#### Water Encountered in Bowie Test

Lease and royalty holders who had hopes for the Paluxy to pay off were disappointed Monday as the wildcat found water in that zone and drilled ahead at 3,858 feet. With elevation 285 feet, the Paluxy came in around 3,735 feet. The well topped Georgetown lime at 3,222 feet.

Those familiar with the prospect had seen a good chance for the well in the Paluxy, but if production is found it now apparently will be in the Glenrose zone or deeper. The well carries a 6,700-foot contract which is expected to carry it to the Travis Peak, but the test is generally considered likely to go much deeper before quitting.

# **Red River Co.** Population **Totals 29,771**

Population of Red River county is 29,771, according to census figures released by the supervisor for this district, as compared with 30,923 in 1930, or a loss of 1,152. The loss is believed largely in the rural districts as only 3,736 farms are shown in the county which had 5,108 farms Lamar County Tax in 1930. The decrease of 1,372 in number of farms does not present a clear picture, however, as there have been changes in methods of farm operation and the figure does not mean abandonment of so large a number.

> The Monday rain followed torrential downpours over the week end that totaled more than three inches and hiked the June rainfall to about six and one-half inches. Total rainfall in June last year was reported 4.22 inches. Total rainfall for the first half of this year is reported to be slightly more than 30 inches, as compared with 42.41 inches the first half of 1935. Last year's rainfall for the first six months was nearly 27 inches.



### Valuations Show \$200.000 Drop

A downward trend that has lopped off nearly \$10,000,000 in Lamar county tax valuations during the past 14 years was continued at this year's session of the equalization board when a net loss of \$200,000 was shown in valuations.

The drop put the county's taxable valuation at \$21,100,000, as compared with almost \$30,000,000 in 1926 and with \$25,586,000 ten vears ago.



25 Licenses to Wed **Issued in Red River** 

Twenty-five marriage licenses were issued in Red River county during June, but this figure was eight less than for May and four less than the total for June 1939. indicating that the war threat has caused no stampede for matrimonial fetters in the county. Earlier months of 1940, however, had more marriages than in 1939, the first six months of 1940 having a total of 145 as compared with 122 in the first half of 1939.

#### **Mobilization** Plans

Members of Congress are receiving information which convinces them that the people generally are greatly disturbed about the war situation. The situation changes rapidly but it is receiving constant attention of governmental officials.

The question of compulsory military training is being discussed, not for the purpose, however, of sending an expeditionary force to Europe, but for the purpose of being adequately prepared in our own country. There is a strong feeling that we should encourage enlistment in the R. O. T. C., National Guard, Citizens Military Training Corps and in training units in the different colleges and universities and endeavor to obtain sufficient personnel in that way without being compelled to resort to compulsory military training. Consideration is being given to a plan that will not interfere with the education of young men who are accepted for military training.

I am beginning to get requests for copies of the latest Infantry Drill Regulations from people who are organizing local groups and who desire to teach them military drill.

**Fifth Column in France** Treason was a "decisive factor' in the defeat of France, General Maurice Duval, military expert, said immediately after France surrendered. "Did an army ever receive such a stab in the back as our own?" he asked. " We fought bravely and heroically. Even our enemy admitted this." "We were attacked from an uncovered rear. The work of the fifth column played too large a part in our misfortune to be quickly forgotten." General Duval asserted that Germany could not have beaten France by force of arms alone

"We weren't beaten by the Germans but by all the agents of treason whom they sent into our country," he said. "That is what the Germans maintained in 1918. We certainly have a greater right than they to assume such reasoning."

The American people must be on guard against such Fifth Column and Trojan Horse tactics in our country. The enemy boring from within has already caused the downfall of many nations.

Schools Assist in Defense Program

Recently a committee met in Washington to determine the part the schools of the nation might play in the National Defense Program. It was decided that the schools could offer their training facilities to the government in connection with the training of workers in various phases of the National Defense Program. #### Number of Cotton Farmers

The last accurate check of the number of farms and producer units by size was made in 1934. At that time, there were 1,473,472 farms producing cotton, with 2,325,-360 units. Since that time, and including 1938, it is known that the number of farms has increased 10.3 per cent and the number of producer units has increased 10.5 per cent Therefore, in 1938 there were 1,625,-000 farms producing cotton, and IN BALL GAME WEDNESDAY there were 2,568,448 producer units.
