

Athletic Banquet Tickets Going on Sale

The homecooked meal will be prepared by the parents of the school athletes and will be served by the eighth grade girls.

Owls, Owlettes In Wolverine Relays

Silverton's Owls and Owlettes participated in the Wolverine Relays at Springlake-Earth Saturday. In addition, the Owlettes were competitors in a meet at Jayton on Friday.

Dayne Mayfield scored two big firsts for the Owls, in the discus with 145'9" and breaking the meet record in the shot with 52'6 1/4". The old record of 49'4" had stood since 1968.

Also bringing home a blue ribbon in the pole vault was Zane Mayfield, who cleared 11'6". Gary Storie tied for third place in the vault with 11'6".

The Owlettes finished in fourth place in their division of the meet with 51 1/2 points.

A new meet record was set in the triple jump, with Linda Vaughn earning third place with 34'1" and Margaret Crosslin following in fourth place with 33'2".

A new meet record was also set in the long jump, in which Margaret Crosslin placed second with 16'7 1/2".

Another meet record fell in the 880 relay, in which Silverton finished second with 1:51.6.

Margaret Crosslin placed second in the 100-yard dash with 11.8.

The mile relay team placed second with 1:51.6 and the 440 relay won fourth place.

Linda Vaughn tied for fifth in the high jump.

At Jayton the day before, the Owlettes also won fourth place.

The 440 relay team ran second, and the 880 relay ran third. Margaret Crosslin won fourth in the 100 with 11.4 and tied for first in the broad jump with 17'5". Margaret also placed second in the triple jump with 34'1" and Linda Vaughn won fourth place.

Lesia Francis won sixth in the 440.

AREA TRACK HONOR ROLL

The Owlette 880-yard relay team is listed on the Area Track Honor Roll with a best time of 1:50.5, with no District 2-A competition listed ahead of them. Margaret Crosslin's best distance of 17'5" is listed in the long jump, with no district competition showing in the event. Linda Vaughn is listed in the triple jump with 34'1" and Margaret Crosslin is listed with 33'6". With no district competition showing up in the event, they could be a shoe-in to put away both top spots at district.

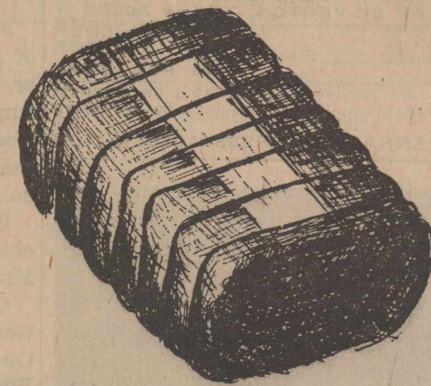
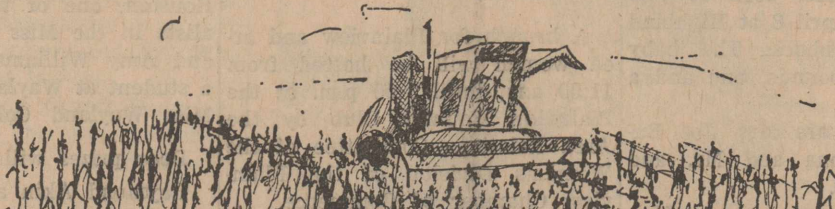

Artists Invited To Submit Designs For Bicentennial Medal

Professional and amateur artists of all ages who live in Briscoe County are invited to submit designs for one side of a Bicentennial Commemorative Medallion to be issued in Briscoe County later this year.

The designs can be pencil or pen and ink drawings, but it has been requested that they not be crayon drawings.

The Briscoe County Historical Survey Committee has chosen the Texas American Bicentennial design for one side of the medallion, and wants the other side of the medallion to be representative of Briscoe County. The Committee is hoping that a unique design will be submitted that will be completely different from the designs on the medallions which have already been issued by other counties. The artwork can include several things — agriculture, landmarks, state park site—which are typical of this county. They ask that many areas of interest be included in the drawings.

The contest closes at 3:00 p.m. April 18. Artwork is to be 8 1/2 x 11 and is to be turned in in a manilla envelope to First National Bank in Quitaque or First State Bank in Silverton. All work must be signed. Final judging will be Saturday, April 19, by an established artist in conjunction with WNW Mint Industries, Inc. of Amarillo.

The medallions will go on sale in Briscoe County in August 1975 during Briscoe County's Birthday Celebration.

Silverton To Get New Post Office

J. B. Roberts of Plainview, lowest of four bidders, was awarded a contract to build and lease a new post office building in Silverton.

The post office will have 2,784 square feet of interior floor space and will be located on the southwest corner of the intersection of Lone Star Street and Grady Street in Silverton.

The Postal Service holds an option to buy the site which is about one-half acre in size. The option will be assigned to Roberts, the successful bidder, who will lease the building to the Postal Service for a basic period of ten years, with options on 20 additional years.

Junior Rodeo To Be Held In Silverton April 18 - 19

Stock producer for the Silverton Junior Rodeo to be held April 18-19 at the Silverton Rodeo Arena will be Fred Cordell of Childress. There will be rodeo performances at 8:00 p.m. each night, trophy buckles will be given to the winners of first place in all the events, and there will be pay-backs to contestants in the senior events. There will be one go-round per event.

All-Around Cowboy and Cowgirl will receive \$100 each.

Admission will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

Senior boys events include bareback bronc (15 per night), bull riding (15 per night), calf roping and ribbon roping. These events will be open to senior high age and under, and there will be a payback of 60% of the entry fees per event. Entry fees for the first two events named will be \$20, and \$15 entry will be charged for the second two events.

Senior girls events are barrel race, pole bending, goat tying, and break-away roping. Entry fee for each event is \$15, and 60% of entry fees in each event will be paid back.

There will be a barrel race and break-away roping for boys and girls 13 and under, with trophies to be given for first place. Entry fees are \$3 for each event.

Special Election Will Be April 22

Absentee voting is underway at the office of Briscoe County Clerk Bess McWilliams for the Constitutional Amendment Election to be held across Texas on Tuesday, April 22.

Two proposals are being presented to the voters. The first concerns the revision and consolidation of state and local retirement systems and programs and provides for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 per cent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals.

The second proposition would raise the salaries of the members of the state legislature to \$600 per month and set a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.





Buy toys which are safe for all children in the family. A toy designed for an older child may injure a curious younger brother or sister.

If a toddler doesn't like vegetables, substitute fruits. Fruits generally have most of the same nutrients as vegetables.

Buy children's shoes in the afternoon, because their feet tend to expand as the day progresses.

Before cleaning window screens, write a number in chalk in each window and the same number on its screen. Put any screws or bolts in a bag and write the same number on it. This makes it easier to return a clean screen to the same window.
