





Genuine Mexican Hot Tamales Prepare corn shucks by washing them horoughly and soak them in water about one hour. Separate and grade them. They should be six or seven inches long and two or three inches wide. Next take about two pounds of beef (or you may use pork). Place this in one gallon pot, add water, salt and cook until done. Then grind very thin. Take a medium onion and a few buttons of garlic and fry in pan till juice is extracted and remove hem. Add the meat an fry for five minutes, stirring constantly and add about 4 tablespoons chili. Blend and salt to taste. Addenough flour to thicken. Scald two quarts of corn meal and add enough broth to make a thick dough. Add half pound of rendered suet, salt and a teaspoon of chili. Blend. Mix and add broth until dough is somewhat thin. Take husks and spread on this a layer of dough about 4 inches long and 2 inches wide and 1/8 inch thick. In center, spread a teaspoon of meat mixture. Roll ike a cigarette and fold the ends. Place a steamer (not water) and steam about 2 hours. Serve hot.

in a sack of flour. Fry in hot oil. Drain on paper towel an salt and serve immediately. Or slice onions and dip in l cup buttermilk and fry in deep fat until brown. Salt and pepper to taste and serve immediately.


