

He is the author of more than a dozen books. He has started another one, a collaboration that involves engravings and prints of early Texas.





Nothing tops off a meal like a sweet, delicious, home-canned relish. Discarding the value of your time and labor, canning homegrown food may save you half the cost of buying commercially canned foods. Canning favorite and special products to be enjoyed by family and friends is a fulfilling experience and a source of pride for many people.

Many vegetables begin losing some of their vitamins when harvested. Nearly half the vitamins may be lost within a few days unless the fresh produce is cooled or preserved. Within 1-2 weeks, even refrigerated produce loses half or more of some of

its vitamins. The heating process during canning destroys from onethird to one-half of vitamins A and C, thiamin and riboflavin. Once canned, additional losses of these sensitive vitamins are from 5-20 percent each year. The amounts of other vitamins, however, are only slightly lower in canned compared with fresh food, if vegetables are handled properly and canned promptly after harvest, they can be more nutritious than fresh produce sold in local stores.

The advantages of home canning are lost when you start with poor quality fresh foods; when jars fail to seal properly; when food spoils; and when flavors, textures, color and nutrients deteriorate during prolonged storage.



Judith Toney Chumley, age 67 of Balch Springs, formerly of Detroit, died August 3 at Vencor Hospital in Dallas.



### Bogata couple loses horses in Cruelty complaint

Red River County Justice of the Peace J.R. Lewis ordered on Monday morning, August 2, that three horses and two mules belonging to Chris and Wendy Albritton of Bogata, TX be sold, concluding the 9:00 a.m. hearing to determine what would be done with the animals.

Earlier in July, the couple had been cited for violation of a Bogata city ordinance concerning animals being housed inside the city limits. The couple had asked for a trial by jury concerning this ordinance.

This citation was followed by a complaint of animal cruelty being filed against the couple by the Lamar County Humane Society.

Upon the cruelty to animals charge being filed, both Chris and Wendy Albritton were arrested by Red River County officials and placed in Red River County Jail last week for violation of a Class A Misdemeanor until they posted bond for their release.

through documented reports of her investigation of the complaints and her on site visits, found that the animals were in poor physical condition and that adequate food, water and shelter was not offered to the animals. Three of the animals, Mrs. Fergen continued, were chained to the trees in such a manner that they could not even lay down to sleep or rest. She testified that the animals were not given access to water or food, even though temperatures had soared over the 100° range.

She also stated that a round bale of hay had been donated to the Humane Society for these particular animals by Roy Marris and that he had personally delivered the hay to the animals. When that bale of hay was gone, the Albritton's called the Humane Society again for assistance, and she and her husband donated their personal hay to the animals, which was delivered by her husband. Dr. Stewardson testified that upon



Bond for each was set at \$1,000.00.

The original complaint to the City of Bogata was lodged against the Albrittons last year by Bogata citizens concerned with the animals' welfare.

The complaint alleged that five animals were being kept in the couple's back yard, three of which were chained to trees, making it impossible for them to reach food and water, had it been available to them. Following testimony from Bogata Police Chief Charles Clegg, Mrs. Georgia Fergen representing the Lamar County Humane Society, Dr. Hardy Stewardson, D.V.M., and Bogata citizen Donna Rozell, Judge Lewis heard testimony from Chris Albritton, refuting the claims made against himself and his wife, Wendy. Chief Clegg gave an update on dates of complaints filed and his in-

vestigation into the charges from the City of Bogata's standpoint. Georgia Fergen from the Lamar County Humane Society, stated

his inspection of the animals, and he stated that all five animals were in similar physical condition, that "on a scale of 1 to 10; 10 being obese, 1 being a walking skeleton, and 5 being in good physical condition, the condition of the animals was about a 1 1/2."

In their defense, Chris Albritton presented feed bills to the court, and their plans to obtain more property for the animals in question. He stated that they did indeed feed and water the animals, but usually at such a time that no one was aware of it.

Concluding the testimony and upon Judge Lewis' determination of the facts presented, Lewis ruled that the animals, now in the custody of Dr. Stewardson, be sold, with proceeds from the sale going first toward the expenses incurred by the animals, and the remainder being forwarded to the Albrittons.

