Well, the time has come, and I'm grateful for only one thing. I'm a bi-ped, not a quadruped!

If you lost me on that one, I'm not surprised. This is the week I go back to the hospital for five day of joyous fun and games and a right knee replacement. I think I'm doing this so that my scars will be matched. Obviously, it looks strange to have a long scar on one knee and not on the other. And I'm so fashion conscious, as everyone who knows me will testify. (That's sarcasm, folks).

No, I knew when I had the left knee done that the right one needed replacing too. I couldn't have both done at once because of my back. So, the five months have flown by on swift wings and it's time to go through it again.

What do I dread about this? Perhaps you think it is the pain? Well, yes, but not foremost. Three months rehab? Definitely, but not foremost.

I dread that five or six day hospital stay. I dread having people walk out and leave the door open so that I become a zoo specimen on display for anyone walking down the hall.

I especially dread the "Night of the Living Dead" re-enactment that we all must do. That's when you are stumbling down the hospital corridor, IV walker, drainage pumps and assorted other disgusting accessories to your outfit swinging off the walker as you limp along, dressed in those lovely gowns and a robe that absolutely doesn't cover everything that needs covering! As we pass one another we are quite a sight, knee replacements, shoulder surgeries, foot surgeries, we stumble along like a scene form the old movie "Night of the Living Dead" while some chirpy, perky therapist keeps up a running patter about how we must push on and be upbeat.

I am upbeat. I know this surgery will make my life even better. They set a task for me to do, I'll darn well do it. But don't treat me like a three year old who needs coaxing.

Meanwhile, visitors must thread their way through us, staring at our various injuries, staples and stitches and heaven only knows what else!

Finally we are all allowed back into our rooms, where we collapse in exhaustion, perhaps to be fed with a tray full of dubious food like some tame creature in a cage. After about the fourth day we even become conditioned to the sound of the food cart rumbling down the hall. The food may be awful, but it's the only food we're getting, and besides, it's a break in the dreary day whose only other entertainment is being strapped into a machine which will move the new knee back and forth, back and forth. Of course, one cannot read, embroider or paint flat on one's back. That leaves television, and I don't watch daytime TV at all!

So, here I go, dreading the things that in reality matter the least. Oh well, I've told my husband and cousin that the next time we go on a trip they better not expect to go to bed a 9:30 at night...I'm staying up



Sheriff Edrington reported that arrests are pending and the investigation is ongoing.



No one could confuse German or Italian foods, even though the two countries are close neighbors with a long history of cultural interactions. Yet many Americans don't distinguish between the cuisine of Asian countries, lumping them altogether in one broad category. There are actually as many distinct and separate culinary traditions as there are similarities.

Asia is the world's largest continent with the largest variety of cooking styles. From the arid and cold mountains of Mongolia to the hot and humid low land of Southeast Asia. Asian cooks have developed a broad range of spices, flavors and dishes to suit their local environments.

But while the flavors and foods may vary from country to country, one constant in Asian cooking is the popularity of the grill.

The grill is a good choice for Americans looking to experiment with Asian cuisine because it uses the same grilling techniques, such as the spicerubs, marinades and dipping sauces that create the Asian flavor.

Foods are usually seasoned with either a marinade or a dry spice rub and grilled. The, dishes are almost always served with a dipping sauce that complements or enhances the pre-grill seasonings.

It is very easy to impart Asian flavors to your favorite grilled foods. It can be as simple as dressing grilled vegetables with a bottled oyster sauce to evoke the flavors of Chine, or brushing baby back ribs with a Hoisin barbecue sauce. But first, you must familiarize yourself with the flavors

of Asia. Check out the following: Japanese food goes way beyond raw fish and rice. In addition to the familiar tempura, sushi and miso soup, the Japanese are avid grillers. They use a Hibachi grill. Traditionally, the food is seasoned with Japanese soy sauce, fresh ginger, dry sherry or mirin, garlic and sugar. Grilled fish, seafood, chicken, meat and vegetables are some of the specialties prepared over hot charcoal fire or on skewers on a gas grill. Grilled meats are often seasoned with ground sansho, a relative to the Szechwan peppercorns. This give the dish the same warmth as black peppercorns, but with a slightly

a barbecue sauce called tonkatsu. It taste similar to a Western barbecues sauce because the predominant ingredients are Worchestershire sauce, tomato sauce, mustard and soy sauce.

In Korea, the most famous dish is the Bulgogi. This is paper-thin slices of beef marinated in ginger, garlic, soy sauce, scallions and sesame seeds. The tenderized beef is then grilled and served with a dipping sauce made from soy sauce, sesame oil, bean paste, rice wine, toasted sesame seeds, chili sauce, spring onion, garlic and sugar. Steamed rice always accompanies the main dish along with raw and cooked relishes. Kinchi is the famous fermented or pickled condiment that is served with most meals. It is made from cabbage, white radish and laced with chilies.

