



I then related what was going on. Yes, he laughed, but did point out that it was good something wasn't really the matter with our monitor.


But, I swear I could hear him laughing and already relating this embarrassing story to the rest of the employees there. Tell me this one won't make an urban legend!

In the past, there have been vendors on Main Street selling new craft items, knives and other knew goods. Don't miss it.





Dear Editor:

Every heart in our nation, state and communities has been touched deeply by the tragedy that occurred in Columbine High School at Littleton, Colorado. Our grief and sorrow has brought forth the question "Could this happen in the school where my children and grandchildren attend?"

"Could something like this occur in the Prairiland District?" "How safe are the schools at Blossom, Deport and Pattonville?" As Superintendent of the Prairiland District I have to answer, "Yes, something like this could happen in our schools." It could happen because when crazy people decide to do crazy things, there are no means of security which can prevent the action. We believe that our schools are safe. We strive to provide a place where kids are safe from violence, threats, and intimidation. There is no question that students sometime do the "name calling". This seems to be a part of the growing up process. This is not to say it is right, but it happens. If you have more than one child in your home, you have to deal with it as parents. Name calling and prejudice actions can and should be addressed early. No one enjoys being teased, belittled or humiliated. Children often do these things because of the examples taught by adults.

We have a Student Code of Conduct and a Student Handbook which outlines policies, procedures, discipline techniques and various other things intended to make our schools safe places for kids and adults. Every school in the Prairiland district has a Crisis Management Plan.

Our entire faculty is aware of this plan. Our personnel has had training to deal with most kinds of emergencies. Every campus has people designated as Crisis Management personnel. They can handle most types of accidents, choking, seizures, broken bones C.P.R., etc. Our administrators, counselors and nurses strive to be aware of the problems confronting our student body. These people try to deal with issues quickly before they develop into severe problems.

When one of the teachers at Columbine High Schools was interviewed on television she was told that the students called her a hero. Her reply was, "No, I'm not a hero, I was just doing what teachers do every day all over the U.S.; I was just doing my job." This is so true. Next week is National Educator Appreciation Week. I will use this opportunity to thank our teachers and faculty for the work they do with our, with my kids. I hope you will do the same.

When tragedies occur in our schools, no one hurts more than educators. Then, we are hurt when the media uses these events to promote the sale of papers and air-time by presenting public schools as war zones. This is not true. Research shows that schools are safe places for kids.

We pledge to you, our community, to do everything within our ability to make the schools of Blossom, Deport and Prairiland High as safe as possible. We ask for and want your help as we all work to provide our kids with a safe, happy environment where they are the Learners of Today and can develop into the Leaders of Tomorrow.

Due to the escalating costs of printing, postage and overall expenses the cost of printing a single page in a newspaper has risen substantially. Because of this Thunder Prairie Publishing has had to initiate some nominal charges for obituaries, engagements and weddings.

The Bogata News, Blossom Times, Deport Times, Detroit Weekly and Talco Times are virtually the only papers around who do not charge for these things.

The funeral homes will be billed for the obituaries, so that the family wil not have to deal with it. Only when an obituary is mailed in from

Termites swarming


If you see termites flying outside your house this time of year, don't panic, say an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service

If you find them flying about inside your house, it's a whole different matter. Termites are everywhere in East Texas. This time of year termite colonies become overcrowded. The excess males and females are pushed out and they mate in flight. The females then start looking for a suitable site to start a new colony.

For a female termite, any untreated wood in contact with the soil is an ideal nesting site. Winged termites are black and about 1/4 inch long. Their wings are flimsy and transparent. They are not very strong fliers and only flutter about. If you have an infestation inside the home, you are likely to find them fluttering about the window sills. They soon shed their wings and often the only sign you will find of them is the shed wings according to James Robinson, Extension entomologist based at Texas A & M University Agricul-

tural Research and Extension Center, Overton.

If you do find evidence of winged termites inside your house, then it is likely infested and you should call a professional exterminator. You may have an infestation and never see a flying termite in your house. The worker termites are white and look like small ants. The workers are the one that do all the damage. If you find them in dead wood near the house or in your scrapwood pile in the garage, you may have an infestation. Robinson did not recommend homeowners trying to control the infestation themselves. Most of the more effective products available today require special equipment and training to apply properly. Homeowners can find answers to the most commonly asked questions by visiting their local county extension office. Alternately, at http:// dallas.tamu.edu/factsheet/ they can find extension termite factsheets on termites and other pests.



Red River County Roots This week's query is from Shirley (Cartwright) McKenzie, 1516 Delmont Road, Memphis, TN 28117 (2010)

38117-6710. She has an old photograph made from Russell Studio, Clarksville, TX. The photo was probably made in the late 1800's and the name on the back appears to be J.M.H. Cartwright. Mrs. McKenzie's relative, John Nelson Cartwright (b. 1809 TN) and wife Mary (b. 1805 NC) were in MS from 1835 to at least 1860, where they were recorded in the DeSoto County, MS census. They had at least six children: James H., William F., Thomas F., John J., Benjamin M., and Theresa J. Cartwright. It is thought that at least some of this family may have moved to TX. and possibly settled in Red River County. This photograph is her only clue so far to a Red River County connection. However, she does know that some Cartwright relatives eventually lived in Hugo, OK

Sandy says that she likes quick and easy recipes and her family is not hard to please. We hope you enjoy these and we will see you in the kitchen!



placing a glass bulb thermometer near your thermostat and compare readings.

*All windows and doors should be weatherstripped and window and door frames should be thoroughly caulked.

*Keep fireplace dampers tightly closed when not in use.

*Install a hot water heater timer for additional savings. It can turn off the water heater during the day when no one is home and turn it on again prior to the end of the day to prepare for meals and baths.

*Wait until you have a full load to run the dishwasher or washing machine

*Clean refrigerator condenser coils at least twice a year.
