Bill Cathey of Deport is a soldier of the Confederacy in the 19th Louisiana Regiment know as the Company "A"Vance Guards. Oh, Bill has a regular job with Schwans Foods, and he lives in a nice home with his family in Deport, but three or four, maybe five or six times a year he travels to Georgia, Louisiana, or somewhere here in Texas to help his regiment battle the "Yankees" (Union Soldiers).

It all started a year ago when some guys Cathey knows invited him to come to one of the reenactment battles fought as close to the anniversary date and as close to the same site as possible where the real battles were fought well over a hundred years ago during the Civil War.


His first time to go was in July of
