Talco Makes Good Showing in Auto Driver Training

Thirty-one members of Talco High School auto driver training class were in Commerce recently to take driver tests under the eagle eye of State Patrolman McCain. Talco's class had a better score than two similar classes of ETSC, according to the patrolman.

Talco's training class has been instructed the past year by Supt. J. L. Hughes, who took a short course in the work at the University in Austin last year.

Talco's training car is in Austin this week, where Victor Krejci, assistant coach, and Alton Willms, bandmaster, are taking a short course of eight hours a day for five days in driver instruction.

Five Unhurt When Plane Crash Lands

Five persons, including a 22-month-old baby, escaped injury near Clarksville Saturday night at 11:30 when their plane crashed in a cotton field two miles west, 300 yards north of United States Highway 82.

They were James Carr, owner and pilot, San Diego, Calif.; Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Robbins and daughter, en route to their home in Hartford, Conn., and Mrs. Evelyn Jobe, en route to Philadelphia.

The plane had taken off from the Sulphur Springs airport, where the pilot was unable to obtain gasoline for the ship, en route for Texarkana. Carr brought the twin-engine Cessna Bobcat in for a wheels-down landing in the cotton field as his gasoline supply ran out. A ditch buckled the left landing gear and the plane overturned seventy-five yards short of a house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Trent. The plane was a total loss. Clarksville has no lighted airport.

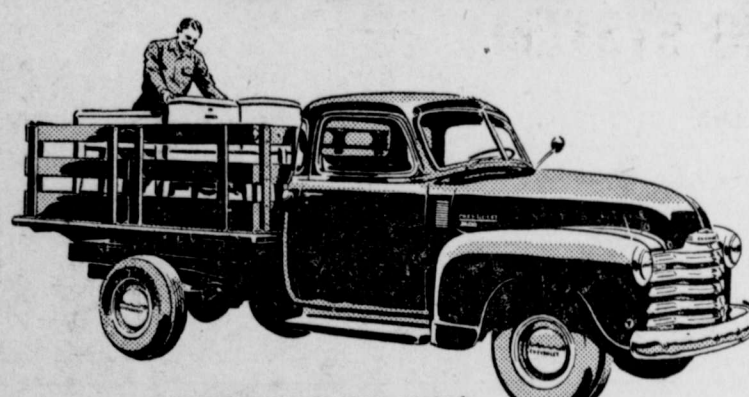

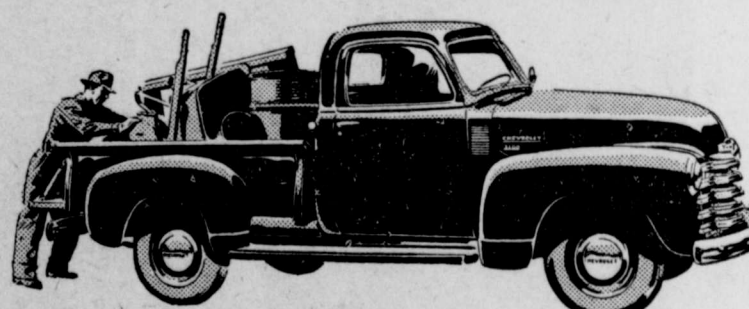

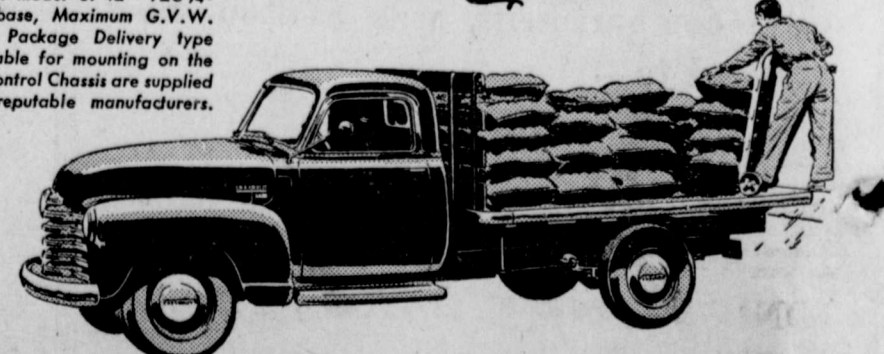

Deer Tag Bill Now Becomes Law

AUSTIN. — Texas will have a big-game hunting license law in force when the deer and turkey season opens next November.

The Legislature has passed a long-sought deer tag bill which will cost hunters only 15c more than the tax on the old permit. For small-game gunners the law remains unchanged, their hunting license costing \$2 a year. The big-game permit will cost \$2.15.

The most important change in the license law is that hunters will be required to tag all deer they kill. Two tags will accompany each license.

It will be unlawful for anyone to have in his possession the carcass of a buck to which there is not attached a tag issued to that person. The tag must remain on the deer in storage until it is processed or destroyed.

Persons under seventeen or hunting deer or turkey on the land on which they reside must register with the game department or any of its licensing agencies.

The tag law will allow better enforcement of the buck law, game officials agree. The measure has been sought in several sessions of the Legislature.

