## Plans Completed For Poppy Day

"A poppy on every coat—remembrance in every heart." will be the goal of the American Legion Auxiliary for the annual observance of Poppy Day on Saturday, May 27.

Complete plans for Poppy Day are announced by Mrs. Jewell Haynes, the Auxiliary's Poppy chairman. Poppies will be offered throughout the city all day so that everyone will have opportunity to honor the war dead by wearing the memorial flower.

All Poppy Day workers will give their time without pay, Mrs. Haynes explained. Contributions made for the poppies will go to the rehabilitation and child welfare funds of the Legion and Auxiliary, to be used for the benefit of disabled war veterans and needy children of veterans during the coming year. These contributions for a large part of the money expended by the Legion and Auxiliary in their vast rehabilitation and welfare work.

The poppies which the Auxiliary will distribute have been made by disabled veterans at Legion Veterans Hospital. They are crepe paper replicas of the famous wild poppies of France and Belgium, which bloomed on the battlefields and cemeteries of both world wars and which have been the symbol of remembrance for the dead ever since the first World War. Thousands of disabled men and women, unable to do other work, have been given employment making poppies for the Auxiliary this year.

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Alcorn Wants System Uvertime Pay to Eliminate Embarrassing Surplus

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, comes up with another strange idea this week, as the following letter will reveal.

Dear Editor: I was out here the other afternoon givin some serious thought to my agricultural program for this year, it ain't no matter to be taken lightly or entered into hurriedly, as it seems pretty obvious that lack of thinkin coupled with overwork has brought on the present embarrassing farm surplus.

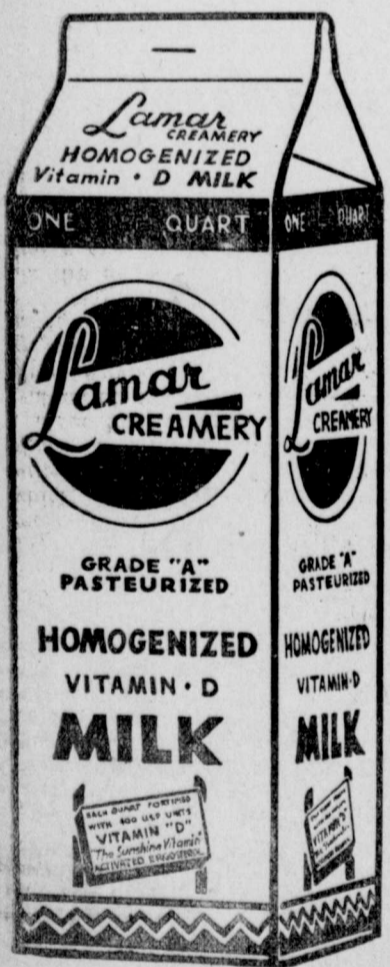
The way I see it, if more farmers had been thinkin more and workin less, we might have been confronted right now with a good old-fashioned scarcity and prices could stay high without any government help. Personally, I wash my hands of any responsibility for all these surpluses. Can't pin it on me. Many's the time when I was confronted with the greedy urge to get in my field and start plowin, but I always put the welfare of the country ahead of myself and wandered off in the pasture and spent the day thinkin.

As a result of this thinkin, I have figured out a way to keep this country from buildin up these embarrassin surpluses. As I see it, the country has been puttin too much store by overtime. It's workin overtime that builds up a surplus, don't make no difference whether it's cotton or corn or rice or automobiles or clothes pins or B. B. guns. Now under the present system, people get paid extra for over-time, which is a vicious incentive for building up price-ruin surpluses.

What this country needs is a system of extra pay for overtime. Anybody can see this overtime system merely leads to bigger and bigger surpluses and since everybody knows by now it's the government's job to see that everybody stays prosperous, why not adopt my system? It's simple. Say I'm toyin with the idea of goin to the field this afternoon and plowin. Instead, I apply for under-time, forget the field, go fishin, and help hold the surplus down. It seems to me a lot simpler to pay a man for under-time instead of payin him for over-time. It's easier on the man and his equipment and the government saves the expense of sturin the surplus.

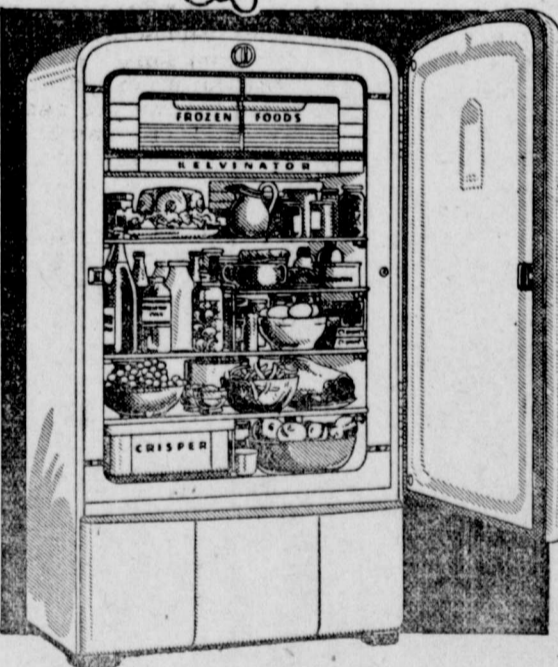
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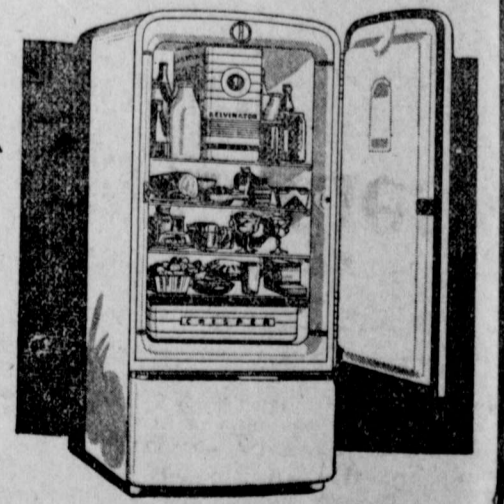
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
