The Bogata Rodeo is 50 years old and still kicking! Last year, the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association chose the annual Bogata Rodeo as the Southern Rodeo of the Year, an attest to the championship rodeo action that is seen locally each year in June.
Dates for the rodeo this year are June 24-25-26, the last weekend of the month. Performances will begin at 8:00 p.m. nightly at the Bogata Rodeo Arena.
The Bogata Rodeo has a new look this year. With the continuing idea that "every seat is a good seat" for spectators, new bucking chutes, timed event chutes and a center alley for the barrel racers has been added.
Parades will be featured at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday and Saturday, preceding the performances of the rodeo.
This year, in honor of the 50th year celebration, commemorative T-shirts will be available from the Bogata Volunteer Fire Department and will be on sale at the rodeo. Concessions are made possible through the Bogata Lions Club.
Members for the Bogata Rodeo Association this year are: Buck Knight, president; Bryan Williams, vice-president; Randy Huddleston, secretary. Charter members include James Gibson, Travis Hale, Jessie Gray, William Rozell, Helen Williams, Guy Smelser, Steve Biggerstaff

and Henry Hudson.
Members with more than 25 years service and dedication to the association to continue its community-oriented idea of "helping the other fellow" are Travis King, Sam Barnard, C.R. Williams, Vernon Harville, H.E. Bryson, Ennis Moore, Carl Williams, Carl Wood, Helen Yancey, Charlie Lewis, Donnie Strain, Roy Lee Hutson, Bo Harville, Johnny Hudson and Gaston Puckett.
Membership costs \$15.00 per year and the organization meets the first Monday evening of each month at 7:00 p.m. Meetings are held at the Bogata Rodeo Arena or in the winter/bad weather, at the Bogata Community Center. A membership drive is held every year in October.
The Bogata Rodeo Association is a nonprofit organization that began around 1948 in Rosalie by local citizens.
In 1952, the rodeo was moved to Bogata and soon became known to cowboys, cowgirls and spectators as The Bogata Rodeo. Property was purchased on the south side of Bogata and the grounds were prepared in 1954 for the Bogata Rodeo Arena.
The Association became incorporated in 1963 and continues an organized membership of officers and directors of local people who donate their time and energy to this long-standing tradition.
This year, exciting rodeo events will include bareback riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, team roping, bull riding, barrel racing, kids mutton bustin' and for the spectators, Mexican poker.

Bogata has long been known as the home of the Wing Rodeo Company, celebrated rodeo company.
Jerald and Joan Smith, owners and operators of the Wing Rodeo Company, have made rodeo their life's work, and it's evident by the innumerable awards they have brought back to their quiet Pine Branch home. The Smiths have been involved in the bucking horse and bull business for as long as they can remember, and have been successful at reproducing some of the award-winning stock they boast now as coming from their foundation livestock.
Through a carefully selected and highly successful breeding program, the Smiths are reaping the rewards that far surpass the buckles, plaques and awards they have been given. That reward is seeing their hand-picked, home-raised horse and bull progeny being acknowledged as outstanding rodeo stock in the competitive world of today.
And, as always, Saturday is Frontier Day in Bogata, with the Bogata Lions Club sponsoring all day activities in downtown Bogata. The complete schedule will run in next week's edition of the Bogata News. The final performance on Saturday night will be marked with a rodeo dance at the Moonlight Jubilee in Rosalie.

One dies in early morning crash

A Paris woman was killed in a one vehicle accident Sunday morning at 2:02 a.m. on FM 410 South West of Fulbright in Red River County. According to a DPS report filed by DPS Officer Kevin Gray a 1995 Chevrolet Pickup driven by Michael Webb of Deport lost control and overturned in a ditch.
The driver and three passengers occupied the vehicle at that time. Twenty one year old Cherise Bohanon of Paris was pronounced dead at the scene by Red River County Justice of the Peace J.R. Lewis.
Also seriously injured was 28 year old Tina Bohanon of Paris. Shane

Forbus of Paris and driver Michael Webb of Deport were not seriously injured. According to Officer Gray, the driver was the only occupant of the vehicle wearing a seat belt at the time the accident occurred.
An investigation of the accident is pending, waiting for test results from a DPS lab, Gray said. No charges have been filed against anyone in relation to the accident at this time.
This fatality puts the county death toll at two this year. By this time last year the county had a total of 14 deaths as a result of traffic accidents.

