This past Sunday I attended the 125th anniversary of the 1st Presbyterian Church in Deport. What I began thinking about will apply, almost without fail, to any church or community, however.

As I sat there in the pew I could almost feel the prescence of my parents, grand parents, even the great-grandparents and great-great-grandparents that I never actually knew there beside me.

The present minister and former ministers each had their say, and when Rev. Sam Rice began to speak he absolutely hit the nail on the head.

He said that he and Margie had lain awake one night and began counting the members of the church who had died during the 25 years Sam pastored the church. They got up to 48, then into the 50s, and then, later, they spoke with other church members and brought the total to 70.

Seventy church members, dead and gone to their reward! Seventy members, pillars of the church, serving as teachers, elders, deacons, faithfully attending Sunday after Sun-

Sam said "if anyone had told me that this church could survive with the loss of those 70 people I would have said 'no way, no way"

And, I realized, I would have said the same thing.

Yet, here we sat, still going strong, still active, still firm in our foundations!

And it hit me that every generation must think the same thing.

Back in the 1800s, when those pillars fell, those succeeding them must have thought that things just couldn't go on without them.

Generation after generation, we must have all felt the same thing.

And yet, churches everywhere, communities everywhere have existed generation after generation as those we think cannot be replaced are.

It was such a comforting thought, such an inspiring thing to realize.

Things do go on, in their natural, progressive order. All is as it has been, is now, and shall be in the future. Isn't that wonderful?

Deport water supply assessed safe by TNNRC

The City of Deport has received the 1998 Drinking Water Quality report. According to the report, the city water supply meets all regulation for safe consumption. The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) has assessed the Deport system from samples taken from various locations and declared it safe to drink. This extensive testing is done every four years as apposed to the testing done monthly by city officials and the Lamar County Health Department.

TNRCC literature available at City Hall states that public water supplies that meet federal standards are as safe as bottled water or point of use devices such as home filtering systems. The only exceptions are those people who are more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as those with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have under-





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How to give a cat a pill!

Pat DeWitt of Irving sent this in, and we enjoyed it so much we wanted to share it with our read-

HOW TO GIVE A CAT A PILL Pick cat up and cradle it in the

crook of your left arm as if holding a baby. Position right forefinger and thumb on either side of cat's mouth and gently apply pressure to cheeks while holding pill in right hand. As cat opens mouth pop pill into mouth. Allow cat to close mouth and swal-

Retrieve pill from floor and cat from behind sofa. Cradle cat in left arm and repeat process.

Retrieve cat from bedroom and throw away soggy pill.

Take new pill from foil wrap, cradle cat in left arm, holding rear paws tightly with left hand. Force jaws open and push pill to back of mouth with right forefinger. Hold mouth shut for a count of ten.

Retrieve pill from goldfish bowl and cat from top of wardrobe. Call spouse in from garden.

Kneel on flor with cat wedged firmly between knees, hold front and rear paws. Ignore low growls emitted by cat. Get spouse to hold head firmly with one hand while forcing wooden ruler into mouth. Drop pill down ruler, rub cat's throat vigorously.

Retrieve cat from curtain rod, get another pill. Make note to buy new ruler and repair curtains. Carefully sweep Hummell figuerines from hearth and set aside to glue back

Wrap cat in large towel and get spouse to lie on cat with head just

visible from below armpit. Put pill in end of drinking straw, force mouth open with pencil and blow pill down drinking straw.

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Check label to make sure pill is not harmful to humans, drink glass of water to take taste away. Apply bandaid to spuse's forearm and remove

blood from carpet with cold water. Retrieve cat from neighbor's shed. Get another pill. Place cat in cupboard and close door onto neck to leave head showing. Force mouth open with dessert spoon. Flick pill down throat with elastic band.

Fetch screwdrivr from garage and put door back on hinges. Apply cold compress to cheek and check records for date of last tetanus shot. Throw Tshirt away and fetch new one from

bedroom. Call fire department to retrieve cat from tree across the road. Apologize to neighbor who crashed into fence while swerving to avoid cat. Take last pill from foil-wrap.

Tie cat's front paws to rear paws with twine and bind tightly to leg of dining table, find heavy duty pruning gloves from shed, force cat's mouth open with small pair of pliers. Push pill into mouth followed by piece of steak. Hold head vertically and pour pint of water down cat's throat to

wash pill down. Get spouse to drive you to emergency room. Sit quietly while doctor stiches fingers and forearm and removes pill remnants from right eye. Stop at furniture shop to order table on way home.

Decide cat didn't need that pill anyway. How sick can this cat be? Treat yourself to a large, medicinal gin and

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

New York transplant revisits home

New York is not a city, it is a state.

A state with many wonders and beautiful views. True, there are some places in New York you should not go, but you can find those places anywhere in the world.

We recently visited New York and even though they were going through a drought, it still had a beauty that is tough to beat.