Typical seasonings used in Korean dishes are soy sauce, rice vinegar, sesame oil, toasted sesame seeds, sugar, ginger, garlic, red chilies and a host of pastes that are made from fermented soybeans. Garlic is the predominate flavor in all marinated and grilled meats.

Thailand uses a lot of cilantro, hot red or green chilies, lemongrass, garlic and galangal. Galangal tastes similar to ginger with a mustard-like bit and camphor smell).

Ground white peppercorns, coriander or cumin and shrimp paste, are then added to this basic mixture in varying amounts, depending on the dish.

India uses a variety of many spices for their recipes. No other country adds spices like the Indians. Some of the essential spices are cardamom, peppercorns, cloves, coriander seed, cumin, fennel sees, mustard seed, bay leaves, tumeric, garlic and gin-

Often cooks will heat the oil and spices for marinade before marinating the meat. This intensifies the flavors and thus more fully flavors the meat.

Fresh herbs and lettuce are an essential component to Vietnamese fare. Coriander, mint, basil and scallions are but a few of the aromatic flavors typically used with meat, fish or poultry seasoned with lemongrass, garlic and shallots. One of the favorite grilled foods of Vietnam is skewered barbecued pork. The pork

rice wine, roasted ground rice and fish sauce. The meat is then threaded onto bamboo skewers and cooked over hot coals. The grilled pork is served with fresh rice noodles and lettuce leaves and either fresh coriander or mint.

China occupies the largest part of Asia and it has many distinct styles of cooking such as: Mandarin-climate affects the rice crop in this region. Substitutes used may be wheat, millet, soybeans, sorghum or corn.

Szechwan-arid and humid climate in middle China has a lot to do with these flavors. Fiery seasonings act as a natural air conditioner when eaten, using intense flavor-packed dishes.

Cantonese-subtle blend of seafoods and delicate seasonings sum up this part of Asia. Green leafy vegetables are plentiful along with fresh fruits such as bananas, pineapples and oranges.

Hunan dishes include the major influences of a more natural style of cooking using fish, shrimp, eel and crab usually braised, steamed or stewed. Traditional dishes are seasoned with rice wine, scallions, gingerroot, Szechwan peppercorns and

We hope you enjoyed out little trip this week through Asia and hope you will try some of these recipes and we will see you in the kitchen!

Grilled Baby Back Pork Ribs 'Bul-Go-Gi" Style-Bul-go-gi is probably the most popular meat dish in Korean cuisine. It is made of thin slices of beef sirloin that have been marinated in soy sauce, onions, garlic and lots of ginger and chilies and then grilled quickly at the tables. This recipe is adapted from the traditional Korean favorite.

Grilled Sechuan Peppercorn Beef-prepare marinade ahead of time at least 2-4 hours for maximum flavor and cook beef 8-10 minutes on each side. Dip in sauce.

Rice Paper Salad Rolls with Grilled Chicken and Rock Shrimp--a lot of the ingredients for these dishes may be purchased locally. Look for displays in area stores.

Whole Grilled Red Snapper with Garlic-Soy Sauce-heat reserved sauce and pour over cooked fish and topped with julienned scallions.



Hammertoes

Ranch to Rail guidelines released

Guidelines for the 1999-2000 Texas A&M University Ranch to Rail program have been released. The program is designed to provide feedback to ranchers on how their cattle perform in the feedyard and the type of carcasses they produce. Assessment of this information allows producers to determine whether or not they are on target or if they need to alter the genetics of their herd or possibly modify their management system. The purpose of the program is to provide feedback to make those deci-

Upon arrival at the feedyard, each steer is processed, individually identified, and assigned a value per hundredweight based on current market conditions. Cattle are sorted into similar groups. Steers are weighed individually at the end of the feeding period. Feed consumption for each

pen is determined Cattle are sold in a carcass basis.

Nominations of c cattle are due by September 10. There is a minimum of five steers per consignor and a \$10.00 per head nomination fee. Only steers that weigh between 500-850 pounds at arrival will be accepted. It is strongly recommended that steers be vaccinated and backgrounded at least 45 days in accordance with one of the options listed in the Value

Added Calf Vaccination Management Program. Delivery dates for the Ranch to Rail-North are October 12-13. Steers should be weaned prior to September 1. Ranch to Rail-North cattle will be fed at Swisher County Cattle Co., Tulia, TX. Assistance is provided in coordinating shipment to reduce freight costs. Last year Paris


Net interest income increased 8.0% from \$4.6 million for the first six months of 1998 to \$4.9 million for

Without the one time gain on sale of loans in 1998, non interest income increased for the first six months from \$854,000 in 1998 to \$1,317,000 in 1999, or 38.1%.

Non interest expense increased \$310,000 or 7.4\$ for the six months ended June 30, 1999, over the same period of 1998. Salary and benefits expense increased from \$2.1 million in 1998 to \$2.5 million in 1999, an increase of \$353,000 or 16.5%. Full time equivalent staff increased from 132 in 1998 to 146 in 1999 due to additional staff placement in the Paris bank, the Texarkana bank and in the new Pittsburg bank.
