

Peanut Butter Fudge

3 cups sugar small can evaporated milk dash of salt 2 cups peanut butter chips jar marshmallow cream I cup pecans -1/2 stick margarine

Mix salt, sugar, milk and margarine. Cook over medium high heat to soft ball stage. Remove from heat and add peanut butter chips and marshmallow cream. Beat with electric mixer until smooth. Add pecans and pour into a 9x13 inch buttered dish.

1/2 cup heavy cream salt and freshly ground black pepper pinch of sugar

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Put unhusked corn and unpeeled garlic onto baking sheet and roast for about 25 minutes, until the corn is fragrant and husks are lightly browned. Partially cover, bring to a simmer over medium heat and adjust the heat to maintain simmer. Cook and cover 20 minutes, until potato pieces are tender. Drain the potatoes, discard cobs and reserve potato broth. In food processor, combine kernels, garlic, potatoes and commeal. Puree, adding broth gradually through feed tube. Out of a typical litter of four puppies or kittens, only one stands a chance of finding a home. Two will be eventually abandoned to fend for themselves, one will end up at a shelter and be euthanized and one will be adopted.

Why? Because there are simply too many of them.

Despite progress in reducing the numbers of homeless animals, dog and cat overpopulation in this country is still a tragedy. There are approximately 112 million dogs and cats in American homes, most of them loved and cared for by responsible people.

Unfortunately, all too often, when a cat or dog has a litter, people get rid of its offspring. And no matter how good their intentions, the result is death for millions of cats and dogs each year! Approximately 30-60% of all animals brought into shelters are euthanized.

Perhaps the most shocking of all is the fact that this problem can be pre-

Spay/neuter seems like such and easy solution, but many people avoid it because there has been so much false information generated on the subject. For example: Owners of male cats and dogs are

afraid that having them neutered will make them fat or lazy. Neutering a male pet merely makes him less likely to run off or to fight with other males. Spraying (urine marking), which is often done by cats to mark their territory, is eliminated.

People are afraid the operation harms pets. The surgery is low risk, and performed under anesthesia. It also prevents some health problems commmon to cats and dogs later on.



The dog days of summer are definitely here and with them comes higher air conditioning bills. Consider these tips recommended by *Home Plan Ideas* magazine.

Tips for Keeping Cool

Anything that stops the sun before it gets into the house reduces heat build-up.

• Attach awnings. Get ready-made fabric, aluminum or wood awnings that tie in with the exterior of the house. Place them on windows where sunlight enters in the morning and evening.

• Hang light-color window shades. Those with shiny outer surfaces are best at sending the sun back out the window.

• Install heat-reflecting or low-emissivity windows. They have a thin film sealed inside the double-pane glass to slow heat gain in summer and heat loss in winter.

• Cross ventilate. Exhaust air when it's cooler outside than inside. Make sure air can come in one window and leave through another.

• Install an attic fan. It will push hot air out of the attic or draw cool evening air into your home.

• Add skylights that open. As the hot air rises it can escape through the open skylight. Buy skylights with tinted glass to cut down on solar heat gain.



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\$5 PSA Blood **Tests for East Texas Men At Risk for Prostate Cancer**

Last year, ETMC issued a call to arms to East Texas men at risk for prostate cancer. In the largest screening of its kind, more than 12,000 answered the call by getting a PSA blood test to help detect prostate cancer at its most treatable stage.

This June, the ETMC Cancer Institute is calling for men at risk to take up arms once more against this disease which kills more than 37,000 men each year, and which every man has a one-in-six chance of developing in his lifetime.

You are at risk if you are 50 (or more) years of age, or if you are age 40 (or more) and:

- you are African-American, or
- have a family history of prostate cancer.

You are eligible for this special screening if you are at risk, as defined above, and meet the following screening guidelines: you are not under the care of a urologist, and you have not had a PSA test since September 1, 1998.

When detected early, prostate cancer is 93 percent curable. If you're at risk, arm yourself with a \$5 PSA blood test at ETMC. Call the ETMC HealthFirst line at

Jim's reserach and extension education activities are in ranch management. In that capacity he had a leadership role in the methodology, software development, and use with producers of the Integrated Resource

The Red River Valley Cattleman's Management-Standardized perfor-ssociation's June 17 speaker will be mance Analysis System (IRM-SPA) for beef cattle producers. This was a national effort coordinated by the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA). Now Jim coordinates the cow-calf SPA data base for the southwesern United States.

Over the years Jim haws worked directly with many raches. In various capacities he's worked with managers in 10 stats, including a number of the nation's largest ranches. In that list are the W.T. Waggoner Estates Ranch, King Ranch, Camp Cooley Ranch, T.D. Cattle Company, Spade Ranches and Brocccos Ranch in Texas, plus ranches in Florda, Wyoming and Montana.