Texas Department of Transportation officials met with representatives of Buster Paving Company, Inc. of Sulphur Springs, Texas Tuesday, June 8, 1999 to discuss the upcoming project in Fannin, Lamar and Red River County.
This project, which will begin construction on June 14, 1999 in Clarksville, is for re-surfacing of the existing roadway. The project will require approximately four months for completions.
The project locations are as follows:
Clarksville-US 82 from just east of East SH 37 to FM 1159 for a distance of 2.025 miles.
Detroit-US 82 from Junction of FM 410 east for a distance of 0.478

miles.
Blossom-US 82 from Bell Street to Holly Street for a distance of 0.450 miles
Paris-BU 82-from NW 34th street east to SH 19/24 for a distance of 2.096 miles.
Paris-BU 271-B from Junction US 82 (loop) to Pine Bluff Street for a distance of 1.517 miles.
Bonahm-From just west of SH 121 S. east to Lipscomb Street for a distance of 1.891 miles.

Roasted Corn Soup is another one of those recipes I found and if you have an abundance of corn you might try this one!

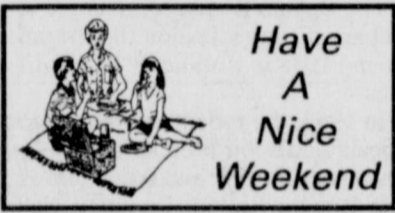

Marble Cheesecake
1 cup graham cracker crumbs
3 tablespoons sugar
3 tablespoons margarine-melted
3-8 ounce cream cheese-softened
3/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 eggs
1-1 ounce unsweetened melted chocolate
Combine crumbs, sugar and margarine; press onto bottom of 9-inch springform pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Combine cream cheese, sugar and vanilla, mixing at medium speed on electric mixer until well blended. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Blend chocolate into 1 cup batter. Spoon plain and chocolate batters alternately over crust; cut through batters with knife several times for marble effect. Bake at 450 degrees, 10 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 250 degrees; continue baking 30 minutes. Loosen cake from rim of pan; cool before removing rim of pan. Chill.

Combine the berries, jalapeno's and pectin in a large stainless-steel pot. Bring to rolling boil; stir in the sugar and bring to a boil again and boil hard for at least one minute, stirring constantly. Skim off any foam that has accumulated on top of mixture. Pour into hot half-pint canning jars that have been sterilized.

Roasted Corn Soup
6 ears corn with husks intact
3 large cloves garlic-unpeeled
2 cups homemade chicken broth
1 baking potato-peeled and cut into pieces
1 tablespoon cornmeal
1/2 cup heavy cream
salt and freshly ground black pepper
pinch of sugar
Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Put unhusked corn and unpeeled garlic onto baking sheet and roast for about 25 minutes, until the corn is fragrant and husks are lightly browned. Let cool; then remove the husks and silks. Cut kernels away from the cobs. Cut 4 cobs in half, crosswise, with heavy knife or cleaver. Discard the remaining 2 cobs. Peel garlic. Set kernels and garlic cloves aside. In saucepan, combine the broth, potato, halved corn cobs and 3 cups water. Partially cover, bring to a simmer over medium heat and adjust the heat to maintain simmer. Cook and cover 20 minutes, until potato pieces are tender. Drain the potatoes, discard cobs and reserve potato broth. In food processor, combine kernels, garlic, potatoes and cornmeal. Puree, adding broth gradually through feed tube. Transfer the soup to a sieve set over a bowl and press the mixture through sieve with rubber spatula, leaving corn skins behind. Transfer the soup to clean saucepan. Stir in cream and reheat. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Add sugar is desired.

Grandma's Potato Salad
8 potatoes
2 celery sticks
1 package thin sliced bacon
5 boiled eggs
5 small sweet pickles
1 small onion
1 cup mayonnaise or add to taste
salt to taste
Boil potatoes until soft. While potatoes are boiling, fry bacon till very crusty. When potatoes are ready, crumble bacon into potatoes, then chopped celery. Add with diced pickle and chopped boiled eggs into all ingredients and mix well with mayo. Chill, then serve.

Peanut Butter Fudge
3 cups sugar
1 small can evaporated milk
dash of salt
2 cups peanut butter chips
1 jar marshmallow cream
1 cup pecans
1-1/2 stick margarine
Mix salt, sugar, milk and margarine. Cook over medium high heat to soft ball stage. Remove from heat and add peanut butter chips and marshmallow cream. Beat with electric mixer until smooth. Add pecans and pour into a 9x13 inch buttered dish.

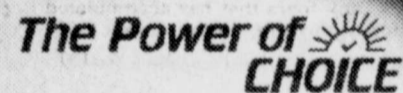
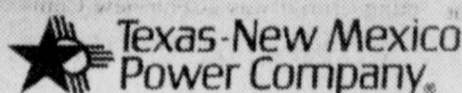

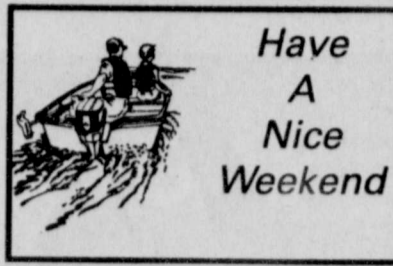

For example: Owners of male cats and dogs are afraid that having them neutered will make them fat or lazy. Neutering a male pet merely makes him less likely to run off or to fight with other males. Spraying (urine marking), which is often done by cats to mark their territory, is eliminated.

