Deport council considers low-interest loan application for water improvements

The Deport City Council held a special called meeting on Monday, May 17th to handle two pressing items of business.

All council members were present when they began the meeting by passing a resolution encouraging the Texas Department of Transportation to use the existing route through Deport for the proposed four lane highway.

The second item was a presentation by Mike Donner of Hayter Engineering who spoke on the application for a low-interest loan from the Texas Water Development Board.

After discussion the council voted

to hire Hayter Engineering as the engineering firm and looked at two resumes from financial advisory services. They decided to hire Southwest Securities in this position.

The council will meet before June 1, 1999 with an attorney who will review the city's financial condition and advise them on how to proceed with the loan application. The loan will be used to improve water mains in various parts of Deport. This will improve fire protection, and the potable water supply to those areas.

The council has a June 1, 1999 deadline in applying for this loan.

FOOT NOTES

SHOULD YOUR CHILD SEE A PODIATRIST?

Young children's feet often cause concern among parents. While usually there is no cause for worry, there are some signs that might make an examination by a podiatrist a wise decision. Mild in-toeing and out-toeing is common in toddlers; if it is excessive, have it checked. High arches are not developmentally normal and should be examined. Deformities of the toes, such as overlapping, should be corrected before they cause problems. Suspicious lumps should always be investigated. If your child's shoe wear is abnormal or excessive, that may also signal a problem. Night time cramps in the feet and legs are common and usually caused by over tired muscles, but if the problem is frequent, see the podiatrist to rule out hidden problems. Mobilization is a milestone in baby's life that is a giant step towards independence, but one that shouldn't be rushed. When it does happen, mark it by making an appointment with your podiatrist for baby's first step towards good foot health care maintenance. Most children are mildly bowlegged up to age two; knock knees are common from ages three to seven. Most often, these problems resolve themselves before adulthood.

ARE YOUR MEDICINE BILLS TOO HIGH?

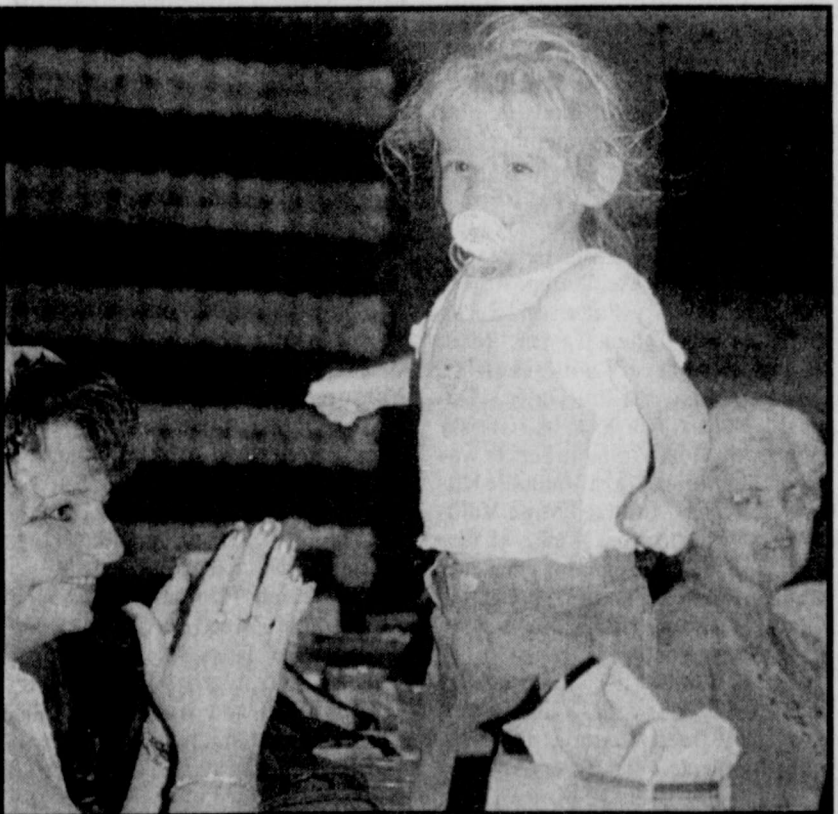

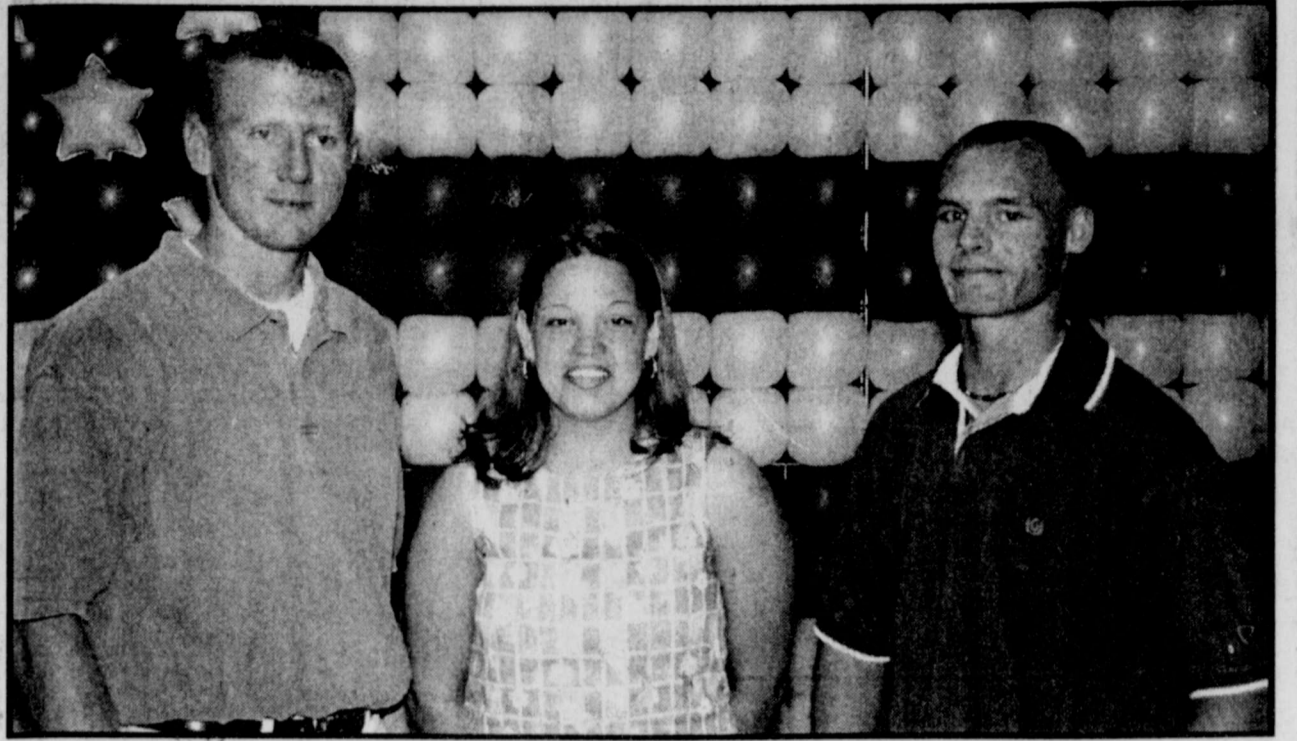
