agreed to look into a retirement program for City Employees through the Texas Municipal Retirement System. A representative will meet with the council at a later

The council agreed to discuss the proposal of annexing more land into the city limits. The city of Deport has not annexed any additional property into the city limits in over 20 years. Property under consideration would extend from west of Deport to County Road 15400 and east to Red River County Road 1162 and South on FM 1503 for approximately one mile or just south of the J.A. Sparks residence. The area proposed would follow a squared-off area from bound-

ary to boundary. Also in the action all bills were paid and the minutes from the previous meeting read and approved.

The council adjourned too executive session to discuss pay raises and Christmas bonuses for city employ-

The council agreed to give all city employees a 5% raise for next year.



The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has declared December as National Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month.

In 1997, there were 3,508 people killed on Texas highways. Thirty percent of these deaths were alcohol related. Responsible personal behavior could have prevented these traffic deaths. Texas motorists must make the right choice of abstaining from alcohol when driving. For those who have not learned this important lesson, Texas has tough drunk driving

laws. The law provides a zero tolerance policy for those under the legal drinking age of 21, in other words, no measurable amount of alcohol can be in a young motorist's blood. Drivers 21 and older are considered legally drunk if they have a blood alcohol concentration of 0.120 percent or greater.



ungreased cookie sheets. Flatten each ball of dough to a 2 inch circle, using fingers. Cut any large nuts in half. Press nuts firmly into outside top edges of cookies. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes or until edges of cookies are lighly brown. Cool on cookie sheet I minute. Carefully remove cookies to wire racks to cool completely. Place chocolate and shortening intop of double broiler over hot water; stir until melted. Spoon heaping teaspoon melted chocolate onto center of each cookie. Spread and smooth chocolate between nuts. Let set until chocolate hardens. Yield 26 cookies

Vanishing Oatmeal Raisin Cookies **Bocky Norman**

I cup butter I cup brown sugar 1/2 cup sugar 2 eggs l teaspoon vanilla 1-1/2 cup flour l teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon salt 3 cups oatmeal

l cup raisins Heat oven to 350 degrees. Beat together butter and sugars, add vanilla nd eggs. Mix dry ingredients, add oatmeal and raisins, mix well with butter-sugar mixture. Drop by rounded teaspoonsful onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 10-12 minutes. Makes about 4 dozen.

Almond Filled Cookie Cake Dawne Darden

2-2/3 cup flour 1-1/3 cup sugar

1-1/3 cup butter-softened (not margarine) 1/2 teaspoon salt

Heat oven to 325 degrees. Grease 8 inch spring formed pan. COmbine all crust ingredients. Divide dough in half and spread half in bottom of greased pan to form crust.

I cup finely chopped almonds 1/2 cup sugar I teaspoon grated lemon peel

l egg-slightly beaten

Combine all ingredients and blend and spread to within 1/2 inch of sides of pan. Between waxed paper, press remaining dough to make a top crust. Place dough over filling. Bake 325 degrees for 65-75 minutes. Cool 15 miutes in pan. 16-24 servings. Do the same for tartlets, bake until golden brown-about 30 minutes.

1 cup (2 sticks) butter or margarine softened I cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon almond extract

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract 2 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 cup Hershey's cocoa 1/4 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1/8 teaspoon salt I cup semi-sweet chocolate chips or mini 1-1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels

additional sugar blanched slivered almonds

Beat butter and I cup sugar until fluffy. Add egg, almond vanill aextract; beat well. Combine flour, cocoa, baking powder, baking soda and salt; gradually add dough. Stir in chocolate chips. If necessary, refrigerate dough about I hour o until firm enough to handle. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Shape dough into I-1/8 inch balls; roll in sugar. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Place: slivered almonds on top of each; pres lightly. Bake 9-10 minutes or until set. Cool slightly. Remove from cookie shee to wire rack. Cool completely. About 3 1/2 dozen cookies **Toasted Oatmeal Cookies**