People are afraid the operation harms pets. The surgery is low risk, and performed under anesthesia. It also prevents some health problems common to cats and dogs later on.

Some pet owners believe a female cat or dog should have at least one litter before it's spayed. Not true! She will not miss having a litter and the earlier a female pet is spayed, the less likely she is to suffer the stress and frustration of heat periods.



BUDDY'S WORKSHOP Tips for Keeping Cool

- The dog days of summer are definitely here and with them comes higher air conditioning bills. Consider these tips recommended by *Home Plan Ideas* magazine.
- Anything that stops the sun before it gets into the house reduces heat build-up.
- Attach awnings. Get ready-made fabric, aluminum or wood awnings that tie in with the exterior of the house. Place them on windows where sunlight enters in the morning and evening.
 - Hang light-color window shades. Those with shiny outer surfaces are best at sending the sun back out the window.
 - Install heat-reflecting or low-emissivity windows. They have a thin film sealed inside the double-pane glass to slow heat gain in summer and heat loss in winter.
 - Cross ventilate. Exhaust air when it's cooler outside than inside. Make sure air can come in one window and leave through another.
 - Install an attic fan. It will push hot air out of the attic or draw cool evening air into your home.
 - Add skylights that open. As the hot air rises it can escape through the open skylight. Buy skylights with tinted glass to cut down on solar heat gain.

