Let us be thankful for the little communities that help to mould our State and National character. Let us hope, as we build more stately cities, that the village may not perish from the earth. For here, far from the seething crowds, sheltered from the storm and strife of fierce competition of busier marts, there is a shrine of community life to which we owe a debt of gratitude.—Hubert M. 
