Monticello Area is **Due Travis Peak Deep Test Soon**

Dr. James McKeekin-Kerr, geophysicist of Longview, has announced plans for a deep oil test in the Monticello area in the near future. The test is expected to explore 200 feet of the Travis Peak formation, at approximately 8,000 feet.

Dr. McKeekin-Kerr said that a block of 3,000 acres or more is being assembled north and northeast, with a portion a little south of Monticello, with acreage contributions expected from major companies. Drilling is expected to commence immediately after the clearing up of lease acreage.

Actual location and the name of the drilling company will also be announced after completion of

JOHNTOWN STORE **BROKEN INTO**