Charges are pending with the Red River County District Attorney.







### Horses can serve as warning signs of mosquito-borne encephalitis

Mosquitoes, as standard operating procedure, can make life miserable for humans, poultry, horses and livestock. This summer, there is a small chance that in East Texas a common garden variety mosquito bite can lead to death

Texas Department of Health officials have reported incidences of eastern equine encephalitis in East Texas. Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) is a disease that can be fatal to both horses and humans. In Louisiana, the disease has been cycling for more than two months, killing 40 horses and an uncounted number of emus. Most recently, two humans in Louisiana have been infected, with one man still in a coma. The eastern variety does not just kill those with weakened immune systems like the other varieties do. It can strike down a man in the prime of life. It is something to be concerned about.


Recently, the disease has spilled over to the East texas counties of Jasper, Harrison, Cherokee and Hardin. Though no East Texans have yet to become infected, 30 to 40 emus have died of the disease in Jasper County, while in Harrison, Cherokee and Hardin counties there are reports of horses either killed or diagnosed with the disease

Entomologists don't know which mosquito species transmits the disease, but they do know that Western Louisiana and East Texas are home to the same species. This week, Dr. Jimmy Olsen and members of his staff collected mosquitoes in East Texas counties where horses and emus were infected. They hope to determine exactly which species of mosquito is the vector. If identified, it will be possible to predict which counties are at risk. Until then, it would be wise to consider any mosquito suspect.

Once infected, horses begin to show clinical signs of EEE in about 5 days while symptoms in humans take 7 to 10 days to appear. The mortality rate in horses infected with EEE is from 50 to 90 %. The fatality rate in humans is 65 to 80 %, according to a Texas Department of Health release. There is an EEE vaccine for horses but not for humans. People are urged to lower their risk by wearing longsleeved shirts and pants and using mosquito repellant. The most effec tive products will contain Deet, bu the strength of the active ingredien will vary. Look for Deet or N,N diethl-m-toluamide on the list of in gredients and choose a product with the highest concentration.

Because horses show symptom: quicker than humans, they can act as sentinels for EEE activity in an area Symptoms in horses include; fever irregular gait, wandering, circling incoordination, yawning, grinding of teeth, pendulous lower lip, the inability to swallow, paralysis and occasional convulsions.

In humans, the symptoms include: fever, headache, vomiting, lethargy. neck stiffness and coma. Again, everyone is urged to use mosquito spray as self protection.



#### Depression

This is not diagnosed as depression, medically speaking, and, in most cases, can be self-treated. Each of us knows what diversions will lift our spirits, and we usually seek that sort of distraction to dispel the temporary depressed feeling. In addition, it is natural for people who have had a recent loss, for instance, to feel grief, sadness and other symptoms of "depression" for even a longer period of time. This kind of grief reaction is also not considered a medical problem unless it persists.

Depression becomes a medical problem when it immobilizes a person, leaving him or her unable to carry on normal activities or to derive pleasure from any source.



### USDA's Housing Loan agency announces new local office hours

The Mt. Pleasant Rural Development Area Office is modifying the schedule of it's local office days to better serve the public. A representative of that office will be available to the public on the first Thursday of each month from 9 a.m. to 12 noon at the Farm Service AGency in the USDA Service Center in Paris. The Office is located at 1745 Ballard Drive just off the Loop near the John Deere Store. On the fourth Wednesday of each month the Rural Development representatiave will hold local office hours from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon at the Clarksville Farm Service AGency, 313 North Locust behind the library.

Rural Development through the Rural Housing Service, makes loans to low and very low income rural families for the purchase or construction of modest, energy effecient homes. In addition, they work with lenders throughout the state to provide guaranteed loans and leveraged financing to low and moderate income families to make loans available with no down payment requirement and minimal out of pocket expenses for closing costs. Home Improvement loans at 1 % interest are available to very low income homeowners, with the possibility of some grant funds for apllicants over 62 years of age.

Rural Developemnt, formerly known as Farmers Home Administration, strives to provide decent, safe and sanitary housing in rural communities in rural communities. The Mt. 


