Recommendations Made Game, Fish Commission by Red River, Titus Cos.

More than 75 Red River County sportsmen held the future of their hunting and fishing laws in their hands at Clarksville on Thursday night of last week.

They met with Game and Fish Commission representatives at the Court House to make recommendations for Red River County's new slate of game and fish laws. Aside from the present laws, they made three recommendations—

- (1) Placing a ban on deer hunting with .22 rifles.
- (2) Placing a bag limit of 10 per day on squirrels.
- (3) Increasing mesh size on three inches instead of two on Sulphur River, as well as the rest of the county and banning the taking of game fish. To wit, bass and crappie.

Those recommendations were accepted by more than a half-dozen Game and Fish Commission representatives present and will be worked into the new set of hunting and fishing statutes for Red River County.

Red River sportsmen also asked the Game and Fish Commission to give them more patrolling during hunting seasons, primarily pertaining to trespassing.

At a meeting of Titus County sportsmen in Mt. Pleasant on Wednesday night of last week, presided over by Editor Hugh Cross, outstanding changes from present game laws were recommended to the Game and Fish Commission as follows:

- (1) Deer season be changed from 45 to 5 days and limited to one pronged buck.
- (2) Season on wild turkeys be extended.
- (3) Matter of increasing size of nets from 2 to 3 inches was discussed but not adopted.

The newly recommended regulations will be grouped in a proclamation to be sent the Game and Fish Commission which probably will act on them at the next meeting set for October 4.

Sunday was a regular summer day with the thermometer in the high 90's. Early Monday came a dash of rain and much lower temperatures.

And the weatherman predicted in his five-day outlook that there will be more of the same. Temperatures for the period are expected to average near normal minimums of 62 to 72 degrees and maximums of 85 to 92 degrees.

Trojans De-Horn Brahmans 12-7 Friday's Game

Talco Trojans, led by Billy Ramey's terrific blocking and Elton Belcher, along with Dean Lewis, providing the running power, upset Paul Hewitt's Brahmans 12-7. Boy is Attacked By Enraged Sow

Kenny, 13 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Cheatwood, living east of Jhntown, narrowly escaped serious injury Tuesday when he drove a mile from home in a jeep with feed for a sow and pigs on open range.

He carried the feed near and threw it on the ground. In doing so, he stumbled and fell among the pigs, which seemed to anger the sow. Without warning she attacked the lad. He quickly climbed a post nearby, but the enraged beast knocked it down.

His left arm was badly chewed between the hand and elbow. He managed to reach the jeep and drive to his home and was taken to a local doctor, where he was given proper attention, requiring fifteen sutures to close the wounds.

Oil Activities of Local Interest

Pump is being rigged for final gauging at Seaboard Oil No. 1 Dr. J. C. Calabria, BBB&C survey, second well in the Southeast Cuthand pool of Red River County. Last swab test on perforations at 4,760-65 in Glenrose sand give it eighty-three barrels of oil and nine barrels of water in twenty-three hours. Site is about a half mile northwest of the Coline discovery finished in the 4,900-foot level.

In Bowie County Sun Oil Company has moved into the Dalby Springs Paluxy sand pool about three miles southeast of Dalby Springs townsite with location for No. 1 J. C. Gingery. Site for the 4,500-foot try is 660 from the west and 407 from the westerly south line of the A. F. Hancock survey and 648-69-acre lease. This puts it east of the American Liberty et al discovery on Jackson land.

Rig has been moved in and set up for drilling on the John Scarborough place about three miles southwest of Roxton in Lamar County by the Jordon Drilling Company of Kilgore.

The test will go 2,800 feet and considerable acreage is reported under lease in the area. A first try was made more than a year ago on the Bywaters estate, a second on the Maness land in the vicinity of the present test.

Crude Flow Cut Month October

AUSTIN. — Crude oil producers in Texas drew an 86-223-barrel daily cut for October after a Railroad Commission hearing Friday. The commission set next month's quota at 2,904,409 barrels daily.

Texas Independent Producers & Royalty Owners Association pleaded for the commission to go slow in decreasing the flow. The October order is 237,397 barrels daily below the August level.

Most Texas fields will operate nineteen days in October. East Texas field drew eighteen days, Kelly-Snyder fifteen, Spraberry (non-flaring wells) eleven, Pickett nine and Pantex sixteen.