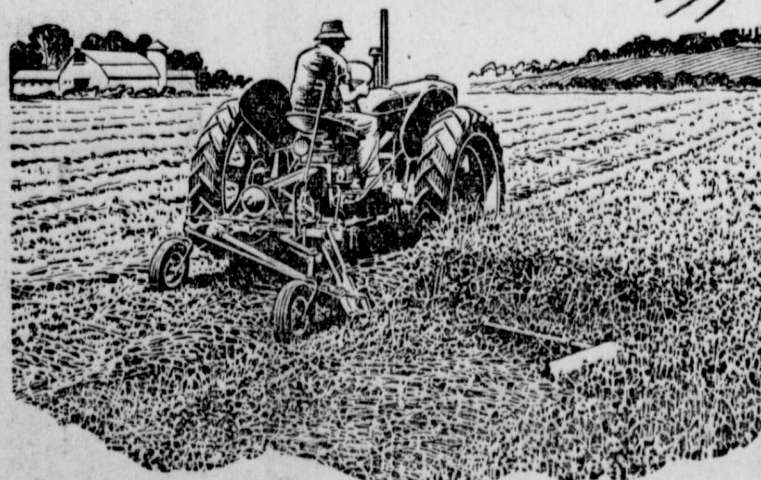

RHEIN/MAIN AIR FORCE

BASE, Frankfurt, Germany. — The hotly contested honor of making the last flight from Rhein/Main Air Force Base to Berlin before the official blockade lifting fell to the 331st Troop Carrier Squadron in a lucky drawing on May 11. Flight Engineer on the final flight before midnight was T-Sgt. Harold E. Washington, a veteran of 89 missions to Berlin. At 23:58, his plane cleared the runway with ten tons of coal, conforming to a tightly-packed Airlift schedule which continued through the night.

Sgt. Washington whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Washington, reside in Talco, has had wide experience as a flight engineer. After enlisting in the Air Force in September, 1940, he went to training camp at Albuquerque, N. M., and attended gunnery school at Las Vegas, Nev. For three years during the war he served as flight engineer on B-24s, with missions in the Pacific and over Japan. He had a corresponding position as crew chief on a C-82 flying Boxcar based in Greenville, S. C. After his recent re-enlistment, Sgt. Cotton Growers to Fight Weevils

A good percentage of the April planted cotton is setting squares but boll weevils have been reported in the fields during the past few weeks, ready for work, according to the Red River County Agent. A number of farmers will carry out an early control program to kill off the pests before they have a chance to build up and damage their crop. Some will put out the first dust soon after the cotton has been chopped and plowed; the second as soon as forms or squares are set, and the third just before blooms appear. Either 3-5-40 (3% gamma benzene hexachloride — 5% DDT — 40% sulphur) or 20% chlorinated camphene — 40% sulphur will be used at the rate of 7-10 pounds per acre per application. These applications will be put on at approximately 7 day intervals.

Farmers who will use only two applications in the early control program will apply the first soon after the forms appear, and the second about 7 days later, just before blooming.

According to our entomologists early season dusting is a good investment to insure early fruiting where thrips, aphids, fleahoppers or boll weevils alone or in combination cause damage every year. It is more effective if large areas are to be dusted.

Insecticides applied after cotton begins to bloom and before bollworms appear may cause an increased infestation of bollworms due in part to the kill of beneficial insects. For that reason dusting should be avoided during this period if possible.

However, heavy infestations will build up in many fields not dusted, and when the count of fleahoppers or boll weevils reaches 25% to 35% infestation control measures are needed badly. Three applications of either 3-5-40 or 20% chlorinated camphene and 40% sulphur at five day intervals using 10-15 pounds per application should give effective control.

When dusting with ground machines, nozzles should be set 4 to 6 inches above the tops of the plants, and dust should only be applied when the air is calm.

No Substitute for Care and Caution

Most dangerous seat in a passenger car is the right front seat beside the driver. Accident statistics show that more severe injuries are suffered by occupants of this seat than any other seat in the car when a collision occurs. Only more caution and courtesy on the part of automobile drivers will reduce materially motor vehicle accidents despite great improvements in brakes, tires, all-steel bodies and window visibility. There is no substitute for care and caution while driving.

INSPECTORS CAPTURE FIVE ILLICIT STILL

Texas Liquor Control Board Inspectors in April reported the seizure of five illicit stills. With the stills, which had a cubic capacity of 225 gallons, inspectors captured 525 gallons of mash and made four arrests; 14½ gallons of moonshine liquor were destroyed. One still each was taken in the counties of Titus, Franklin, Red River, Harrison, and San Augustine.

POOR SOIL LIKELY TO BREED ANEMIC CHILDREN

Washington. — Poor soil is likely to breed anemic children, Dr. Lawson Smith of the West Australia Medical Department, says in a report received here by the United States Public Health Service. Dr. Smith traced lack of minerals in blood to soil conditions in parts of Australia.

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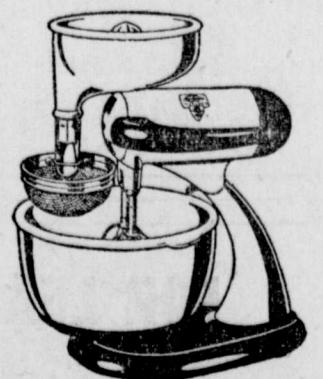


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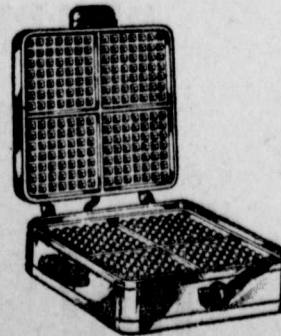


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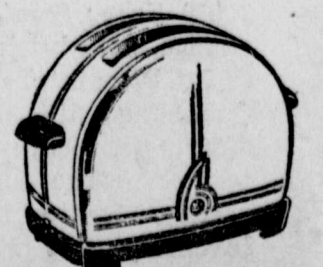


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
