City of Talco does not have the funds to do this work, but has made a deal with the school board, whereby the plugs will be installed and paid for by the school, and the school repaid with monthly water and sewer bills.



Ever notice these road rollers with projecting knobs which are called sheep's feet that highway builders pull up and down new roads? They do a thorough job of packing dirt and other roadbuilding materials. Believe it or not, each of those knobs applies 650 pounds pressure to the square inch, which is a right smart amount of packing.

Two years in a row now the Department of Agriculture has dealt cotton farmers rotten hands. Last year it dictatorially reduced acreage about 65 per cent. This year it called for sixteen million bales, and with the market at 45 cents, set the support price around 311/2 cents. Every grower who can afford to do, should put his cotton in the loan. Keep it off the market and the price should advance.

With the opening of school, many children will be on the streets and motorists should be on their p's and q's. The time to prevent traffic accidents is before they happen. That means reduced speed and more carful attention to the business of driving. There is no excuse for speeding in the corporate limits of this town, unless it is a matter of life and death or a fire to which a volunteer fireman is responding. Drive carefully and save the lives of school children as well as your

There is one way this nation can put a stop to the spendthrifts at Washington and save this nation from bankruptcy, and that is to put a ceiling on the amount of taxes that can be collected for non-defense spending, and it should be done. It is the only way we will ever stop exchanging tax money favors for votes. If we limit congress' power to impose taxes we will also do away with a lot of socialist welfare handouts and automatically government spending. Twenty-five State Legislatures have already approved such a constitutional amendment.

With everything as dry as the proverbial powder horn, motorists, hunters and campers should be exceedingly careful with matches, cigarette and cigar stubs and camp fires. Grass is our greatest and cheapest source of livestock feed and a refuge for game. Let's not have the costly grass and range fires that destroyed millions of dollars worth of feed and timber that was experienced last year. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from speeding automobiles. You will start a fire and never realize it because you will be miles down the road before it gets underway.





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
