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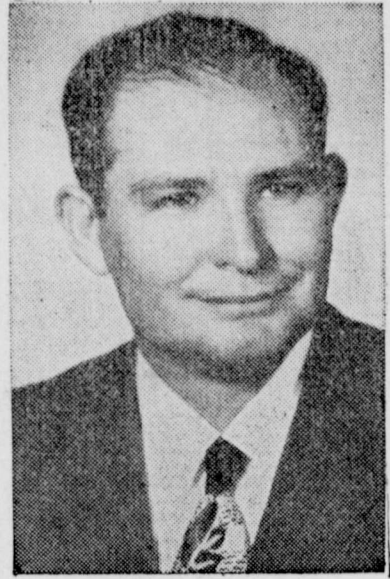
Fine Arts Club Has Special Guests

Deer Hunting Fair In Local Counties

Talco deer hunters, most of whom have hunted in northern Franklin and Hopkins Counties between Sulphur and White Oak since the season opened Friday of last week, have been doing a very good job, compared to other reports that have reached this newspaper.

Up to Tuesday afternoon ten bucks had been killed, some of which were large and fat.

Henry Thomas killed an 8-pointer that weighed 142 pounds, which is the largest reported to this editor.

J. J. Smith got a nice ten-point buck that weighed 118 pounds on Tuesday, after it had been killed and dressed on Monday.

David Teague brought in a 10-point and his dad, H. F. Teague, an 8-point, but we could not learn how much those bucks weighed.

Dwane Welch killed a 4-point near the Bluff. Frank Sloane an 8-point, Jack Brown a 3-point, Alex Waddell a 3-point. Jenkins Moore and Benny Roebuck also brought in good deer, size not learned.

Deer hunting season closed in Red River, Lamar and Fannin counties on Tuesday night, while Franklin, Hopkins and Delta counties' season closes on Sunday, Nov. 25.

About 50 deer are reported to have been killed in Red River County, mostly in the northeastern part.

Harman Walters of Clarksville, bagged an old moss-back Sunday in Red River County. Although the buck had only six points, its antlers spread for 36 inches. He weighed 148 pounds and cropped ears indicated that it was one of the original deer planted in Red River County some years ago by the Game and Fish Commission.

A deer-hunting party composed of Jack Winn, K. O. France, V. L. Taylor, Rip Hargrove, Andy Bowman, R. A. Lonnie Biglow, famed colored cook of Sulphur Springs, will care for the gastronomical needs of the party, which in other years has been heavy. Henderson, Bowman and Bailey are new members of the party. Others have hunted together from one to fifteen years. In other years they have killed from six to a dozen bucks, and an occasional turkey.
