



Did you ever wonder who put the "jiggle" in Jell-O? Who comes up with the various different flavors? Who invented Jell-O Pudding? Who is the spokesperson for Jell-O?

Did you know that Jell-O made space news in June of 1996. According to a report, Shannon Lucid, an astronaut on a 140-day mission to the Russian Mir space station, revealed that she kept track of time by allowing herself to wear pink socks and eat Jell-o on Sundays. When she found that Mir had a refrigerator, Lucid, a 53 year old mother of three, asked NASA to package Jello-O in drinking bags. She added hot water and put the bag in the refrigerator. After Lucid served her Russian crewmates their first Jello-O as a special Easter treat, they decided to share a bag every Sunday night!

In 1984, Sugar Free Jello- made it's debut along with Jell-O No Bake Desserts and Chocolate Mousse Pie. In 1974, comedian Bill Cosby be-

came spokesperson for Jell-O and has been selling the product in many various ways since then. The 60's were a time for flavor

expansion and experimentation for Jell-O gelatin. Many new flavors were tried and discovered during this period.

Jell-O sales reached over 250 million packages a year with instant puddings going national during 1953. No longer promoted as a food-stretcher, Jell-O took a light-hearted approach, positioned as a treat and festive dessert to be served with pride.

The 30's and 40's saw the advent of automatic refrigerators giving Jell-O a real boost, making it easier and twice as fast to create family favorites.

In 1925, the Postum Company acquired the Jell-O Company, forming the nucleus of what was to become the General Foods Corporation.

The first Jell-O recipe book appeared in 1904, stating that the product was approved by food commissioners and touting it as a pure, wholesome and appetizing food, endorsed by physicians.....and everybody knows that Jell-O is all they serve in hospitals!

Well, Jell-O was created in 1897. I never did find the secret ingredient

that makes Jell-O "jiggle", but I did find some great information. If you would like to read more about this product, look up jell-O.com. The website it loaded with info, recipes and great tips. We hope you enjoy the recipes this week and we will see you in the kitchen!











Real estate expert says higher prime rate may not necessarily hurt market

COLLEGE STATION - Contrary to what many people may think, a higher prime rate could mean good news for many potential home buyers, contends the research director of Texas A&M University's Real Estate Center.

The Federal Reserve Board recently announced it is considering raising its interest rates in an effort to slow down the economy but did not offer a timetable or guarantee that rates will go up.

Increases in the rates controlled by the Fed usually prompt hikes in commercial interest rates, including the prime rate commercial banks charge their biggest borrowers. The prime rate presently stands at 7.75 percent.

Higher short-term interest rates, however, wouldn't necessarily put a damper on Texas' booming realestate market, said Mark Dotzour, chief economist and director of research for the center.

"If the Federal Reserve raises rates, that might keep mortgage interest rates from going higher,"

This report, based on public documents from the National Park Service, shows that 200,000 of the total 6 million acres of privately-held land within the boundaries of our parks are in danger of being lost to development or sale and neither federal nor state park agencies can do much to protect it.


"The danger that this land could be sold for development, bulldozing, clear cutting or for other destructive purposes constitutes the single greatest threat to the nation's cherished system of national and state parks," said Paul Pritchard, president of the National Park Trust (NPT).

The NPT is the only land conservancy dedicated to preserving America's national system of parks, wildlife and historic monuments.

By helping fund park land purchasing by environmental groups and encouraging the government to buy land inside its parks as well, Americans can be part of the solution.