\$5 PSA Blood Tests for East Texas Men At Risk for Prostate Cancer

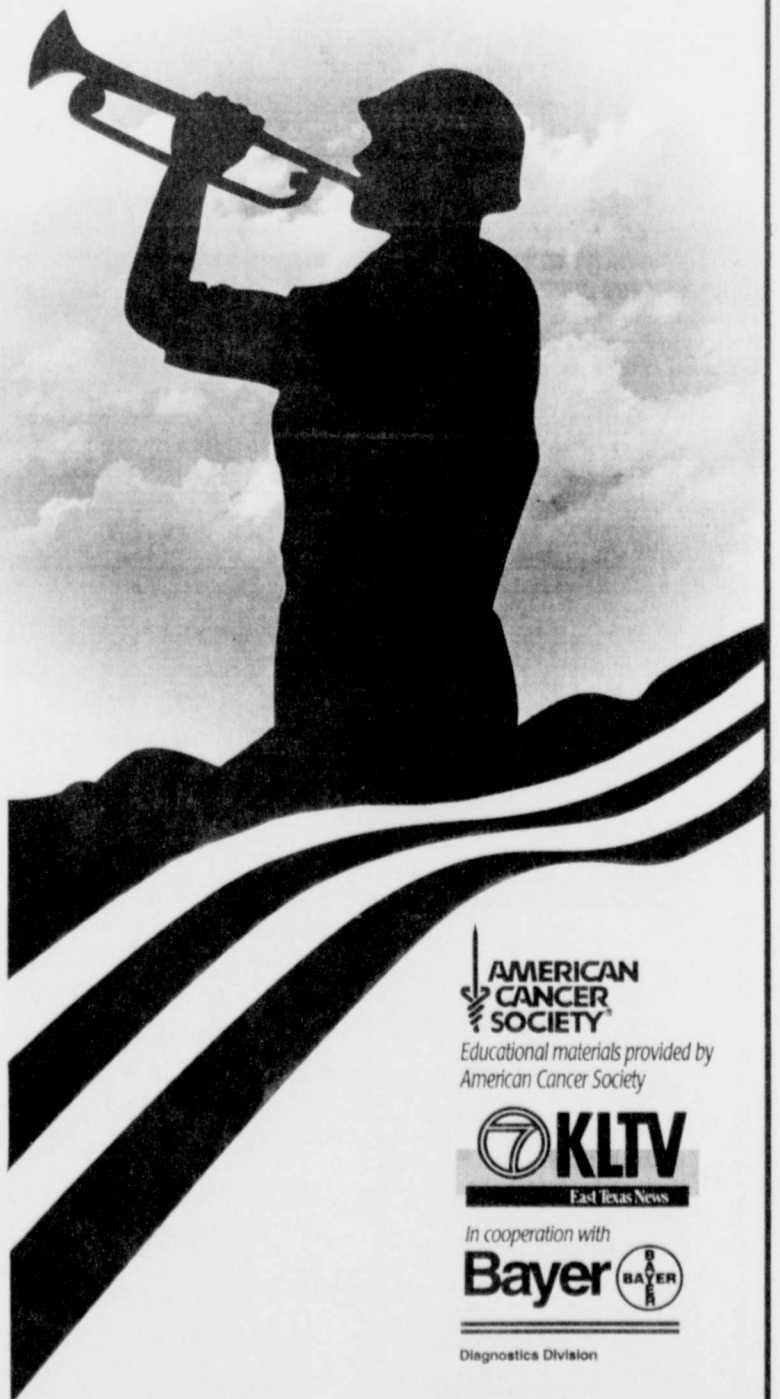

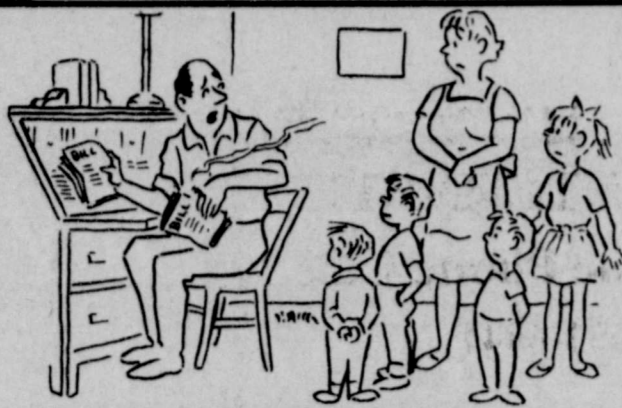

RRVCA to have blockbuster program

The Red River Valley Cattleman's Association's June 17 speaker will be Dr. James McGrann, a professor and Extension Management Economist in the Department of Agricultural Economics at Texas A&M University. He is appearing in an effort to recruit at least 30 ranchers to volunteer for a study on beef producers in northeast Texas and southeast Oklahoma. In addition to recruiting for the study, he'll talk on the economics of the decision making process.

For many, economics is boring beyond belief. But when Jim crunches the numbers his approach and conclusions are far from boring. And when it comes to crunching numbers for ranchers, Jim may be the world's best. Therefore, this meeting is going to be about getting the numbers and getting them right, to improve one's decision-making process. And it's decisions that influence profits and losses.

Jim's research and extension education activities are in ranch management. In that capacity he had a leadership role in the methodology, software development, and use with producers of the Integrated Resource

Management-Standardized performance Analysis System (IRM-SPA) for beef cattle producers. This was a national effort coordinated by the National Cattleman's Beef Association (NCBA). Now Jim coordinates the cow-calf SPA data base for the southwestern United States.

Over the years Jim has worked directly with many ranches. In various capacities he's worked with managers in 10 states, including a number of the nation's largest ranches. In that list are the W.T. Waggoner Estates Ranch, King Ranch, Camp Cooley Ranch, T.D. Cattle Company, Spade Ranches and Broccos Ranch in Texas, plus ranches in Florida, Wyoming and Montana.

He has conducted SPA workshops for ranchers in Florida, Montana, Texas, Alabama, New Mexico, Washington, Oklahoma and Nebraska. Now he's coming to Paris to talk to the RRVCA.

Jim was raised on a ranch in the state of Washington. He has a B.A. and M.A. in Agricultural Economics from Washington State University and a PhD from Texas A&M University

in Agricultural Economics. Before joining the Texas A&M Staff in 1979 he worked in Argentina and Uruguay and was on the farm management faculty at Iowa State University.

What's his goal with area beef producers? He wants to get at least 30 ranches in the northeast Texas and southeast Oklahoma region to work with him, Oklahoma State University and the Noble Foundation in developing an operating SPA data base for area ranches. This would be like the program for the ranchers in the Rolling Plains area of Texas. There they have 92 herds working with Jim and extension colleagues, especially Stan Bevers from Vernon, Texas. Those herds range in size from 36 head to 13,884 head. So you can see his program is for everyone. Don't pass up the opportunity to learn more about our own businesses by attending this important meeting.

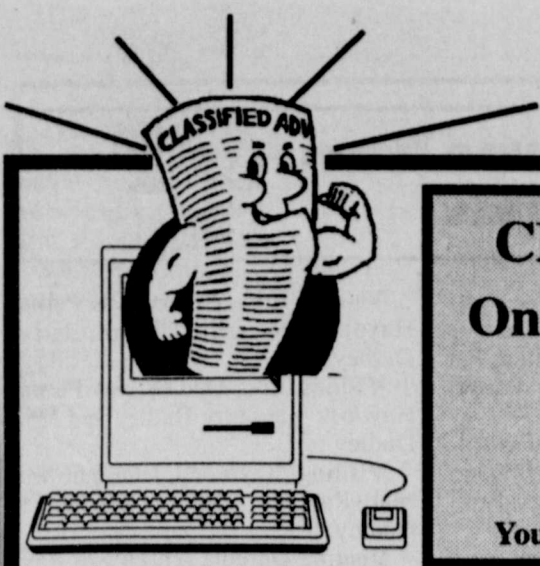
