Talco Trojans Win District Crown By 41-7 Score

Talco's Trojans won the right to meet Honey Grove in bi-district by blasting Jefferson 41-7 Friday night in Talco. The Trojans are unbeaten in district competition and journey to Simms next Friday night to meet James Bowie in the final game of the conference season.

Fullback Freddie Rodgers was the star of Talco's high-geared offensive. Rodgers completed seven out of 15 passes for a total of 167 yards. Elton Belcher was also outstanding, scoring two touchdowns, but Bobby Martin couldn't be left out because he scored two himself, one which was a 75 yard jaunt. This TD was a race between speedy Chas. Banks of Jefferson and Martin, but Martin showed him who could run when he left him behind on the 35 yard line.

Rodgers passed to Smith to set up the first touchdown, 35 yards, and then passed to Elton Belcher 27 yards for the touchdown. Rodgers went through the middle for the extra point.

The Trojans drove to the two yard line where Freddie Rodgers plunged over for the touchdown. The extra point was no good. Rodgers then passed 40 yards to Bobby Martin for the third touchdown of the game. Again Rodgers went over for the extra point.

Just before the half Belcher went over from the five standing up and Rodgers passed to Earl Hawkins for the extra point. This making the score at the half 27-0.

To open the second half scoring Martin dashed 75 yards for the longest run of the game and another score. For the third time Rodgers ran the extra point over.

The Trojans had the Jefferson offensive off balance all during the game. Their hard tackles on punt returns cost the Bulldogs the ball on numerous occasions and when the Bulldogs were in scoring distance Talco either took over on downs or recovered the ball on fumbles or pass interceptions. It was a heads-up game played by the Trojans.

VA Hospital Aide Honored By Allied Vets

Mrs. Geneva E. Shroud, Oakland, Calif., information supervisor at the Oakland Veterans Hospital, has been awarded the annual Gold Shield Award of the Allied Veterans' Association.

Mrs. Shroud is the first woman in the United States to be presented the award who was not actively engaged in the entertainment field. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Smith of Talco. She has given much of her time over a period of two years, to making others happy, and that was the merit upon which she was chosen.

An international citation, the award has previously been given such world-recognized celebrities as Sister Kenny of Australia, Madame Curie of France, Gracie Fields of England and the late Gertrude Lawrence.

Cited for her "distinguished service" in her work with hospitalized veterans, Mrs. Shroud was presented the award at a formal dinner held at the Hotel Claremont by Edmund C. Le Feure, service officer at the Oakland Veterans Administration Hospital and representative of the Department of California section of the Disabled American Veterans.

Allied Veterans' Association is composed of Americans who have served with the military forces of the Union of South Africa, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Great Britain and with the French Foreign Legion.

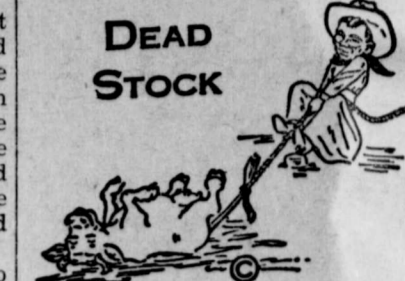
The crowning of the band sweetheart was a very lovely affair and everyone at the game Friday night will always remember what a lovely queen Jean made.

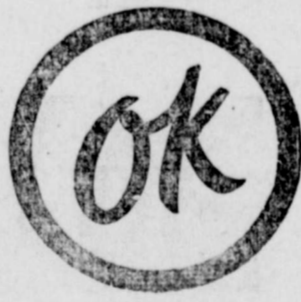
