Pink Bollworm is Found in Cass and Camp Counties

A news item of vital concern to cotton farmers of this area appeared in Wednesday's dailies from Linden. It said:

Cass County, along with Upshur and Camp Counties, has been placed on the pink bollworm quarantine list, according to R. T. Mortiz, inspector for the United States Department of Agriculture.

Mortiz found the pink bollworms at the Bloomberg gin. At present it is not known definitely whether the bollworms were from Arkansas or Texas fields, as the samples taken were from three bales, one from Cass County and two from Arkansas. Nevertheless, this places the quarantine on Cass County since the bollworms were found in the county, said County Agent Truitt Powell.

"Heavy infestations of this pink bollworm, can and will reduce cotton yields and may lower the grade due to stained lint," said Powell.

Deport Preacher is Named Arctic Prince

The Rev. James Embry Bryan, pastor of the Depot Methodist Church, has been recognized as a Prince of the Royal Arctic Realm. The preacher, recently discharged from the Air Force with the rank of 1st Lieut., was a pilot of a C-54. He was with the group which installed the weather station on Ice Island at the North Pole.

A citation, which Rev. Bryan received Tuesday is as follows: "The Order of the Arctic Realm. To all who shall see these present, greetings: Know ye, that by order of the Great Command Pilot, Ruler of the Frozen Northland, Custodian of the Aurora Borealis, Guardian of the Polar Empire, James E. Bryan, 1st Lt. USAF, honorary Royal Prince, on this 20th day of March in the year 1952 A. D., did cross the Arctic Circle, venturing into the Kingdom of Boreas Rex. He is entitled, henceforth, to all rights

Titus Grand Jury Returns 22 Bills

Titus County Grand Jury adjourned Sept. 25, after returning 22 bills of indictment, all charging felonies.

According to District Clerk Jim Rudd the bills were:

Eight for burglary, one for murder, two for rape, two for driving while intoxicated (second offense), one for cattle theft, two for robbery, one for passing a forged instrument, two for child desertion and three for theft of personal property valued at more than \$50.

After returning the bills the grand jury adjourned its deliberations until Oct. 22.

Cattle Prices are Down on Grassers

Short grass and lack of water is forcing excessive runs of grassers and short-fed cattle to market. They have depressed the market and packers, who are overstocked on such animals, are buying much lower than a few weeks ago.

This is particularly true on the sand, where the drought has hurt much worse than on the black lands. Cattle at the Mt. Pleasant auction ring brought very low prices on Tuesday, according to president Anderson of the Titus County Fair Association.

The blaze destroyed the warehouse and another small building attached to it, firemen reported.

Alsobrook received the award for wounds received in action against the enemy in the vicinity of Kajon-ni, Korea, on July 16, 1952. His parents received the Purple Heart Tuesday and did not know of his wounds until they were advised Saturday the award was being sent to them.

Lt. Alsobrook enlisted in the service in November, 1950 as a private. He received his basic training at Camp Chaffee, Ark. He attended and graduated from officers candidate school at Ft. Sill, Ok., and was an instructor for six months at Ft. Hood prior to his overseas assignment. He landed in Korea on June 13 and participated in the battle for Old Baldy, prior to his transfer to the Eastern front in July. He is now with Headquarters 158th Field Artillery battalion.

Bowie County Block Will Get a Test

Considerable activity was reported Tuesday from the East Texas district, topped off with first reports of a projected Glenrose lime exploration in southeast Bowie County.

This wildcat would be drilled under an obligation assumed by A. C. Pebbles and M. F. Red in taking a 1,400-acre block some four miles southeast of Maud. Agreement calls for a 5,000-foot hole to start by Christmas.

The block is composed of G. L. Holley, Abel Mays and F. K. Foster lands falling in the J. B. Claiborne, Jacob McFarland and William Elliott surveys. In the area where the test would be drilled, Gulf Oil drilled a Smackover lime failure several years ago.

Game Calendar Hunting This Area

Here is the schedule of hunting and trapping seasons for counties in this area:

Squirrel—Opens Oct. 1, continues through Dec. 31.

Deer—Nov. 15 thru 20, both days inclusive, for Lamar, Red River and Fannin Counties. Nov. 16 thru 25, both days inclusive, for Delta, Franklin and Hopkins Counties.

Ducks, Geese—Oct. 31 through Dec. 29, both dates inclusive. Hunting on Red River bed, under Oklahoma laws, open on Oct. 18.

Quail—Dec. 1 thru Jan. 16, both days inclusive.

Turkeys—Nov. 16 thru 25 in Delta, Franklin and Hopkins Counties, both dates inclusive. Closed in Lamar, Red River and Fannin Counties until 1961.

Fur Trapping—Dec. 1 thru Jan. 31 in all Texas counties on fur-bearing animals, subject to special county laws.

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Franklin Short on Cotton and Hay

Franklin County will not make much cotton this year, according to Charlie Brown, Franklin County agent. He said 250 to 500 bales would catch the cotton crop. That would be from about 1,500 acres. The county has one gin. It's in Mt. Vernon and operated by Bill Meek.

Brown said the hay crop was about 40 per cent of normal and that farmers had about an 80-day supply. Like Lamar, that county has applied for federal aid in buying hay. Out of the approximately 800 farm operators in the county, there are 35 Grade A dairies and 163 Grade B dairies, he said.

Squirrel Season Open for 3 Months

Squirrel season opened Wednesday, Oct. 1, and will continue thru Dec. 31. The crop is said to be the best in several years. Special laws for different counties in this area state the bag limit.

Lamar and Red River Counties have no bag or possession limit on squirrels.

In Delta, Franklin and Hopkins Counties, the bag limit is eight squirrels per day or in possession. Titus and Franklin Counties follow the general state law of 10 per day and not more than 20 in possession.

Shooting hours are sunup to sundown. No closed season on big mosquitoes that will hunt the hunter and be able to penetrate two layers of clothing. There is also a big crop of the singing pests this year, despite dry weather.