One such place is Buttermilk Falls. Over time the water has cut a path through solid rock making several deep pools, water falls and cascades on its journey. It is such a treat to walk beside the rippling stream, to be in the cool, calming shade offered by the overhanging trees, to listen to the peaceful twilling of the birds and chirping of the chipmunks. It is even a treat to put your feet in the beautifully and amazing clear water, even though at first it is shockingly cold. You must make that dip a quick one, for if you are caught in the water by the park police, you will be given a ticket, unless of course he happens to be your brother and he lets you off with a warning. (Thank God my

brother loves me!) Yes, the walk down the trail is a wonderful one until you realize that you are at the bottom of the gorge, at least an hour-long hike and your car is at the top! So you begin your journey back up the stone trail, huffing and puffing with each step. Yet with every step, you realize the view is even more spectacular on the jouirney upward and you find yourself stopping many times to admire it. (No way was I going to admit to y family that I had to stop so I could breathe because I am no longer used to walking such trails!) But as soon as you get your pictures back, the labor of the hike is forgotten as you think about how much you enjoyed that little outing and vow to return again next year.

There are several things to keep you occupied in the summer in NY. The main attraction is Watkins Glenn Race Track, which is not 1/2 mile from my brother's house. Everyone there is as enthusiastic about racing as men are about football here.

Sundays are spent watching the races at my Mom's house and it is strictly taboo to call anyone to dinner until the race is over. It is an extra special treat for them to meet Dale Earnhardt or Jeff Gordon.

There are several wineries in the area that allow you to tour and taste test their wines. However, they are very particular about not swallowing the wine. You are to sniff, sip, swish and spit. The last thing they want is a group of tipsy tourists among their vats!

In the spring, you can earn spending money tying up the grapevines and in the late fall, harvesting the grapes. My Mom had 10 children and she would take us to the fields as soon as we were tall enough to reach the trellises. It wasn't hard labor, especially when we could hide under the vines and eat our fill of the grapes.

Of course, when it came time to leave, we wouldn't have near the amount of baskets full of grapes our Mom had, but we were happy with the money we made.

We also used to tap Maple trees in the spring. The sap that ran from the trees into our jugs looked a lot like water, but after several hours over a fire we would have the best syrup or maple candy around! A gallon of sap MIGHT make 1/2 cup of syrup.

We used to gather apples in the fall. McIntosh and Spy apples mainly, and take them down to the cider mill. There is nothing better than freshly pressed cider. We used to drink it by the gallons and then...then I watched them make the cider....I thought they washed the apples, picked through them real careful, like, you know, to get all the bad spots out. And the WORMS? Not so....they just dumped the apples on the conveyor belt and the apples went up into a press.....voila'....apple cider. Never could drink much cider after that.

In the winter, the cold is different than it is here. You had to wait two or three days after a snowstorm before you could build a snow man. If you tried too soon, the snow wouldn't stick together. It would be like trying to make one out of dry flour and fall apart.

It is a fairly dry cold in NY. It doesn't go to your bones quite as quick as it does here. After about two days, usually just long enough for the snow plows to go through to enable us to attend school, we could ride our sleds. Of course, most of the time we didn't have enough sleds, so we'd have to get creative. One year we used an old car hood. You'd be

surpirsed how fast those things will move!

One year my cousins came up from Texas while we had snow. You all know Tim, Bryan and Sandy Flatt Mullins, right? We climbed to the top of the hill, about eight of us. We all piled on, holding on to each other and packed in like sardines. We started down the hill with the Texans in front. Well, as we went down the hill, we picked up speed due to the extra weight, and it became obvious to us Yankees that we weren't going to be able to stop...and my Daddy's old pickup truck was right in front of us. So we bailed off. I dont' know if the Texans thought we fell off or if they thought the toboggan was like riding a wild horse and that you were supposed to ride as long as you could. Anyhow, they stayed on that toboggan. I wish ya'll could have seen their faces as they went under that pickup. They laid flatter than pancakes, otherwise they would never have fit under! You know, Texans have a real bad temper when you laugh at them. Never could get them to be quite so trusting again..

I don't drive on icy or snow covered roads in Texas. Not that I can't, mind you. I drive pretty well in hazardous conditions. It's just that, well, truth be known, some of ya'll are pretty poor drivers in the best of conditions and almost all of you stink in bad weather! It's just safer to stay off the road when there are a bunch of rednecks out to prove they know how to drive on icy roads.

I remember having to milk cows every morning before I went to school. I had quite a parfume, believe me! I also remember having to shovel a path to the barn after a particularly bad snowstorm, and believe it or not, the drifts were over my head.

My brothers had milked cows before I began and I learned three very important lessons form them. *One*, never try to milk a cow before warming your hands. *Two*, never tie the cow's tail to the wall, no matter how hard they swat you with it, and *Three*, never ever let someone show you the star on a cow's teet! What an experience.

Well, these are just a few things you can do in NY state, now as for the city? You're on your own...I never go there!

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
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
