Anticipation Is The Worst Of It!

Franklin D. Roosevelt's famous quote that "we have nothing to fear but fear itself" is so true. Born without the cushioning fluid sack within my knees, osteo arthritis has worn the knees out. For years I have needed total knee joint replacement. But, partly because a doctor kept telling me that I was too young for it, and partly because of fear on my part, I have put it off, and put it off. I was, simply put, scared to death of the idea of having my leg bones sawed off!

I have spent the last few years lying awake until two or three in the morning, in pain. I have watched my world shrink smaller and smaller until shopping, vacationing, gardening and even simple tasks such as housekeeping have become too painful to bear. Then, my limp was so severe that I herniated my back because of the way I walked!

Finally, a new doctor put things in a different light. He pointed out that yes, I was young for a knee replacement, but would I rather be crippled now or in my 70s or 80s. Hey, there's no guarantee I'll even be here then!

So, I scheduled a left knee replacement. In the weeks before hand I became a "basket case". Just talking about the surgery made my teeth chatter, literally. I couldn't do anything but dread the terrible surgery coming up. It's a wonder my staff didn't kill me, I was so cranky.

The morning I checked into the hospital I was in a foul mood, and kept wanting Thomas to let me leave. I was ready to back out. To make it worse, no less than three people at the hospital mentioned how tough this surgery was. I really liked the little nurse who said "and many people complain more about the sore throat from the tube in their throat than they do about the procedure. But I see you're scheduled for a total knee....so you'll be in lots of pain and won't notice the sore

throat. What a comfort! Finally, I awoke from the surgery. It hurt. For two days it hurt bad. But guess what, folks. After that I could walk on the knee with a walker and it isn't as painful as it was before the surgery! Yes, I've got a lot of physical therapy to do. Lying in a machine that bends my leg back and forth for 6 hours a day is a bore! But guys, my knee is stronger now than it was. The pain is less than before, and it has only been two weeks. I'm excited. I 'm hopeful that my life is going to blossom outwards once more. And I'm probably going to do the other knee within a few

months. My point? Nothing was worse than the dread and anticipation of a procedure I was terrified of. But the reality was a lot less than I thought. Which leads me to thinking that it's usually that way. Very few things in life turn out to be as bad as the dread and fear of them. I'm going to try and remember that when next faced with the unknown!



The purpose of the Red River County Child Protective Services Board, in cooperation with the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services, is to develop a program for the protection, care and well being of the dependent and neglected children of Red River County, to encourage and promote such activities as will benefit all children coming to its attention who are in need of casework services and to perform such specific duties in the field of child welfare as the County, Commissioners Court and the State Division of Child Protective Services may re-

Funding for the Red River County Child Protective Services Board is received through federal and state resources for payment to caretakers for room and board of Red River County foster children. Funding for all other child care expenses are received from Red River County Commissioners Court, donations and various fundraisers.

In Texas, child abuse and neglect includes specific acts or omissions. The Department of Protective and Regulatory Services investigates reports alleging abuse or neglect by a person responsible for a child's care, custody or welfare.

Services for foster children include clothing, school supplies, medical and dental expenses, enrichment activities, educational expenses, birthday, allowances, transportation, nonreimbursable child care and child abuse prevention projects.

Farm Bureau to launch market education program

Risk is something Texas farmers live withon a daily basis, and the state's largetst farm organization will soon have anew program designed to

help farmers manage their risk.
The Texas Farm Bureau will begin anew Agricultrural Market Education Program on April 1 of this year. The program will offer basic and intermediate educaion on futures market hedging, options trading and other risk management techniques.

A combination of low market prices and weather related disasters has left much of Texas agriculture in a real financial bind. There is just too much risk in agriculture, and it is believed this program will give members more risk management tools. It will focus on the basics and the "how to get started" questions that many producers have about the furtures market according to Vernie Glasson, TFB Executive Director.

The program is the first of several new programs that will be implemented as a result of Farm Bureau delegate action to adopt the "Project 2000" plan. The Project 2000 plan is the result of a special Farm Bureau leader task force study to give direction to the organization for the year

2000 and beyond. Other new programs will be implemented next year, Glasson said. Risk management education for agricultural producers is son important, however, the Texas Farm Bureau Board of Directors felt this program should be started immediately. I was announced that Bryce Myrick, currently a TFB Field Services Representative, will lead the Agricultural Marketing Education Program. Myrick resides in Abilene, and has served as liaison between the state organization and Farm Bureau members in that part of Texas fr almost ten years.

The program wil feature initial seminars and follow up sessions that will be offered to producers free of charge. It will also serve as a source of information and dialogue for Farm Bureau members who implement risk management techniques.

Bryce has knowledge in this important area, as well as a demonstrated ability to work with agricultural producers. Improving net farm income is what this organization is all about, and the program will possibly create new opportunities for farmers to improve their profitabil-


Red River County Roots
